

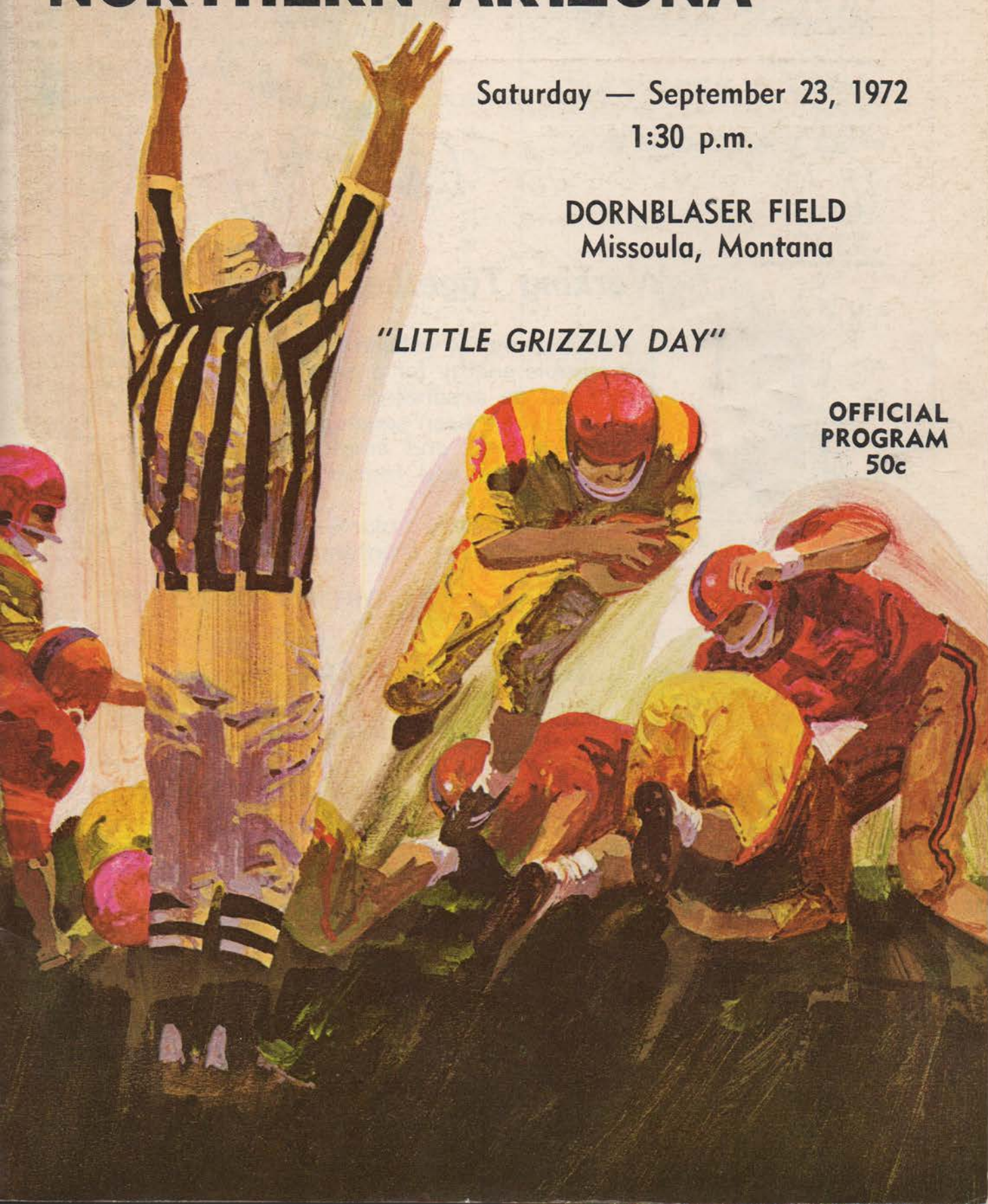

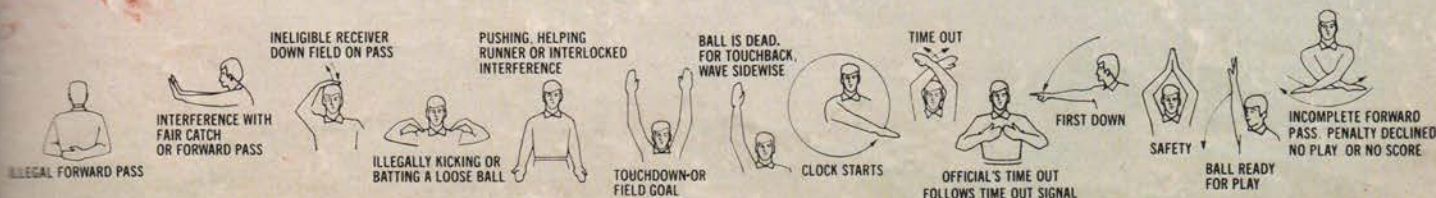

## NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

Northern Arizona University was established in 1899 with a total of 23 students. It has passed through various growth phases over the years. The institution's total enrollment is expected to reach over 9,300 this fall.

The University, fully accredited, offers a broad, liberal arts education through its Colleges of Arts and Science, Education, Business Administration, Creative Arts, Engineering, its Schools of Forestry, and Applied Science and Technology, its College of Public and Environmental Service, and its Graduate College.

Located near the center of Flagstaff on Northern Arizona's 6,800-foot-high Coconino Plateau, the University's 677-acre, tree-shaded campus is noted for its green beauty. It sprawls in the shadow of the 12,800-foot San Francisco Peaks and within the Coconino National Forest, the largest stand of majestic Ponderosa pine in the world.

The man who has guided Northern Arizona University during the past 15 years--a period by far its greatest growth--is Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup. This dynamic administrator has been associated with the University for 24 years.

During the past decade the University has experienced phenomenal growth in enrollment and in importance to the educational system of Arizona. And, with that growth the concept of maintaining a close relationship between faculty and student (a personal university) has become more and more difficult to maintain.

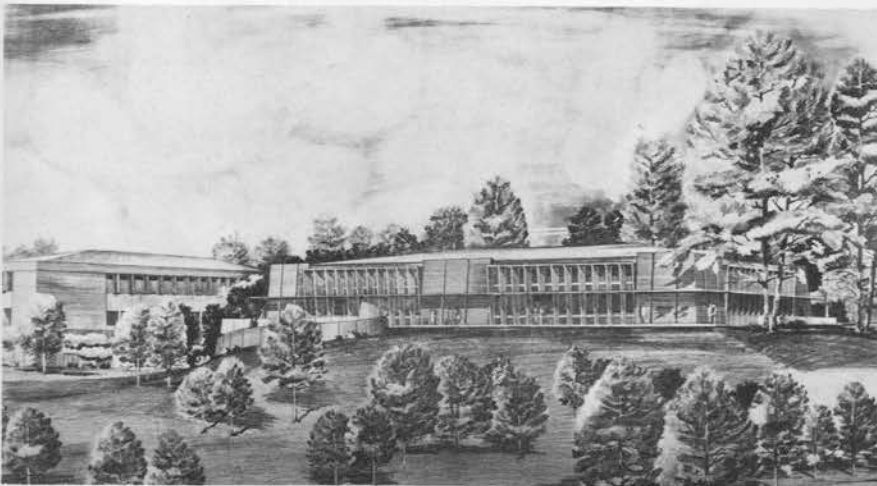
More than nine years ago and anticipating the growth that was to come, President Walkup and a committee of faculty members and administrative aides initiated the "Academic Center" concept to the university's particular need of maintaining that "personal university."

The first phase of the Center of Northern Arizona University became a reality a year ago. The 90-acre South center is approximately 1/4 mile from the North campus and is made up of nine buildings constructed at a cost of more than \$10 million. A tenth building is currently under construction.

Each Center is virtually a self-contained community under its Provost, and will also be an integral part of the University and will function under policies set by the University president.

The present campus is stabilized at about 8,400 students, and future growth and physical growth will be on the South Center.

A total of 14 buildings is planned for the new Center, that will, by 1976 at the latest, serve 4,000 students pursuing academic programs in the areas of Liberal Arts, Business Administration and Engineering and Technology.

## Head Football Coach Ed Peasley

A tradition of winning was brought to the Northern Arizona University campus when Edward E. Peasley, formerly Stanford University linebacker coach, took over the head coaching reins in 1971.



Championship football teams have been Peasley's bag, both playing and coaching, for the best part of the past 20 years.

Peasley has been associated with four Rose Bowl teams, three times as a coach and once as a player. He was an outstanding lineman on the University of Washington team which compiled a 9-1 regular season record, losing only to Southern California 22-15, and then went on to beat Wisconsin 44-8 in the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1, 1960.

He was a student assistant coach at Washington in the 1960-61 season and watched the Huskies trim Minnesota 17-7 in the Rose Bowl after another 9-1 season when their only loss was a non-conference squeaker 15-14 to Navy.

Peasley was line and end coach when the Washington team dropped a Rose Bowl decision to Illinois, also 17-7, on Jan. 1, 1964. They lost their first three games of the season on their way to a 6-4 record, but came back strong to win the Pacific 8 crown.

In 1966 the new NAU mentor moved to Stanford as line coach and during 1970 he served as linebacker coach and saw his charges hold the potent Ohio State University team to 17 points while their team mates were scoring 27 to again emerge victorious in a Rose Bowl classic.

He has revived a program which saw the Lumberjacks of NAU win only two games in 1970 and come through with a 5-5 record in 1971. Peasley can lead the Lumberjacks no way but up in Big Sky Conference standings during the 1972 season.

Peasley, 37, is a Menodota, Ill., native and graduated from high school there where he was a three-year letterman in football, basketball and track. In 1955-56 he was a member of the 11th Naval championship team as a Camp Pendleton Marine. He then attended Compton College where he was a JC All-American on the championship team which played in the Junior Rose Bowl.

He was a three-year letterman at the University of Washington from 1957 through 1959 before taking up his coaching career.

Peasley is married, and he and his wife Eleanor have two daughters, ages 8 and 9.
