



Since the title hopes of both teams have vanished in the first half of the season, today's contest with Weber State should be one of the most freewheeling that the Axers will play this year

Neither team has anything but prestige on the line, the Wildcats dropped their third conference game last week, 9-3 to loop leader Montana State, while NAU holds an 0-2 conference mark with only two Big Sky games left to play.

Weber holds the series edge over the Lumberjacks, having won six of eight meetings including the last two. The Jacks

sneaked past the Wildcats in 1969, 21-19, and slapped Weber with a 41-6 thrashing back in 1964 for their only two wins over the Ogden, Utah school The Wildcats hold over the Axers comes in the genius of head coach

Sark Arslanian, who has run up a 45-21-2 record at Weber since he took over the reins in 1965. In his first year he tied Idaho for the conference title, and in 1968 again tied with Idaho and Montana for a share of the

Arslanian has never suffered a losing season, his worst being 5-5-1 in 1970. His team was 7-2-1 last season including a 23-7 win over NAU but has stumbled to a 1-3 mark so far this year. All of Weber's action this year has been within the conference and the Wildcats won't see a non-conference fee until next weekend

The Axers, meanwhile, are still nursing hopes of a winning season at 2-4, and this game is considered a must if coach Ed Peasley is to keep up his winning tradition at NAU this year

It appears that every team having its woes moving the ball, solves them against NAU, Weber has been having its troubles as the Wildcat Wishbone-T has produced just 52 points in four games -- that's an average of just 13 points per contest

Not that NAU's defense isn't trying, it just appears that all of the breaks are going against the Axers - injuries, and on the field of play when some-

thing good has happened, it's been for the opposition --- always! Al Butler, 5-10, 190-pound senior is Weber's top ground gainer with 261 yards on 30 carries for an 8,7 average, Terry Bulych, 6-0, 204-pound

senior is next in line with 127 yards on 34 attempts for a 3.7 average Quarterback Charlie Grayson, 6-2, 204 pound senior has completed just six of 23 passes, but they have gone for 193 yards and two TD's. Against Boise, he teamed up with halfback Rick Bojack for a record 97-yard TD

The Wildcats have turned the ball over 16 times - four on interceptions and 12 on fumbles, but the Weber crew has also had its share of the breaks. For instance, last week, Weber recovered eight of nine Montana State fumbles

NEXT OPPONENTS: Next week NAU will be on the road to meet the University of California at Northridge in a non-conference game and Weber will be at home to meet Nevada-Las Vegas in a non-conference contest. NAU's next home game will be November 4 when Louisiana Tech.

De Kalb, I11, (Oct. 12, 1968) I into Chicago and then came here to meet Northern Illinois University in the Huskies' annual Press Day today. The Lumberjacks were a decided underdog; however, the Axers took home a convincing 43-14 win

Pacing the NAU offensive show were quarterback Mike Olson and split receiver Bob Grey. Olson completed 18 of 29 passes for 282 yards and four touchdowns -- Grey caught 10 of those passes for 157 yards and two scores. Grey also caught a pair of two-point conversion passes from Olson

The major-college Huskies had their high-powered offence held in check by a hard-charging NAU defense led by tackle Ed Kelly. NAU accumulated just 166 yards total offense in front of the home folks while NAU was rolling up 367 yards.

Kelly led a furious NAU defensive charge that caught Husky quarterback Bob Carpenter for six losses totaling 50 yards. NAU wasted little time in establishing a dominating force in the game as the Axers rolled up leads of 14-0, 27-7 and finally, 43-14.

NAU claimed some other impressive "pelts" during the 1968 season, including a 26-20 win over Long Beach State and Billy Parks: and 18-0 over the University of Montana.





#### WEBER STATE COLLEGE

Weber State College, located in Ogden, Utah, has been growing by leaps and bounds since it became a four year school in 1962. Prior to that time Weber was a very prominent junior college in athletic and academic circles.

In 1954 Weber Junior College moved from its long-time downtown location to a 275 acre area on the bench lands of the Wasatch Mountains overlooking the Ogden valley. Since that time campus facilities have grown from the original four one-story buildings to a complex of modern structure that has caused the college to purchase adjacent land for further expansion.

Enrollment during the fall quarter is expected to be near 9,000 students, and their needs will be aided by the opening of a new four million dollar Social Science Building.

The four-level structure can accommodate more than 1500 students in its classrooms, labs and special areas at one time. The structure will house the departments of history, political science-philosophy-police science, sociology-anthropology, and psychology, of the School of Arts. Letters and Science.

Facilities include 64 classrooms and 27 classroom service rooms; 24 labs and 22 lab service rooms; 83 faculty offices, a courtroom, two crime search rooms, a crime lab, small animal operating room, study areas and other units.

Sark Arstanian, the Dean of Big Sky football coaches, is in his eighth year as head coach of the Wildcats and his teams at Weber have never had a losing season; however, his 1970 team was 5-5-1. He will bring a 1-3 mark into today's game with NAU and the Wildcats are out of the race as is NAU — but, both teams could have a lot to say about how the race finisher.

A year ago the Wildcats came within minutes of winning the title as they compiled a 7-2-1 mark on the season and a 3-2-1 Big Sky mark.

This year the Wildcats will be trying for their seventh win in nine tries with NAU in football. The series has always been relatively close. If you were to average out the scores over the years Weber would have 23 to 18 for NAU. In half of the past games, a TD or less has decided the winner.

Weber, a charter member of the Big Sky, has been involved in 16 team titles in the Big Sky -- winning 13 of them outright. Weber has won seven and tied one in baskeball, won three each in baseball and golf and tied twice in football. In its two full years in the conference, NAU won the track title and tied for one cross country crown.
