

The College

Established in 1899 by the Twentieth Territorial Legislature as Northern Arizona Normal School, Arizona State College has made rapid growth and improvement from a one-building normal school to a modern, multi-building, 270-acre campus noted for its beautifully landscaped campus.

By action of the Board of Regents of the Universities and State College, and the Arizona Legislature, Arizona State College was awarded university status and will become Northern Arizona University on May 1,

1966.

The university academic areas include College of Arts and Science, College of Education, College of Business Administration, College of Creative Arts, School of Forestry, and School of Applied Science and Technology.

This institution is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the National Council for

Accreditation of Teacher Education.

It is authorized by the Board of Regents to grant the following degrees: Associate of Science, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Education, Bachelor of Science in Forestry, Master of Science, Master of Arts, Master of Arts in Education, and Educational Specialist.

Two-year curricula are offered in the fields of nursing, secretarial studies and

technology.

Flagstaff is at the base of the San Francisco Peaks, on the main line of the Santa Fe railroad, on U.S. Highways 66 and 89 and State Highway 79. It is also served by airline and two trans-continental bus lines. The city is situated in the Coconino National Forest at an elevation of 7,000 feet. The elevation, the protection provided by the forest, and the Arizona sunshine give Flagstaff an unsurpassed all-the-year-around climate.

Coaching Staff



HEAD COACH ANDY MACDON-ALD took over the duties as new head coach of the Lumberjacks during spring ball.

Prior to taking the head coaching job at

ASC, MacDonald was backfield coach and chief recruiter under Jerry Burns at the State University of Iowa for four years. Before joining the Iowa staff, he coached nine years at Flint (Mich.) Northern High School. As head coach at Flint Northern, MacDonald's 1956 and 1960 teams were state champions, and he was named Coach of the Year both years.

He played collegiate ball at Central Michigan University where he was named on the "Little All-America" as quarterback, and was the leading small college passer in the nation for two years, 1950 and 1951. In addition he was named on the all-conference team for two straight years, and voted most valuable player at Central Michigan.

MacDonald received his B.S. in Education degree at Central Michigan and his M.A. in Education at Eastern Michigan University. Andy and his wife Dolly have three children, Laurie Lee, 11; Patti Sue, 9; and Anne

Drew, 5.



BILL ODYKIRK is another new-comer to the coaching staff at Arizona State College this year. Last year he was freshman coach and head of the recruiting program at Central Michi-

gan University where he played collegiate football as center, linebacker, and kicking specialist. Prior to joining the Central Michigan staff, he was on the coaching staff at Kimball High in Royal Oak, Mich., for four years. He also coached one year at Warren Fitzgerald High in Detroit.

Odykirk received his B.S. degree at Central Michigan, and his M.S. in Secondary School Administration at the University of Michigan. Bill and his wife, Wanda, have three sons, Craig, 5; Tim, 2 1/2; and Dan, 1.



KEN GIBLER-This is the fourth season for Gibler on the Lumberjack coaching staff. Prior to joining the ASC staff he coached football at Blue Springs, Mo., High School,

where he compiled a record of 27 wins, 18 losses, and 4 ties.

Gibler played collegiate ball at Missouri Valley College, and was an outstanding end. He graduated from Missouri Valley in 1957, and was co-captain of the team his senior year. He played on the Missouri Valley team that played in the Tangerine and Mineral Bowls. During his senior year he was named to the Williamson All-America first team. Gibler was named to the All-United Kingdom first team while playing service ball for the Air Force.



FRESHMAN COACH LEO HABERLACK-This is his second season as a member of the Lumberjack coaching staff. Haberlack is also head track coach at ASC.

He was assistant coach at Minot State College, N.D., for two years prior to joining the ASC staff. He is a graduate of Minot State and earned four letters in football, and three in track. Coaching experience includes football, track and wrestling at Harvey, N.D., and Minot High schools.



GRADUATE ASSISTANT -- Owen Dejanovich was an outstanding lineman of the 1962 and 63 Lumberjack football team. He transferred from Thornton (Ill.) Junior College where he made JC All-America for two straight years. He earned his B.S. in Education at ASC.

BILL SHORTY-6-2, 215-pound senior, co-captain, three-year Lumberjack letterman, prep all-stater in football and track, all-conference in basketball, and All-Star in football from Santa Cruz High in Eloy, Arizona, playing tight end, will also play nose-guard on defense, police science major. May also play tackle.

BILL HANNA-6-3 1/2, 210-pound sophomore from Independence, Mo., played both Axebabe and varsity last year, at Wm. Chrisman High, earned all-area, all-conference honors in football, all-conference and all-district honors in track, probably go both ways this season, majoring in mathematics.





FRITZ KRUEZER-6-1, 185-pound junior from Las Vegas, Nev., two-year letterman, earned letters in football, basketball and track at Western High, named all-city in football and all-zone in baseball, co-captain in all three sports, will also see action as defensive safety.

HARRY HARTSELL-6-1, 185-pound junior from Las Vegas, Nev., earned two football letters at Western High, co-captain and most valuable player, shifted from guard to end in spring ball, earned Lumberjack letter last season, majoring in accounting.

TOM FOSTER-5-11, 190-pound sophomore halfback from Salem, N.J., transfer from Eastern Arizona JC--named outstanding player, leading scorer and ground-gainer, earned three prep letters in football, basketball, track, and baseball--received all-state honors in football and baseball, all-tri-county in all four sports, runs 100 in 9.8, education major.

MANUEL AVILA-5-9, 185-pound junior defensive halfback from Harbor Junior College, Los Angeles, two-year letterman and all-league honorable mention, all-league honors at San Pedro, Calif., High--also lettered in baseball, majoring in police science.

STEVE WILSON - 5-10, 185-pound sophomore defensive halfback from Royal Oak, Mich, transfer from Northwood Institute where he earned letters in football and baseball, lettered in football, basketball, and baseball at Kimball High in Royal Oak.

DUANE TODD - 6-0, 215-pound junior guard from Compton, Calif., Junior College, Earned four prep letters in football and three in wrestling at Lynwood High, Compton, top juco wrestler, named to prep all-coast second team in football, police science major.
