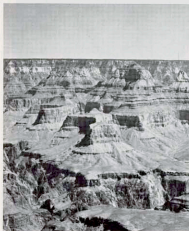

## NCAA Sponsors 33 National Championships

The 1973-74 intercollegiate athletic season will mark the first time in history that the NCAA will hold national championships in three divisions. In addition to the first-ever championships in National Collegiate Division III, the coming season also marks the 90th anniversary of the



National Collegiate Tennis Championship. This is the oldest National Collegiate Championship contested. It was held for the first time in 1923.

Two other firsts will occur in 1973-74. The NCAA will crown its first football champions in Divisions I and III, and lacrosse will be contested for a national championship in Division II for the first time.

The new divisional make-up of the Association, which was established at a Special Convention in August 1973, will increase in number the more than 7,500 student-athletes who now compete annually in NCAA-sponsored events. Through the years, over 6,100 competitors representing 234 institutions have earned the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion." Following is the month-by-month schedule of NCAA championships which are slated for 1973-74.

## TODAY'S GAME

This week's game should be another well matched contest for the Lumberjacks, as both of the previous home games have turned out to be.

The California State-Northridge Matadors bring a 1-5 record into today's game while NAU now stands 2-4. The Axers lost to Boise State, the No. 4 team in the country, last week, 21-6 while the Matadors were shut-out by Nevada-Reno, 48-0.

Northridge will be out to avenge the 15-14 loss handed them by the Lumberjacks in California last year. They will also be out to even the series between the two schools which NAU leads 2-1.

And if the past performance of this Axer team is any indication, the Mom and Dad's Day crowd can expect an exciting game.

In their first home game, Homecoming, the Lumberjacks pulled out a 14-10 Big Sky Conference victory over the University of Montana with a Dave Mendez (16) touchdown pass to Rick Wilson (17) with just 43 seconds remaining in the game.

And two weeks ago against Texas Lutheran, Jimmy Smith, the 5-5 running back transfer from the University of Missouri, rushed for 200 yards in setting school records for points (24) and touchdowns (4) in a single game.

Mendez was injured in practice the week before the Texas Lutheran game, and didn't suit up for the contest, but last week he came off the bench to complete 5 of 18 passes for 82 yards in relief of sophomore Wheatie Tavernetti. He should be near full capacity today.

NAU HIGHLIGHTS: Jimmy Smith (22) NAU's outstanding 5-5 tailback continues to lead the Big Sky Conference in rushing with his 96-yard per game average.

Smith and Mendez, NAU quarterback, have both ranked in the top 10 nationally in rushing and passing respectively this fall. Wheatie Tavernetti (12) who has spelled the injured Mendez at quarterback the last two games has made an appearance in Big Sky states as the 7th best passer in the made an appearance in the Big Sky states as the 7th best passer in the conference. Mendez is third.

NEXT WEEK: Next week NAU will close out its home season by hosting the defending Big Sky Conference champ, Montana State. Going into this weekend's action, the Bobcats are 5-2 on the year and stand 3-1 in the conference, good enough for second place. This weekend Montana is playing the University of Idaho.

Dwight W. Patterson, Mesa rancher who earned his bachelor of arts degree from Northern Arizona University (then Arizona State Teachers College) in 1934, was presented with 1973 NAU Alumni Association's Distinguished Citizen Award this morning at the Honors Convocation by Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup, president of NAU.

Mr. Patterson, a long-time state civic leader, was the recipient of the NAU Alumni Service Award in 1965. His interest in serving his Alma Mater, state and community has long been evident.

He is President of the Maricopa Community College Board as well as the Federal Land Bank Loan Association. He also serves as vice-chairman of the Arizona Water Conservation Board, the Mesa Parks Board, the Arizona Wool Growers Board and of Valley Forward. He was recently re-elected to another term on the Maricopa Community College Board, a mark of his distinct leadership.

Mr. Patterson is also a former chairman of the Arizona State Planning and Building Commission, former President of the Arizona School Board Association and a former vice chairman of the Arizona Power Authority.

While a student at NAU, Mr. Patterson participated in athletics, served as a student body officer and was a member of the tradition-keeping Chain Gang organization. An avid sports fan, he served as a football and basketball referee for 20 years and was president of the Central Arizona Officials Association. He was a founder and former "Chief" of the Hohokams, a branch of the Mesa Chamber of Commerce which is interested in sports and they were a prime mover in bringing the major league Chicago Cubs to Mesa to spring training.

## CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY NORTHRIIDGE

In the fall of 1966, the San Fernando Valley campus of the Los Angeles State College of Applied Arts and Sciences (Now California State University-Los Angeles) was established on the present site in Northridge.

Soon, the California State Legislature passed Assembly Bill No. 975 which provided for the San Fernando campus to become San Fernando Valley State College on July 1, 1968.

Over the following 12 years the School has experienced tremendous growth and today has 350 acres. During this rapid growth period, 12 new major buildings were erected and faculty size increased from 104 to 800 and student enrollment jumped from 3,300 to more than 24,000. By the fall of 1976 the enrollment figures are estimated to reach the 32,000 mark.

During the 12-year growth span, the number of fields in which a bachelor degree could be obtained jumped from 16 to 37 and the area of master degree study was increased from 9 to 20.

### MATADOR ATHLETICS

California State University-Northridge maintains a 12-sport intercollegiate program. Heading the Matador program is Dr. Glen Arnett who participated in Arizona High School Athletics at Mesa High from 1927-31. Assistant Director of Athletics, Dr. Sam Wittingham coached at Phoenix Union High where he compiled a 59-37-2 football mark and a 58-5 record in wrestling.

Wittingham was head football coach of the Matadors when they spoiled NAU's Homecoming in 1968 with a cone-foss-behind 21-20 win. Since launching its football program in the fall of 1962, CSUN's Matadors have had three winning seasons and participated in the 1967 Little Rose Bowl game against West Texas State University.

A year ago quarterback Don Gray led the Matadors to a 6-5 record—all five losses added up to just EIGHT POINTS! A trio of one-point losses combined with a two-point setback and a three-point loss, wrecked what could have been a great season.

The Matadors lost 15-14 to NAU 11-10 to nationally ranked California Poly of San Luis Obispo. They also lost 36-32 to Cal State Long Beach.

Gray ranked among the national leaders in total offense last fall as he passed for 1,702 yards and picked up an additional 744 rushing for a total of 2,447 yards which ranked his fourth nationally.

## RADIOLOGY TECHNOLOGY IS A WIDE-OPEN FIELD

Northern Arizona University's Radiology Technology Program to train X-ray technicians is interested in several things but two of the bigger ones are (1) giving the students a quality education and (2) adequately preparing them for a wide-open field.

At NAU students enrolled in the Radiology program receive the fundamentals and techniques of X-ray with a general college education.

After the completion of the second year, students will have the subject material, art and skills necessary to qualify for the American Registry Examination and a job in the \$8-10,000 dollar range. If the student decides to remain in school and obtain a bachelor of science degree, he then opens himself up for a job in the \$9-12,000 salary range. The B.S., degree also qualifies a student to teach X-ray at the junior college or senior college level as only 2-percent of the X-ray technologists across the nation today hold a four-year degree.

Also, those extra two years in college would be the equivalent of 10-15 years of on-the-job experience, according to Tom Baier, head of the

X-ray program at NAU. Baier earned his A.A. from Broome Tech Community College in New York and his B.S. from Medical College of Georgia. He is assisted by Jerry Cummings, a graduate of the University of Nevada of Las Vegas.

Each fall, NAU's program, now in its second year, will admit 20 new students. This figure for first-year students is restricted to permit them the opportunity of working in hospitals and picking up valuable summer training. There is no limit to transfers coming in as juniors because they all generally have had this training at another school.

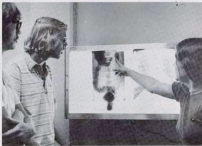
Radiologists have the opportunity of going to work in industry, government, public service, institutions and education among others.

The opportunities for the graduate of the Radiology program today are unlimited and the job chances are extremely high says Baier.

NAU's new Radiology Technology program is providing a big need for trained personnel in today's widely specialized medical field.
