### THE GREAT METEOR CRATER



Between Flagstaff and Winslow, on highway 66, lies the world's best-preserved impact-collision crater. The 570-foot deep crater was formed some 22,000 years ago and today it is studied by astronauts before journeys to the moon, earth scientists and by public school students. The crater is named after Daniel Moreau Barringer, who did the original research in the area. He determined that the giant depression was caused by a falling meteorite. The crater is open daily until sundown.

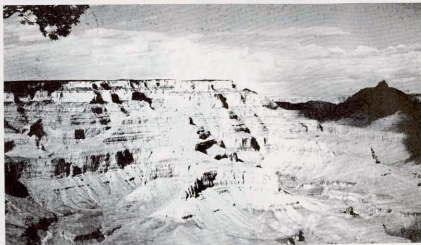

## TODAY'S GAME

There's an old saying in the Big Sky Conference. "Kick a Biblical when he's down, because he won't be there very long."

Of course, it's the Montana University Bobcats we're talking about. . . Northern Arizona University's home coming opponent.

In the final six years of the Big Sky loop, Montana State never finished worse than fourth. The Bobcats were 1st all outright in 1966-67 and tied with Weber State and Idaho for the title in 1968.

Then came the "dread" years of 1969 and 1970 when they finished fifth, sixth in the conference. The Lumberjacks haven't been doing too much kicking. The series record shows M-State 4 games to one; the only Aztec win coming in 1963 when Bill Stewart, Charlie Brown & Co. registered a 25-0 victory in Flagstaff.

Otherwise it's been M-State by 27-4 in 1962, 20-7 in 1963, 20-15 in 1968 and 20-9 in 1970. There is a player on the 1971 Lumberjacks who better recall that 20-15 loss in 1968 at Bozeman. He's Walt Maresca, better known as NAU's single-season scoring champion in basketball.

In 1968, Walt was a freshman footballer. Early in the game at Bozeman he took a screen pass and punched the goalie for a "touchdown."

But an official spotted an NAU infraction and called a penalty that nullified an NAU touchdown and a possible victory. There was some opinion as to whether or not the red flag went down after Maresca had crossed the goal. Had that been ruled, the Lumberjacks would have taken the penalty on the kickoff. But the officials ruled otherwise, so the game went into the record books as a 20-15 M-State victory.

Walt's back on the football field again, making it big, and he's anxious to show for that Biblical season in 1968. The Portsmouth, Ohio, junior (football wise) should be an offensive threat against M-State this afternoon. The Bobcats know it, so the M-State defense will be roading closely when No. 82 in the NAU uniform breaks from the huddle.

The Aztecs will have their defensive troubles too. They will have to stop the performance of Bobcat senior, quarterback Zornie Melman, who won Big Sky back of the week honors Sept. 25 when the Bobcats whipped Fresno State, 37-28.

And what kind of football does M-State play?

Fresno, on Sept. 30, whipped San Jose State, 14-7. And San Jose is on the Arizona State Sun Devil's schedule this fall.

### HOMECOMING ROYALTY

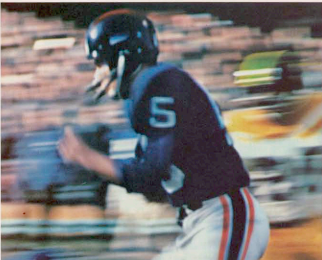

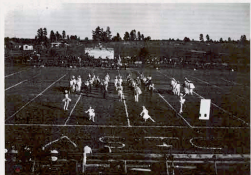

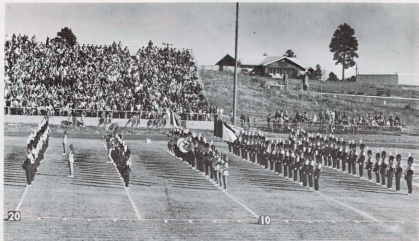

## A LOOK AT MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY

Montana State University is located in Bozeman, a city of 18,000. It is a rather unique university as it serves a multi-purpose in that it is constantly seeking to expand its programs in the liberal arts as well as professional areas.

With some 8,000 students, MSU offers bachelor degrees in 40 areas with some 90 possible majors. The Master's degree covers 29 areas while doctorates may be earned in 20 areas.

MSU is a "typical" Big Sky Conference school because of the out-of-doors flavor which permeates the air, the near-by mountains and the abundance of things to do in the area of recreation.

Leisure time really isn't a problem for students at Big Sky schools, especially if they love the out of doors.

The 1,170 acre MSU campus is just 90 miles north of the Yellowstone National Park. Three "blue ribbon" trout streams -- the Yellowstone, the Gallatin and the Madison -- bring fishermen while historic sites include Virginia City, Butte, Last Chance Gulch and several ghost towns as well as "the richest hill on earth," Helena; Madison Canyon Earthquake Area; the site of Custer's Last Stand on the Little Big Horn; and the Lewis and Clark Caverns.

Undergraduate instruction is ad-

ministered through five colleges. The College of Professional Schools has 30 percent of the students; College of Letters and Science, 29; Engineering, 18; Education, 12; and Agriculture, 11. More than 700 graduate students are included in the total enrollment. MSU operates on the quarter system and offers a wide range of summer school classes.

Athletically, MSU's Bobcats participate in eight sports at the intercollegiate level; they are: football, basketball, track, tennis, golf, cross country, skiing and wrestling. Other competition is available in rodeo, rifle, bowling, judo, karate, swimming and sky diving.

### COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

Northern Arizona University's College of Engineering is now in its second year of operation and it has made rapid gains under the leadership of its Dean, Dr. Joseph "Bud" Mehrhoff.

Last year 14 students received engineering degrees at NAU and there are currently 356 enrolled in the program. Students and faculty will move into the new 2.3 million dollar Engineering Building, now under construction on the South Academic Center, in September of 1972.

Students interested in engineering must have four years of English and mathematics at the high school level plus a year of physics, chemistry and hopefully a year of mechanical drawing.

NAU offers engineering degrees in -- Engineering Technology, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Mechanical Engineering and Physics Engineering.

At NAU students in Engineering and Technology may participate in the co-op program which is designed to blend actual on-the-job work with the classroom work. Students may select three, four or five such work periods which add significantly to their professional development.

The engineering profession has become a vital part of present-day life and today's engineer must be capable of working closely with people in other professions.
