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
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

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

San Francisco State — now with University status — is coached by Vic Rowen, who led the 'Gators to five Far West titles in the Mid-1960's. In 1967 the Gators made it to the Camellia Bowl, only to lose 28-7 to potent San Diego State. Since then, they have been trying to relocate the winning formula.

Both of tonight's teams lost season-openers last week. San Francisco fell 37-6 to the University of Nevada at Reno and NAU, despite the AXers outgaining their foe, lost a most frustrating 14-7 contest to No. 9 rated (UPI) North Dakota State University.

The Axers would like to win big tonight, giving them confidence for the Big Sky opener next week (Sept. 23) at the University of Montana.

Fans can look for a more polished offense and a better over-all performance tonight, including better punt coverage. But of course, the defense, led by Tom Rangsey, Steve Combs and Shannon Lewis left little to be desired. Soitt Free, who replaced All Big Sky middle line-backer Bo Boetther this year, will be heard from, pleanty, this fall. He was nominated as NAU's defensive player of the week for Big Sky honors and the offensive nomination went to running back Willie Perry. Game captains this week will be Perry and linebacker Joe Hernander.

NEXT FOES: Next week NAU will be on the road to meet Montana in a Big Sky game and San Francisco State will host California State University at Northridge, a team NAU will meet October 28.

BIG SKY PLAYERS OF THE WEEK: Tom Ramsey, 6-5, 248-pound senior defensive tackle and Scott Free, 5-10, 200-pound senior middlel linebacker were selected as co-linemen of the week in the Big Sky Conference for their top-notch play last week against North Dakota State—each was in on 20 tackles and the mighty Bison had just three first downs in the final half!

RECALLING PAST ATHLETIC FEATS

Last season, NAU's cross country program beared its first fruit.

In six years, cross country at NAU has gone from "something to do" to a nationally recognized program under the tutelage of head coach Leo "Red" Haberlack.

Last fall NAU and the University of Montana tied for the Big Sky title and finished ninth in the NCAA University Division meet at the University of Tennessee.

Richard Sliney, two-time individual champ in the Big Sky will be after his third title this fall when NAU is host to the conference meet Saturday November 11th at the Village of Oak Creek, south of Sedona.

Strong supporting efforts will come from Richard

Selby, Dave Tocheri and Dan Sauers, all veterans. Sophomores expecting help NAU include Greg Sawyer and Neil Howk while top freshmen include Mickey Glaser and Cruz Truillo.

The remainder of the 1972 NAU home schedule will include Arizona State University of September 30th and the NAU Invitational which will be held October 21st at the Village of Oak Creek.

Besides last year's ninth place finish in the NCAA meet, NAU placed seventh in the 1967 NAIA national met when Tocheri and Sliney finished 6th and 7th respectively. Last year Sliney was 6th and year before last he was 12th in the NCAA meet.

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A PROFILE OF SAN FRANCISCO STATE UNIVERSITY

San Francisco State University today is an institution of higher learning, indigenous to the Bay Region it serves, conditioned to the times in which it functions.

The lively student body of more than 18,000 with faculty roster of approximately 1,100 members comprise an academic community which is vital, creative and continually searching for new ways to achieve its goals.

Through-out its history the University has been a meeting place for students of diverse cultures and backgrounds, a focal point for these from both the metropolitan and the more distant areas, a site of instruction which is hospitable and accessible to all who are qualified to enter.

San Francisco State University still in the process of expansion, now has 20 modern structures on a gentle slope rolling toward Lake Merced. The majority of the buildings are clustered around a grassy, tree-studded quadrangle.

Included is the five-story Psychology-Air Science structure, the massive Library with extensive additional construction rising (more than 315,000 volumes and approximately 3,000 periodical subscriptions are contained in the open stacks); a vast college of Creative Arts complex with drama, music and broadcasting facilities equal to any in the nation; and extensive by equipped Arts and Industries building; a large Education ediffice; science laboratories and classrooms, including an eight story. Life Science structure new to the campus.

Others include a student health center to accommodate all medical needs of students; a paid of six-story residence halls along with the new fifteen-story Verducci Hall which provides housing to students; a striking bookstore; a University Commons with four separate dining rooms; a sk-level parking garage; athletic recreational areas, including the 6,500-seat Cox Stadium; and a modern demonstration elementary school fittingly named, in honor of the University's first President, Dr. Frederic Burk.

Football at San Francisco State University has been well above the average.

The Golden Gators have always been one of the top teams in the Far West Conference. Their 1967 team composed an outstanding 9-2 record and set many national records, including the 45 touchdown passes thrown by Larry "Holy" Toldeo. That year the Gators lost to college division national champ, San Diego State University in the Camellia Bowl.



THE GREAT METEOR CRATER

Between Flagstaff and Winslow, on highway 66, lies the world's best-preserved impact-collision crater. The 570-foot deep crater was formed some 22,000 years ago and today it is studied by astronauts before journeys to the moon, earth scientists and by public school students.



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Non-science majors at Northern Arizona University who are enrolled in Geology 101 are going through a unique learning experience.

The class is designed for students majoring in other fields and an auto-tutorial laboratory permits the student to learn at his own rate.

Located on both the North and South Academic Centers at NAU, the laboratory sessions are taped and keyed to a color slide presentation. While listening and watching, samples, like those being shown on the slides are available to students to pick up, examine and do experiments with.

Students learn about minerals, erosion caused by water and ice, maps and fossils. Besides eight laboratory experiments and lessons, four field trips are taken in small groups so the student can get all of the assistance he might need from the instructor.

The design of the class is with the keeping of NAU's philosophy --- keeping the classes small so individualized instruction can be given when needed.

Dr. Gus Cotera, chairman of the Geology Department at NAU, devised the unique laboratory with the assistance of a \$12,000 National Science Foundation grant. For more than 10 years Cotera had thought about preparing such a lab and now it's a reality.

Geology labs were accepted by the students with a so-so attitude until this new approach became operational and more than 90 percent of the students are now beaming their approval whereas 50 percent before was considered good.

Students ideas are implemented where they are of benefit and Cotera and his staff always listen closely to student comments.

In many universities such labs relegate the student to becoming a number --- however, at NAU, the only numbers found are on the mineral samples.
