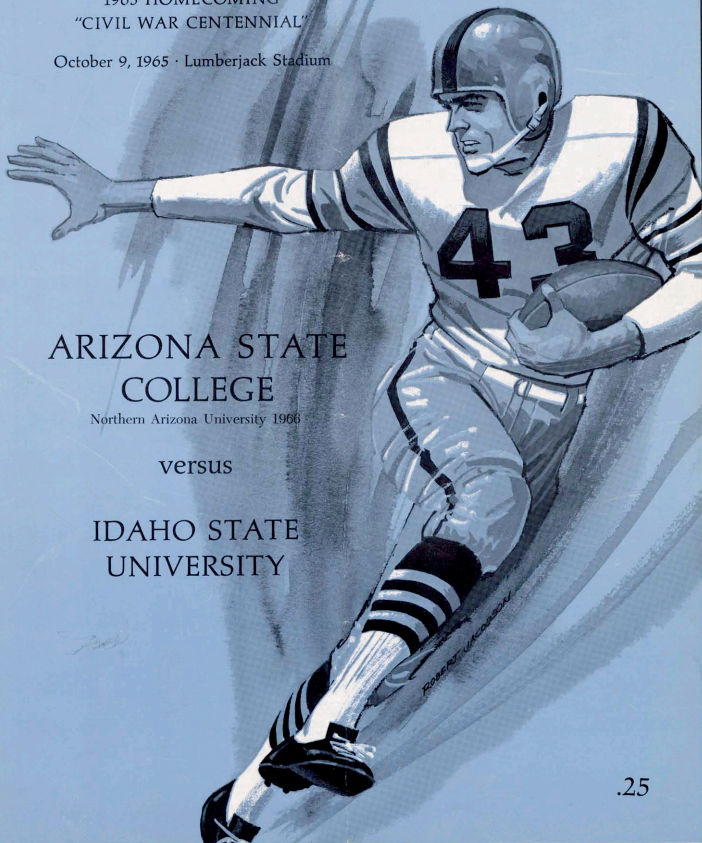



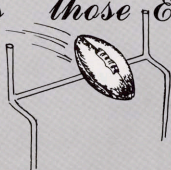

Director of Athletics



ANDY MacDONALD
Head Football Coach

HEAD COACH ANDY MACDONALD took over the duties as new head coach of the Lumberjacks during spring ball.

Prior to taking the head coaching job at ASC, MacDonald was backfield coach and chief recruiter under Jerry Burns at the State University of Iowa for four years. Before joining the Iowa staff, he coached nine years at Flint (Mich.) Northern High School. As head coach at Flint Northern, MacDonald's 1956 and 1960 teams were state champions, and he was named Coach of the Year both years.

He played collegiate ball at Central Michigan University where he was named on the "Little All-America" as quarterback, and was the leading small college passer in the nation for two years, 1950 and 1951. In addition he was named on the all-conference team for two straight years, and voted most valuable player at Central Michigan.

MacDonald received his B.S. in Education at Central Michigan and his M.A. in Education at Eastern Michigan University. Andy and his wife Dolly have three children, Laurie Lee, 11; Patti Sue, 9; and Anne Drew, 5.

DR. TED KECK, Director of Athletics and Physical Education, is in his third year at Arizona State College. He came to ASC from Minot State College, Minot, N.D., where he held a similar position for 14 years.

He received his B.S. degree from Minot State, and earned his M.S. and Ed.D. degrees at the University of Oregon.

Dr. Keck is a veteran coach. For seven years he coached baseball at Minot State, and in 1962, his team was in the NAIA national tournament. He was also head football coach at Minot State from 1954 through '56, and his '54 team won the NDIAC football championship. His baseball team also dominated the North Dakota conference.

TODAY'S GAME

Both the Arizona State College Lumberjacks and the Idaho State University Bengals have become noted to one another as "Homecoming Spoilers" during the past six years. Twice, each have spoiled the other's homecoming.

In addition, an intense rivalry between the Lumberjacks and the Bengals has built up. In today's game, each are supporting identical records this year, 1-2-0, and both are looking toward improving their record.

I. J. (Babe) CACCIA
Head Football Coach

HEAD COACH I. J. (BABE) CACCIA has built an enviable football coaching record at Idaho State University since 1952. He has a 76-33-1, win-loss-tie record, that includes five Rocky Mountain Conference championships and one Big Sky Conference title. In 1963 he was named "Coach of the Year" for the Big Sky. For the past nine years the Bengals have been consistently ranked among the nation's top ten small college teams.

Babe Caccia divided his four years of college football between Idaho State and University of Idaho, and while at Idaho U. he was Pacific Coast Conference wrestling champion. Before joining the Idaho State staff, he was assistant coach at Pocatello High School.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR JOHN VESSER will end 27 years of service to Idaho State University next January when he retires as director of athletics. He will be succeeded by Milton (Dubby) Holt, currently assistant athletic director. From 1941 through 1951, Vesser compiled an outstanding gridiron record at Idaho State. In nine seasons Vesser-coached Bengals won 42 games while dropping 27.

Vesser is a 1925 graduate of the University of Idaho where he was an All-American end. He has the distinction of playing in the first East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco, Dec. 25, 1965. He played football in the pro ranks for five years, including the Chicago Cardinals. He joined the staff at Idaho State in 1937.

back strong last Saturday when they hammered away at undefeated Adams State at Alamosa to take a 56-0 win over the Adams Indians. In their first two games the Lumberjacks lost 21-6 to Weber State, and then had a narrow 2-3 loss to Whittier College.

The Bengals lost their opener, 14-26, to Omaha University, and downed College of Idaho, 48-7, but finished up on the short end of the score to University of Montana, 0-16, last Saturday.

The Lumberjacks should be at full strength for this Homecoming game. Alumni should see a team that went to the air with success last week, completing 9 of 18 passes for three touchdowns. Also the Lumberjacks are playing from a different type of offense than they have in the past. Coach MacDonald, former backfield coach at University of Iowa, introduced the "Roving I" formation and the "Hawk" defensive formation this last spring during spring ball.
