Northern Arizona University

Northern Arizona University was established in 1899 as Northern Arizona Normal School by the Twentieth Territorial Legislature. On November 28, 1964, the Board of Regents unanimously approved the changing of Arizona State College to Northern Arizona University, effective May 1, 1966.

The university academic areas include four colleges and two schools: College of Arts and Sciences, College of Education, College of Business Administration, College of Creative Arts, School of Forestry, and School of Applied Science and Technology.

The institution is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. The university is authorized by the Board of Regents to grant the following degrees: Associate of Science, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Education, Bachelor of Science in Forestry, Master of Science, Master of Arts, Master of Arts in Education, and Educational Specialist.

Through the years the institution has grown and improved from its start as a one-building normal school to a modern, multi-building, 270-acre campus noted for its beauty.

Flagstaff is at the base of the San Francisco Peaks, on the main line of the Santa Fe railroad, on U.S. Highways 66 and 89 and State Highway 79. It is also served by airline and by two trans-continental bus lines. The city is situated in the Coconino National Forest at an elevation of 7,000 feet. The elevation, the protection provided by the forest, and the Arizona sunshine give Flagstaff an unsurpassed all-the-year-around climate.

From Flagstaff it is a two-hour drive to the Grand Canyon and 2 1/2 hours drive to Phoenix.

From the university there is ready access to national parks and monuments, forests, deserts, mountains, lakes, unique geological phenomena, ruins of the earliest Indian cultures, and Indian country -- all the resources for invigorating activity and study.

President of the University



DR. J. LAWRENCE WALKUP was appointed president on December 21, 1957 succeeding the late Dr. Lacey A. Eastburn.

A native of Wheeling, Mo., President Walkup joined the university (Then Arizona State College) in June, 1948. In the fall of 1948, he became director of the University Elementary School. In 1950 he was named head of the education department, a post he held until November, when he assumed the position of dean of instruction. On July 1, 1955, he was named dean of the university.

President Walkup, one of Arizona's leading educators, is well known in education throughout the nation. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Central Missouri State College, and the Master of Education and Doctor of Education degrees from the University of Missouri.

Director of Athletics and Physical Education

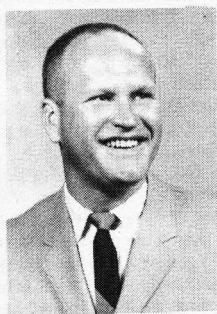


A veteran coach, DR. TED KECK joined the athletics and physical education division at Northern Arizona University in 1963 as director. Prior to coming to NAU, he held a similar post at Minot State College in North Dakota for 14 years.

At Minot State, Dr. Keck was baseball coach for seven years, and also served as head football coach from 1954 through 1956. His '54 football team won the North Dakota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title. In 1962 Keck's baseball team competed in the NAIA national tournament, and during those seven years as coach, his teams dominated the North Dakota conference.

Dr. Keck did his undergraduate work at Minot State, and earned his M.S. degree and Ed.D. degree at the University of Oregon.

Coaching Staff



HEAD COACH
ANDY MACDONALD
took over duties as head coach of the Axers last year and finished with a respectable 5-4-1 record. This year will be his first with a full year of recruiting and rebuilding under his guidance.

Andy came to NAU from the University of Iowa where he served under Jerry Burns as backfield coach and chief recruiter for four years. Before going to Iowa, he coached nine years at Flint (Mich.) Northern High School. His 1956 and '60 teams were state champions, and Andy was named Coach of the Year both of these years.

He played collegiate ball at Central Michigan University and was named to the "Little All-America" team as quarterback. For two straight years, 1950 and '51, he was the leading small-college passer in the nation. In addition he was named to the all-conference team for two straight years and voted "most valuable player" at Central Michigan.

MacDonald received his B.S. in Education at Central Michigan and his M.A. in Education degree at Eastern Michigan University.

On coming to NAU MacDonald introduced Lumberjack fans to the wide-open, fan-pleasing "Roving I" offense and the mobile "Hawk" defense. His enthusiasm and intense interest, both on and off the field, generates high spirits among his players and staff members. His colorful actions on the sidelines during a game also creates avid interest among the fans.

Andy and his wife Dolly have three children, Lauri Lee, Patti Sue, and Anne Drew.



KEN GIBLER -- This is the fifth season for Gibler on the Lumberjack coaching staff. Prior to joining the NAU staff he coached football at Blue Springs, Mo., High School, where he compiled a record of 27 wins, 18 losses, and 4 ties.

Gibler played collegiate ball at Missouri Valley College, and was an outstanding end. He graduated from Missouri Valley in 1957, and was co-captain of the team his senior year. He played on the Missouri Valley team that played in the Tangerine and Mineral Bowls. During his senior year he was named to the Williamson All-America first team. Gibler was named to the All-United Kingdom first team while playing service ball for the Air Force.

OWEN DEJANOVICH was an outstanding lineman of the 1962 and 63 Lumberjack football team. He transferred from Thornton (Ill.) Junior College where he made JC All-America for two straight years. He earned his B.S. in Education at NAU.



FRESHMAN COACH LEC HABERLACK -- This is his third season as a member of the Lumberjack coaching staff. Haberlack is also head track coach at NAU.

He was assistant coach at Minot State College, N.D., for two years prior to joining the NAU staff. He is a graduate of Minot State and earned four letters in football and three in track. Coaching experience includes football, track and wrestling at Harvey, N.D. and Minot High schools.



HEAD TRAINER BILL KAUTH joined the athletic staff at NAU last fall. Prior to that he was assistant trainer at Indiana State University, where he earned his M.S. degree in physical education. Prior to that he was student assistant trainer at Illinois State University for

four years while working for his B.S. degree in Health physical education and recreation. He was also assistant trainer for the NAIA national wrestling tournament.

Fall Outlook

"Toughest schedule in history" -- that's the big worry facing Lumberjack coach Andy MacDonald as the Axers go into the fall campaign under a new banner -- Northern Arizona University.

Personnel-wise the Axers show promise of shaping up to a team that hopes to hold its own against the tough competition which includes such major colleges as Weber State, Fresno State, Idaho State University, Long Beach State, University of Montana, West Texas State, and San Diego State. Other teams on the schedule cannot, by any means, be discounted -- Central Missouri, Cal Poly of Pomona, and Eastern New Mexico -- they can be tough.

Results of spring ball, according to Mac Donald, indicate that the Lumberjacks are 100% improved over last year, but there is a major weakness at defensive ends and a lack of depth at some other positions that will have to be remedied by newcomers.

Spring transfers gave a big boost to the Axers offensively according to MacDonald, but it will depend on the newcomers during fall drills to overcome the weakness at ends and the lack of depth.

The Lumberjacks passing offensive is expected to be improved this year with the arrival of two outstanding junior college quarterbacks, Cary Hubert and Jim Velasquez and University of Kansas transfer, end, Sim Stokes. Both Hubert and Velasquez will have quite a battle with returnee Ted James for the signal-calling spot.

The return of flanker Gary Kiepke, after a year's absence, has also given added strength to the Lumberjacks passing game. Fullback George Herman's return and spring transfer from University of Iowa, tailback Dalton Kimble, are expected to give the Lumberjacks' ground game a big boost.

Nucleus of the fall squad is the 40-some members of the spring squad which includes 17 lettermen of the team that inaugurated MacDonald's coaching at Northern Arizona University with a 5-4-1 record.

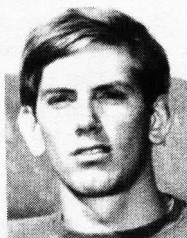
Giving a 'ray of sunlight' to the Axer's hopes for this fall are some outstanding linemen from junior college and college ranks that reported for spring ball. They include Larry Small, 230-pound guard from the San Diego Marines; JC transfers Mike Bomar, 260-pound center, and Mike Hannigan, 220-pound tackle. Also adding strength to the line are tackle Jim Kelley and guard Bob Smith, both back after a year's absence.

With good talent back from the '65 squad, plus spring ball newcomers, and promising candidates from summer recruiting, Coach MacDonald hopes that the Lumberjacks can meet the challenge of the tough schedule.
