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Coaching... Wow, How It Has Changed

John Pont has looked at college football from a lot of views.

Undersized, unpublicized and totally unrecruited as an offensive guard in high school at Canton, Ohio, Pont became the most storied halfback in the rich football tradition at Miami University.

At Miami, "The Cradle of Coaches," Pont played for two of the greatest: precisionist Woody Hayes and imaginative Ara Parseghian. He coached at the freshman level, then as a head coach in three distinctively different college football circles: at Miami of the Mid-American Conference, Yale of the Ivy League and Indiana of the Big Ten.

In just the last five years at Indiana, Pont has known the glamor of taking a team to the Rose Bowl, the glory of selection by his peers as the nation's coach of the year, the trauma of a black boycott and the dismay of a 1-9 season.

Clearly, Pont's a man to listen to when the question comes up: How is coaching . . . how is handling those longer-haired, enfranchised, "involved" young collegians of today . . . different from the good ol' days?

Same Game

"I don't think the football we coach, the X's and O's part, is any different at all," Pont said. "It's blocking and tackling. Oh, the formations change . . . we have the wishbone now, but really it's just an offshoot of the old belly series.

"And I don't think the things we look for in an athlete we recruit are any different.

"What has changed, and changed a lot, is the coaching that is done off the field. That changes fast—from week to week, even. Off the field, often just in talking things out, getting to know anything and everything about each player as an individual—that's where we're spending a lot more time now.

"Don't misunderstand. The emphasis has always been on the individual. But today's individual has a little different needs.

"We're dealing with an athlete-to-day who wants to know why—why are we doing this, why are we doing that? In our day, all we wanted to know was what—what are we going to do on offense and defense, coach? Then we went out and did it.

"That's not really a change in football. That's a change in life style, and today's coach has to understand this. It's like hair length. Two years ago, we had explicit rules. Now, none. I don't see any relationship between hair and performance.

Sideline Action

"But understanding is a two-way street. The athlete has to do some, too. We've gone through a period when we had two sides at loggerheads—and not just in football. The whole way of life on a college campus has been out of whack. It's been an I'm-right, you're-wrong situation.

"In the last couple of years, there's been a gradual but sure lessening of that. We're learning to listen to each other. In our small world of football, I think the athletes as well as the coaches have learned that the other guy isn't always wrong."

Conflict of Views

Pont recognizes the conflict between his views of a more open sports society and the charges of player dehumanization by tyrannical coaches, the keynote of books written in the last few years by disenchanting athletes like Jack Scott, Dave Meggyesy and Chip Oliver.

"I've read in those books that we develop automatons," Pont said, "that the disciplines we want are old-fashioned, that we should have more 'in-put' from the athletes. I have to ask myself: Does what they say have merit? Do they have anything better to offer?"

"And I've read that athletics can't build character. Now, really, who's kidding who?"

"I'm all for 'in-put' and activism and involvement in causes, but that's not new. I felt the same way at Miami and at Yale, and certainly the players on our '67 Rose Bowl team were aware of what was going on in the world around them. They had their interests and pursued them, and they were anything but automatons. They were unpredictable and in many ways

uninhibited, but they were not an undisciplined group.

"Off the field, they had fun. They enjoyed their college years. But when they were on the football field, they played football.

"I think this is where it all crystallizes—on the field. What a player becomes involved in off the field is up to him, and I'm speaking here of causes, not conduct, because I think that even off the field a player has a moral responsibility to his teammates, his coaches and especially the younger people of his community.

"But, basically, off the field he should be himself and pursue his interests. On the football field, he's part of a team. That's the type of athlete we had on that '67 team, and that's the type I like to coach."

For all of coaching's ups and downs, Pont still loves the life.

"We've just gone through two bad years," he said, "but even in those, you always have a pick-me-up. Sometimes, they're little things.

"I had a call the other day from a teacher in Canada who played football for me 15 years ago at Miami. He called to recommend a sprinter to me because he believes in the young man. To me, it also means that he believes in us as coaches, in what we teach.

"There was a day last spring when I dropped my children off at school, and a teacher made a point of coming up to tell me that Mike Helzman, our safetyman last year, was the best student-teacher she had ever worked with.

Earned Degree

"At graduation, I saw one of our players who had thought about quitting school two years before because his buddies back home had jobs and money in their pockets. I saw that young man leave here with a degree and a good job in a leading company. I saw another player who wanted to play pro football; he got cut before the first practice because of a high school injury, but he shook off that disappointment and moved right into an excellent job.

"This is all a part of coaching—the circle of friends you make and the honest feeling you get that you helped a young man realize a little bit more about himself so that, when he left, he was better prepared to stand on his own two feet and handle the pressures of today's society. Things aren't going to be good all the time, but maybe as coaches we can help our athletes to be a little bit more resolute with their basic beliefs.

"I wonder what Jack Scott would offer as a substitute for that."

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TODAY'S GAME

Louisiana Tech won its eighth straight last weekend by beating state rival, Southwestern Louisiana, 21-0. This marks the first time since 1994 that a Bulldog team has won eight straight during the course of a season.

The Bulldogs will bring a 10-game win streak into today's game. Their last loss was 24-20 to Southern Mississippi near the tail end of last season. Tech's only other loss last year was 29-22 to McNeese of Louisiana.

Tech is only one of four undefeated college division teams left this season — the others are the University of Delaware (7-0), University of Massachusetts (6-0) and Ashland of Ohio (8-0).

Tech is looking for its first undefeated regular season since 1931 and following today's game the Bulldogs have games left with Eastern Michigan and Northeastern Louisiana. The Bulldogs have already wrapped up the Southland Conference title with a 5-0 mark. Last year Tech tied for the conference title with Trinity, Tex., and Lamar Tech of Texas, all having 4-1 Records. Coach Maxie Lambright has brought Tech three conference titles in the last four years counting this year and two post-season bowl appearances.

Tech quarterback Denny Duron has completed 75 of 152 passes for 1,309 yards and eight scores. He's been intercepted just six times. Bulldog defensive backs, John Causey (8) and Larry Griffin (7) have picked off 15 passes between them this fall. The Tech defense picked off nine passes in a 35-14 win over Texas-Arlington, Fullback Roland Harper has rushed for 404 yards (5.6 ave) and four TD's while halfback Glenn Berteau has picked up 377 yards (4.4 ave) and scored seven TD's. Split receiver Roger Carr has caught 31 passes for 797 yards and five scores. Tech's balanced offense has picked up a total of 358 yards a game — 182 rushing and 176 passing.

Against the California State University-Northridge Matadors last week the NAU defense gave up just 137 yards rushing for their best effort since the second game of the season when California State University-San Francisco managed to gain 136 paces.

Offensively, NAU running back Tom Rogers gained 129 yards in 16 carries against the Matadors to push his season total to 464 yards for a 5.7 average. Rogers scores NAU's second TD last Saturday then ran the winning two-point conversion. NAU has now converted four-of-six two pointers this fall.

NEXT OPPONENTS: Next week NAU will be in Honolulu to take on once-defeated University of Hawaii. The Rainbows are now 5-1 after having lost last week, 34-2, to the University of Tennessee. Tech will be at home to meet Eastern Michigan, a team the Bulldogs beat 14-3 last fall in the Pioneer Bowl. Eastern Michigan is 4-3 after beating New Mexico Highlands last week, 30-6.

TOUGHNESS BAROMETER: Last week nine of NAU's 11 opponents drew votes in the AP or UPI college division polls. Only Northridge and San Francisco failed to get votes! Also, just three of NAU's 1972 opponents are below the .500 level after last week's action. Three of this fall's opponents are in the running for post-season bowl appearances — Louisiana Tech, North Dakota State and Trinity, Texas. This year's NAU schedule represents 18 post-season bowl games over the last six years.

Some 5,000 fans, the largest crowd to watch a track and field meet in Arizona, jammed NAU's Lumberjack Stadium to watch the Olympians.

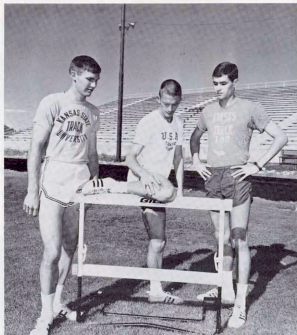

Ryun, Young and Nightingale trained almost all summer at Flagstaff to prepare for Mexico City's 7,500 feet altitude.

It was rubbing elbows with such great track and field performers that stimulated track and field and cross country interest across the northern part of the state and gave a tremendous boost to these programs at Northern Arizona University.

With this meet, NAU and Flagstaff made virtually every sports section in major newspapers across the nation. Flagstaff merchants and civic leaders worked long hours to make this event become a reality.

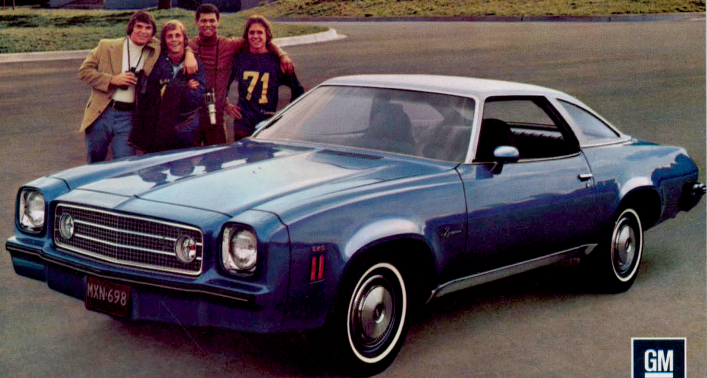

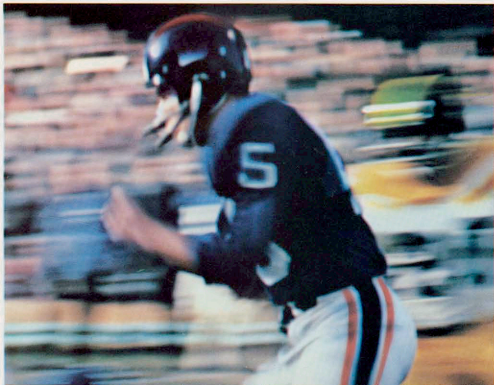

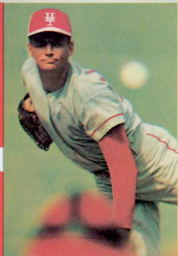

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LOUISIANA TECH UNIVERSITY

Like so many other phases of American life, the world of higher education is undergoing a wide-spread period of transition at this point in history.

While long term wisdom holds fast to the valuable traditions of time, universities throughout the nation must also reach out to meet the inquisitive demands of a younger generation striving for answers.

Louisiana Tech University, nestled beautifully within the rolling pine-tree studded hills of north Louisiana, fits perfectly into this mold of a successful modern-day educational facility.

Steeped in tradition dating back to 1894 when its doors were first opened, this ambitious 76-year-old also is busy thinking young as it continues to progress steadily toward even greater functional heights.

There are more than 8,000 students now using the Ruston campus where originally less than 200 trod.

Some 2,000 students yearly are now earning degrees at Tech, the college which awarded its first such degree in 1897 to Harry Howard for whom the school auditorium is named.

First founded as Louisiana Industrial Institute, the name was changed in 1921 to Louisiana Polytechnic Institute and that title was kept for 49 years until it became Louisiana Tech University in 1970.

The first Alumni Association group was organized 74 years ago in the summer of 1897 and the first football team was fielded in 1901.

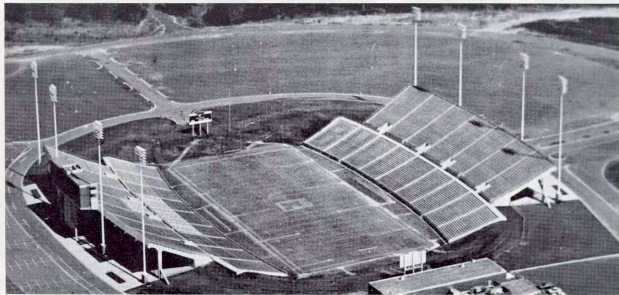
Changes and improvements have been continual at Tech as the school keeps stride with the academic world. Even now the most impressive building project in school history is nearing completion — the 16-story Charles Wyly Tower of Learning.

The Tower, set for completion this December, will house classrooms, administration offices and provides an extensive expansion of the present Tech library which is adjacent to the new building.

Also completed recently was a \$2 million multi-purpose education complex that includes the A. E. Phillips Elementary School building, laboratories for art, music, science and mathematics, classrooms, a planetarium and playgrounds.

And, one of Tech's most prized and envied new possessions is the expanded athletic complex that was completed last year.

The beautifully landscaped complex greets those entering the University campus from I-20. Carved out of a towering red-clay bluff and rimmed on three sides by pine-oak forest, Tech's classic 23,318-seat football stadium stands out as the heart of the complex.

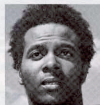

Visitors to Northern Arizona University this weekend will have ample opportunity to see examples of the school's many contributions to community life.

One of the most important contributions is a dynamic program of theatre, a program ultimately serving a triple purpose.

The first production of University Theatre's 1972-73 season will be presented at 8:15 p.m., Friday and Saturday, in the handsome Creative Arts Theatre. It is Henrik Ibsen's "A Doll's House", a classic social realism drama.

"A Doll's House" stars Brian Driscoll, of Phoenix, and Kristi Ahlers, of Tucson, and is directed by Dr. Richard Harris.

The production is NAU's 1972-73 entry in the American College Theatre Festival national competition and has a strong tradition of excellence to match.

Dr. Clifford White, chairman of NAU's Speech and Theatre Department can point with pride to last year's production of Tennessee Williams' "The Night of the Iguana", directed by Bill J. Foster, which went to the regional finals of the competition. In previous years, "The Lark" and "Viet Rock" both received recognition in the nationwide contest.

"A Doll's House" opens a theatre season marked by variety.

In December, Foster will direct "Cabaret", starring Brenda Royal and Ken Knoell. In the spring, he will direct a childrens' theatre production of "The Little Mermaid".

The final production of the year will see Harris direct the classic Greek drama, "Alcestis", by Euripedes.

The theatre program ultimately serves a triple purpose.

First is education. Students in plays are not there strictly for fun. They learn theatre crafts they may use professionally or pass on to others, as teachers of the future.

The second function is enrichment of the total educational experience. Good theatre is a vital part of creating the educated man and woman and University Theatre provides such opportunities.

The final function is enrichment of the cultural life of Flagstaff. Without NAU, the city would have little, if any, "legitimate" theatre.

Today's University Theatre is a far cry from when plays were chosen for simplicity and ease of production. Such plays as "The Miracle Worker", "War and Peace", a delightful childrens' adaptation of the great Mark Twain novel "Tom Sawyer", and others are ample evidence of the quality growth at the school with the campus in the pines.
