



NCAA Reorganizes Itself into Three Divisions

Some folks think the National Collegiate Athletic Association's reorganization into three divisions is much like ordering from a menu in a Chinese restaurant—with One you get football; or with Two you may choose one from Division I.

Actually, the NCAA remains the same—only the names have been changed.

The Constitution remains a single document, applicable to all members. The reorganization allows for each division to adopt amendments to the Bylaws applicable only to that specific division without the approval of any other division.

Each NCAA member institution will select its division through self-determination, except in the sport of football, in which Division I membership will consist of those 126 institutions currently classified as "major" by the Football Statistics and Classification Committee.

Self-determination is a key phrase. Many think that Division I membership is restricted to those 126 "major" teams. However, an institution may classify itself Division I in all sports other than football. Fordham University would be a prime example. Its program, except football, is Division I. Its football team is classified Division.

To Each His Own

The members of each division may establish criteria for membership in that division subsequent to self-determination.

An institution in Division II or III may elect to participate in Division I in one sport, other than football or in one sport, other than football or Division I By a must abide by the Division I By a membership rests in another division. There are numerous other examples, also, and it's possible that some institutions could compete in all three divisions in different sports. An institution's football team could be classified Division III, it could self-determine Division II for its overall program, and still choose Division I for one sport.

No matter what division an institution competes in, it will have a much better opportunity to compete in a National Collegiate Championship

The NCAA will sponsor a minimum of 39 National Championships by the 1975-76 year with at least 10 Championships in each of the three divisions.

Each of the three divisions will have National Championship competition in the sports of baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and field and wres-

In addition, Divisions II and III will have a National Championship tournament in football.

Gymnastics and lacrosse championships will be sponsored in Divisions II and II and members of Division III will be eligible for the Division II

championship in these sports.
In individual events, certain place winners from Division II and III championships who meet the qualifying standards will be eligible to coming such individuals have met all academic and eligibility requirements of Division I, including academic standards for initial participation. Movement Possible

An institution may change its division membership by petitioning the NCAA Council if it meets the established criteria for membership in the division it wishes to be transferred to.

The Council itself will be restructured to give each division represen-

The Council will retain its 16-member make-up, but each NCAA District shall have a vice-president and eight vice-presidents will be elected at-large.

Among the 16 vice-presidents, eight

Among the 16 vice-presidents, eight will be from Division I members and four each will come from Divisions II and III. The president and secretarytreasurer will be ex officio members of the Council, as they currently are, and they may be elected from any division.

The Executive Committee will also be restructured with five members being elected from Division I and three from Divisions II and III with each division being represented by at least one member.

All standing committees of the NCAA will be evaluated with a view towards providing representation to each division where appropriate. Specifically, each of the three divisions shall be represented on all rules committees. This will be accomplished. Convention in January in San Francisco, where the implementing legislation will be presented.

Texas Lutheran's Bulldogs brings a 2-3 record into today's encounter against Northern Arizona University, 1-3.

The Bulldogs, rated as one of the top independent college football teams in Texas, have had an up and down early season.

Coach Jim Wacker's crew comes into the game off a 17-6 loss to Prairie View A & M Saturday, in Prairie View's homecoming. TLC opened the season by falling to Howard Payne, 28-7, and

Southwest Texas, 21-0, but came back to defeat State College of Arkansas 21-0, and Trinity University 21-0.

The Bulldogs broke loose for 277 yards and three touchdowns in the second half of the trinity game.

Fullback David Wehmeyer leads the Bulldog offense, as he has rushed for just under 400 yards in the first four games. He had compiled 2000 plus yards rushing over the past two and one half seasons. He is complemented in the backfeld by tailback Gary Dworaczyk and flanker Russ Gartha.

The Bulldogs have averaged 202 yards rushing and 74 yards passing per game, with opponents' totals 154 rushing and 159 passing. Gaylon Tucker and Felipe McDonald have shared the quarter-backing duties for the Dogs.

Northern Arizona comes into the game off a 37-7 loss at the hands of powerful Louisiana Tech last Saturday. The Lumberjacks have also lost to North Dakota State, 36-7, and Weber State, 25-13, and have beaten Montana, 14-10.

The Axers will be led into the game by quarterback Dave Mendez, the leading passer in the Big Sky Conference, and 5-5 tailback Jimmy Smith, who rushed for 142 yards against Montana. most of it coming on hurling runs up the middle.



Its 101-acre campus on the western edge of Seguin (pronounced Sa-Geen) is nestled in the Gudadiupe River basin of south central Texas. Only minutes away is the metropolitan city-of San Antonio (750,000). Founded as Walnut Springs in 1838, the settlement was later renamed to honor Juan N. Seguin, a distinguished Mexican-Texan who served in Sam Houston's army.

Seguin (16,000 population) produces a wide variety of goods, including bumpers, insulation, brick, structural steel, fiberglass cloth, flour, meat products, ditching machinery, furniture, uniforms, and poultry and bakery products.

TLC is fully accredited and offers the B.A., B.S., and B. Mus Ed., degrees. A student may select from 23 majors, and pre-professional programs are available in dentistry, medicine, engineering, law, nursing, and the ministry.

A number of special course sequence programs are offered in social work, oceanography, speech therapy, ecology, and journalism. Eighteen subject areas are approved for preparation in secondary education.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION GAINS NATIONALLY

Northern Arizona University's "Industrial Education Campus" covers the entire state. NAU has two Trade and Industry teachers based in Phoenix and from this, courses are taught all over the state for both pre-service and inservice industrial educators.

For many years, NAU has been recognized as a leader in Industrial Education and its services, because of this, are high in demand. For instance, his fall 16 classes are being taught off campus because of the demand—eight in Phoenix, five in Tucson, two at Fort Huagchuca and one in Tempe.

"Qualified contract teachers are used for all courses plus we involve many educators from the Trades and Industry field," mentioned Dr. Robert Wooldridge, chairman of industrial education at NAU.

The Industrial Education program at NAU is offered through the School of Applied Science and Technology and majors are provided with the opportunity of earning a degree in Industrial Arts Education with emphasis in one of the eight areas—Parting; Electricity-Electronics, Metals Processing, Power Transportation, Woods Processing, Manual Arts Therapy and Multiple Activities.

Service classes are provided for Interior Design majors in Home Economics as well as Engineering Technology in the areas of drafting and design.

COMMUNITY COLLEGES

NAU's Industrial Education program is one of many which the University works closely with to help Junior College transfers to fit into the mainstream locally and not lose credits. This Two-Plus-Two program also has provisions for persons wishing to work for a couple of years in between their college years to gain practical experience.

Under the work-study method, a student can complete a technical specialty, work a while then return to school and earn a degree. This degree can be in teacher education or simply to upgrade the individual's employment possibilities.

JOBS GO UNFILLED

Last year NAU could have placed some 80 more flower flowartied Education teachers than it had actual graduates. Currently, there are some 60 jobs still available. NAU and 50 graduates slast spring—32 undergraduate and 17 with masters and all are working. Since 1967, NAU has graduated 199 students with backlor degrees in Industrial Education while 144 have earned master degrees and three the educational gigegialst.

GRADUATE DEGREES

NAU offers graduate degrees in Industrial Education and a newly developed mastry' degree in Vocational Education. The latter degree is designed to need the needs of people in all areas of Vocational Education and is a combined effort of the Industrial Education and is a combined effort of the Industrial Education and Home Economics Departments within the School of Applied Science and Technology as well as the College of Business.






