



Like NAU, the 'Cats do it on the ground'. The Conference's second leading rusher, tailback Wayne Edwards (34) paces the ground game with 637 yards. Quarterback Mike Dunbar (14) has rushed for 327 yards while fullback Don Bagley (31) has picked up 392 yards. Sub quarterback Mike Holder (18) has picked up 302 yards while reserve tailback Steve Kracher

has gained 282 yards. But MSU's outstanding ball player has to be defensive tackle (77) Bill Kollar, who stands 6.4 and weighs 251. He's being coveted by many pro-

Kollar and his defensive mates' main job will be to stop NAU's "Littlest Axer" 5-6 Jimmy Smith. All Jimmy did last week was to break the Big Sky and school single game rushing marks and establish a new one-season rushing mark at NAU.

He netted 322 yards on 27 carries to run his campaign total to 898 yardsmaking him a sure bet to go over 1.000 yards. He is now averaging 128.3

The Lumberiacks, 304 overall and 102 in the Big Sky, also rely on Dave Mendez' (16) dependable arm. Rick Wilson's (17) receiving a good offensive

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
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



MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY

Montana State University is a multi-purpose institution offering programs in the liberal arts, professional areas education, engineering, the basic sciences and agriculture. There are six separate colleges, Course work may be pursued toward the bachelor's degree in 44 curricula, the master's decree in 31 and the doctorate in 19. The enrollment of 8,000 students allows for closer student

faculty relations than are possible at larger universities. The university is large enough to offer a variety of established academic programs and yet small enough to insure each student the individual attention and academic counseling that are so important in achieving a meaningful college education.

The location and setting of the university provide a unique atmosphere that offers unlimited opportunities for combining academics and recreation into an individualized educational experience for each student. The 1,170-acre campus is composed of more than 40 major buildings. Northern Arizona University is unique in its approach to higher education. While most universities and colleges expand their campus by building more facilities on the already exiting one, NAU's President, J. Lawrence Walkup, saw the need some 10 years ago for an entirely separate campus to handle the responsibility of educating vauro secole.

About four years ago a construction period began to develop the South Academic Center into an independent community. Eight buildings were completed in the first stage: the Liberal Arts, Administration and Science buildings; the Library, Dormitory, Heating Plant, Student Holion, and Cafeteria.

The total \$11,676,399 cost of the South Center classroom buildings (excluding the dormitory and heating plant) is very reasonable when one considers that the cost per square foot is between \$27 and \$48, compared to about \$45 average, said Pres. Walkup. These buildings provide about 420,000 square feet of usable

"We are very proud of this low figure, especially today when people are so conscious of the cost of education," said Walkup. "The South Academic Center provides one of the most attractive settings for education in the nation."

President Walkup is to be praised for his foresight and planning and for perpetuating Northern Arizona University's image: 'To become educated is to become more human."

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
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
