Honed by Experienced

Lumberjacks' Ax Is Sharp, Double-Edged

At the beginning of the year Northern Arizona University football coach Andy MacDonald was worried about the chances of his young 1968 team, particularly its offensive potential. Graduation has taken its toll from a 1967 team that carved a respectable 5-5 record out of a tough schedule.

As things have turned out it seems MacDonald shouldn't have worried so much. The Lumberjacks have developed a young junior college transfer quarterback, Mike Olson, who came to Northern Arizona from Cerritos Junior College.

Olson, who has directed the Lumberjacks to wins over Long Beach State (26-20) and University of Nebraska at Omaha (7-6) has passed for 499 yards and six touchdowns.

The 6-1, 195-pounder threw a TD toss to split-end Walter Mannon last week in Northern Arizona's win over University of Nebraska at Omaha.

MacDonald also came up with key maneuvers when he converted two linemen to handle the running-back chores. The two changes have paid off huge dividends for the Lumberjacks so far. Tonight Bud Wiedoff, normally a defensive end, will start at fullback for Northern Arizona. The 6-1, 220-pound junior letterman earned Associated Press Little All-America honors last year as a soph.

The other running-back spot, which is designated tailback in the Lumberjacks' Power I formation, will be handled by two-year vet Sonny Campbell, who played tight end and guard last year. Campbell is the second-leading ground gainer for Northern Arizona, having picked up 228 yards in four games. Campbell stands 6-0 and weighs 195 pounds.

Another running back to watch is fullback-tailback Roy Whalen, who will not start although he is the Lumberjacks' leading ground gainer this year. Whalen has pushed his powerful 6-4, 225-pound frame for 235 yards on 55 carries, a 4.5 average.

Olson will be aiming many of his passes toward flanker Bob Grey, a 5-10, 180-pound speedster. Grey, another junior college transfer, has caught 18 passes for 235 yards and three TD's.

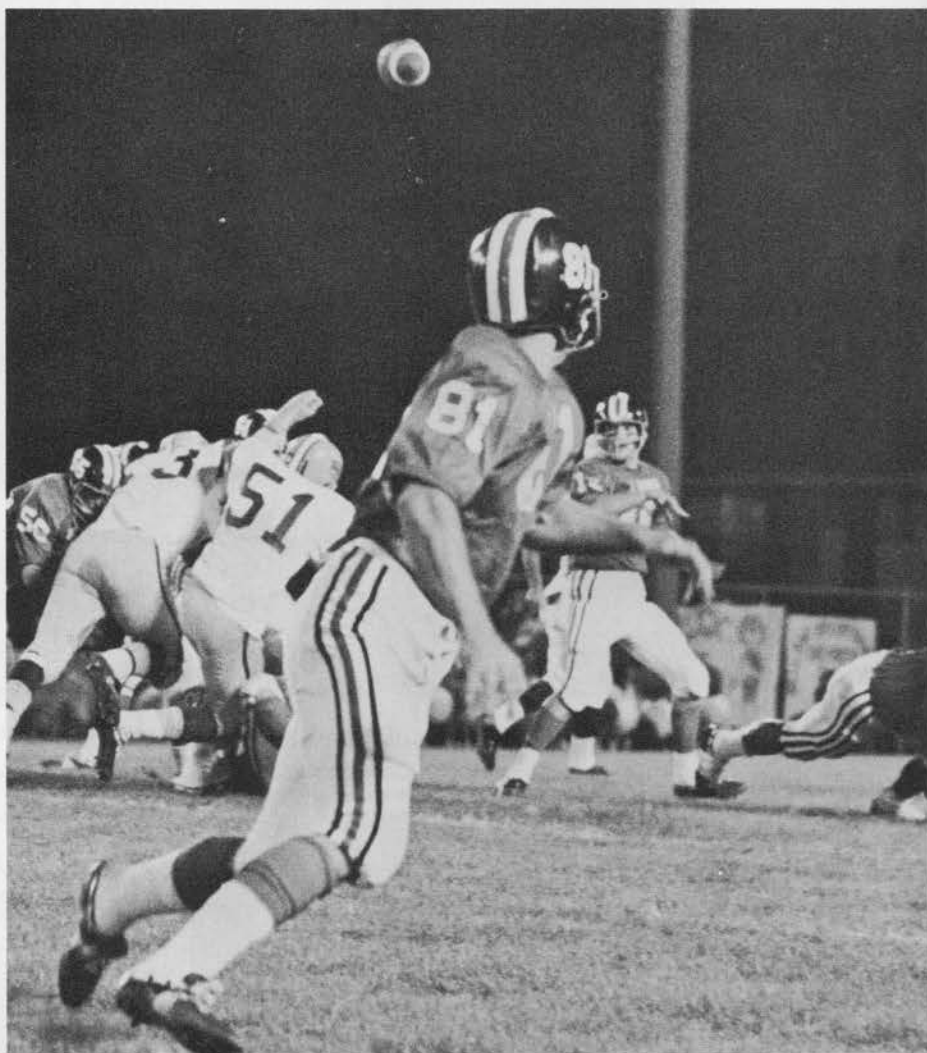
Grey leads the team in scoring with 20 points and does the squad's punting. He has averaged 38.9 yards per punt.

Northern Arizona's attack has been balanced for the most part. The Lumberjacks are averaging 136 yards on the ground and 124 yards through the air lanes per game.

Chief blockers up front for the Lumberjack offensive unit are tackles Bob Glassner (6-4, 235) and Steve Holmes (6-4, 250) guard Ozie Slade (6-3, 240), and center Steve Preston (6-2, 198).

On defense Northern Arizona's defensive line presents a formidable front to NIU's offensive blockers. Russ Tillman, Ed Duley (6-7, 280), Mark Lomas, and Steve Gardner have held opposing ground games to just 96.2 yards per game.

Northern Illinois' fine split end, John Spilis, is expected to return to combat tonight after a week's layoff. Spilis who suffered a knee injury against North Dakota State University two weeks ago, has

supplied much of Huskie offensive power this season.

The lanky veteran leads the Huskies in pass receiving and is tied with halfback Bruce Bray for the team leadership in scoring. Spilis has snared 19 passes for 261 yards, a 13.7 clip. He has scored three touchdowns, one on a thrilling 90-

yard kickoff return against North Dakota.

John LaLonde, the stubby sophomore fullback, leads the Huskies in rushing while Bob Carpenter continues to head the passing corps. LaLonde has bulled his way for 260 yards on 55 carries while Carpenter has flicked 106 aerials, completing 60 for a nifty .566 percentage.

MEET THE HUSKIES

1. PAUL YORK, 6-4, 228-pound senior defensive end. York is extremely agile and aggressive, two traits he uses well to haunt opposing runners and quarterbacks. He's one of the more experienced Huskie linemen, having earned two letters for previous duty. He played left defensive tackle on NIU's undefeated Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference team in 1965. York sat out last year due to an early-season knee injury.



2. WALTER KOTVAN, 6-2, 224-pound senior tackle. Kotvan has been a steady performer for the Huskies, seldom caught at making costly mental errors. Skillful at one-on-one situations in straight-ahead blocking, Kotvan prepped at Prosser Vocational High School in Chicago where he captained a league-winning Public League Blue Division team. Kotvan was also a nominee for the Knute Rockne Memorial Award, symbolic of football and academic excellence. He was valedictorian of his senior class.



3. JOHN SPILIS, 6-4, 217-pound senior split end. "Hondo" is one of the greatest pass-catching threats in NIU history. The lanky, two-year veteran possesses sticky hands, uncanny moves, and all-around football ability. Spilis is also the fastest man on the squad and a bona fide professional prospect. Spilis, besides catching aials, uses his speed to cover punts and kickoffs and is also the Huskies' top threat on the kickoff return team. Leads the Huskies in pass receiving and scoring.



4. LEANDREW WADE, 6-1, 206-pound senior cornerback. Wade is one of the key members of the Huskie pass defense unit. The speedster gets off to a quick start, diagnoses plays well, and hits with authority. He is from Harlan High School in Chicago, where he earned all-city honors twice. He captained the team twice and was honorable mention all-state his senior year. As a member of Northern's frosh squad three years ago, Wade scored 20 points.



5. BILL COOGAN, 6-2, 212-pound senior fullback. Coogan is one of the finest blockers in the Huskie backfield. Possesses rugged strength and power which he used to his advantage earlier in the season when he was moved to defensive end to shore up depleted reserves against Ball State. His versatility will earn him many more playing assignments this year. At Eisenhower High School in Blue Island, Coogan was named to the South Suburban League all-star teams in both his senior and junior years.

When Northern Arizona University was first established as Northern Arizona Normal School in 1899, it had just 23 students. Today, after passing through growth phases as Arizona State Teachers College, Arizona State College and finally, as of May 1, 1966, Northern Arizona University, Fall enrollment is estimated at more than 8,000.

The University offers a broad, liberal arts education through its College of Arts and Science, Education, Business and Creative Arts, its Schools of Forestry and Applied Science and Technology, and its Graduate College.

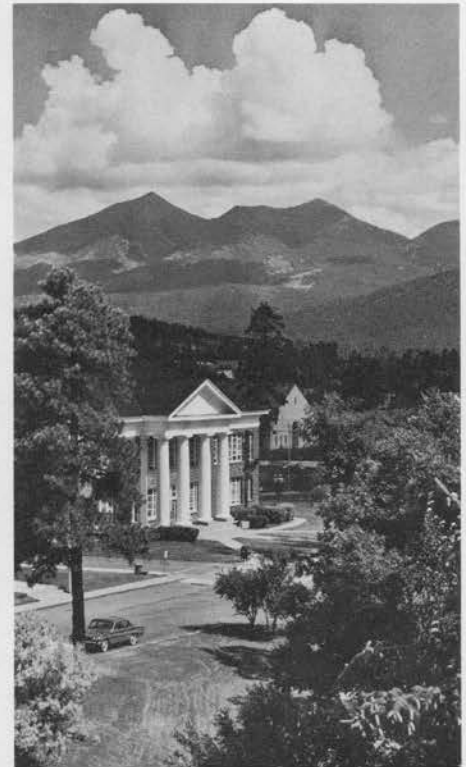

Master of Arts in Education, Master of Music Education and Educational Specialist.

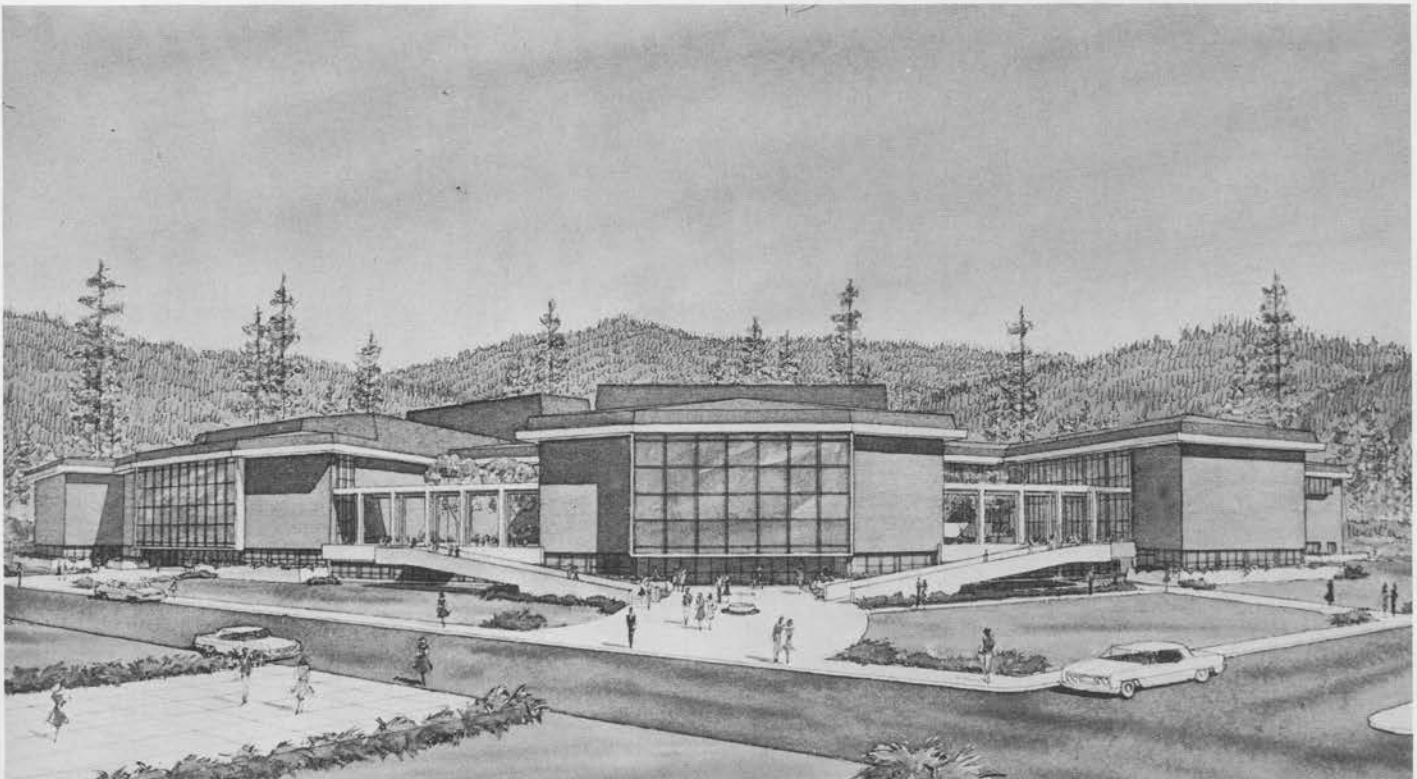
The University's 325-acre campus near the center of Flagstaff on northern Arizona's 7,000-foot-high Coconino Plateau is noted for its green beauty. Its extensive physical plant is both modern and efficient as well as aesthetically blended with its natural surroundings.

The tree-shaded campus sprawls in the shadow of the 12,600-foot San Francisco Peaks and amid the Coconino National Forest and the largest stand of majestic Ponderosa pine in the world. Such scenic wonders as the Grand Canyon, Petrified Forest and no less than 11 national monuments protecting the ruins of prehistoric peoples, as well as the living cultures of the Navajo, Hopi, Apache and Havasupai Indians, are all less than three hours away from the campus.

The University and its unique surroundings provide students, whatever their interests, with a physical, cultural, and intellectual environment without parallel.

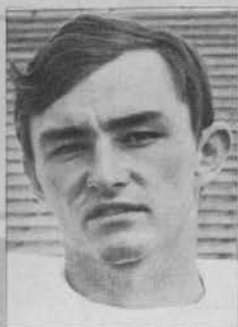

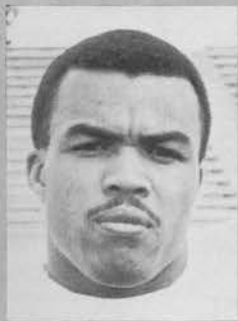

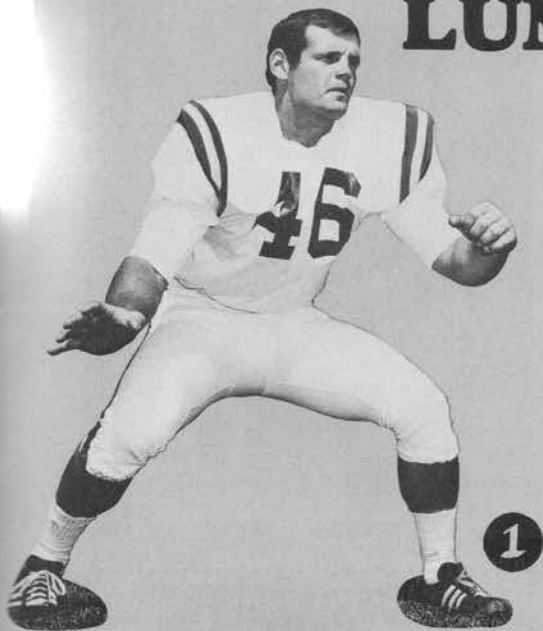

MEET THE LUMBERJACKS

1. **BUD WIEDOFF**, 6-1, 220-pound junior fullback, defensive end. Wiedoff is an excellent defensive end and should provide the Huskies with a severe challenge. He is co-captain of the team, quite an honor for a junior, and last year earned Associated Press Little All-American honors. If needed, the versatile Wiedoff could step in at fullback, where he did more than a commendable job last year.

2. **MIKE OLSON**, 6-2, 190-pound junior quarterback. Olson, who came from Cerritos, Calif., Junior College with several press clippings, has won the starting berth at Northern Arizona. He's a pin-point passer who can also throw the "bomb." He is a threat to the school's passing records if he stays healthy. Last year at Cerritos he connected on 51 per cent of his passes for 1,400 yards.

3. **ED KELLY**, 6-1, 235-pound defensive tackle. Kelly is also a JC transfer for the Lumberjacks, coming from Trinidad, Colo., Junior College, where his team won two consecutive titles. An aggressive tackler, Kelly should plug up the middle of the Lumberjack line more than adequately. He is a member of that rare breed among football players: tough, smart, and big.

4. **SONNY CAMPBELL**, 6-1, 200-pound junior fullback. Campbell is one of most valuable Lumberjacks. The two-year veteran can play at several positions and handle each with skill. In his two years he has started at offensive guard, tight end, fullback, and tailback. Campbell, a slicing runner, last year finished second among the Lumberjacks in scoring with 34 points, coming on four touchdowns and 13 extra-point conversions. Campbell also caught 17 passes totaling 360 yards, for a neat 21.2 average.

5. **ED DULEY**, 6-7, 280-pound defensive tackle. Duley is the largest Lumberjack of all, and he uses his poundage well. Last year he won all-conference, all-california, and all-american honors at Compton Junior College in Compton, Calif. Duley, who is equally adept in the classroom, will be an invaluable cog in the Lumberjack defensive line. He won two letters at New Mexico State University before transferring to Compton JC.
