THE GREAT METEOR CRATER

Between Flagstaff and Winslow, on highway 66, lies the world's bestpreserved impact-collision crater. The 570-foot deep crater was formed some 22,000 years ago and today it is studied by astronauts before journeys to the moon, earth scientists and by public school students. The crater is ammed after Daniel Moreau Barringer, who did the original research in the area. He determined that the glant depression was caused by a falling meteorite. The crater is open daily until sundown.







THIS IS NEVADA-LAS VEGAS

The University of Nevada at Las Vegas is building at such a rapid rate that the school could easily grow to 10,000 students within the next few years.

This is a far cry from the humble beginning in 1951 when a few classes were offered in Las Vegas High School. The present campus opened in 1957 and has been growing since. In the first few years the University of Nevada at Reno had control until 1965 when Nevada Southern University was created and the present name, the University of Nevada at Las Vegas came about in 1969 when the State Legislature set up a state university system. The other state school is the University of Nevada at Las Regas came at the state school is the University of Nevada at Reno.

Intramurals and sports play a big part

of the UNLV total program. The Rebel leaders are currently working on a ninelane all-weather track, two baseball fields and 12 tennis courts. With the 1973 completion, the UNLV will have one of the finest physical education plants in the nation.

A seven-story Humanities Building will double the classroom space on the UNLV campus. Other buildings under construction include a Performing Arts Theatre and a College of Education.

The school graduated its first class in 1964 and now many programs are offered at the master-degree level and a PhD in education is slated to become the school's first doctoral program.


