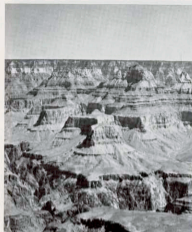

## TODAY'S GAME

Montana State's Bobcats will be seeking to stay alive in the Big Sky Conference race today as they visit Northern Arizona University's Lumberjacks.

The "Cats are 4-1 in league play, with their lone loss, 27-17, to league leading Boise State. MSU has a win today to keep a mathematical chance for a share of the title, with Boise (5-0) winding up next week at Idaho State.

The Bobcats, since dropping their second and third games of the year to North Dakota State (34-17) and Boise, have simply been devastating! Their current five-game win streak has the Bobcats outscoring the opposition 182-48. They stand 6-2 on the year.

Like NAU, the "Cats do it on the ground." The Conference's second leading rusher, tailback Wayne Edwards (34) paces the ground game with 637 yards. Quarterback Mike Dunbar (14) has rushed for 327 yards while fullback Don Bagley (31) has picked up 302 yards. Sub quarterback Mike Holder (18) has picked up 302 yards while reserve tailback Steve Kracher has gained 282 yards.

But MSU's outstanding ball player has to be defensive tackle (77) Bill Kollar, who stands 6-4 and weighs 251. He's being coveted by many pro scouts. He earned second-team All-America a year ago.

Kollar and his defense mates' main job will be to stop NAU's "Littest Ace!" 5-6 Jimmy Smith. All Jimmy did last week was to break the Big Sky and school single game rushing marks and establish a new one-season rushing mark at NAU.

He netted 322 yards on 27 carries to run his campaign total to 898 yards—making him a sure bet to go over 1,000 yards. He is now averaging 128.3 yards a game and should hit the "grand" mark today.

The Lumberjacks, 304 overall and 102 in the Big Sky, also rely on Dave Mender (16) dependable arm, Rick Wilson's (17) receiving, a good offensive line and their "rubber band" defense.

Today's contest marks the final home game for 17 Auer seniors—including five from Arizona. They include fullback Jim Bullard (46), defensive end Keno Flores (86), place kicker Gary Galati (13), offensive guard Tom Sanford (80), defensive tackle Eric Schrader (80), corner back John Carroll (11), tailback Willie Perry (38), defensive back Al Gilpin (27), defensive back Dave Howard (25), corner back Ed Jones (14), linebacker Vic Boniolo (30), linebacker Bob Chandler (45), fullback Randy Carter (33), Smith and Wilson and two players whose careers have been cut by knee injuries—quarterback Chip Ellwanger and linebacker Phil Hildebrand.

## LUMBERJACK MEMORIES

I don't remember exactly when I saw my first Lumberjack football game. I do remember my father took me to Skidmore Field—roughly the area of Peterson and Balbitt Halls these days—and we sat in wooden bleachers that could have given you splinters in amazing places. Ever since that day, I've felt a certain loyalty to Lumberjack blue and gold that has never diminished.

Over the years, it's been a privilege to watch some great Lumberjacks in action and to be proud of these men as they left NAU and went on to other pursuits in life. In the late 1940's, I can remember Vince Cisterna, Mr. Everything for a Lumberjack team trying to rebuild after the dark years of World War II. Cisterna, now a highly successful school administrator in Sierra Vista, was nominally an end. Before a game was over, you could almost be sure he's be in more than one position on the team.

He climaxed his football career with an appearance in the East-West Shrine game, in San Francisco, the first Arizona player to be so honored, and he styled Notre Dame's Legendary Leon Hart.

Another great Lumberjack of about the same era has become an abiding personal friend.

Emil G. Nasser was an all-conference lineman and team captain for the Axers. When he finished his collegiate career, he turned down a shot at the pro ranks and decided, instead, on a coaching career, to begin in a town called Cochow.

Almost 300 victories and 27 years later, he's still there, dean of Arizona high school football coaches, a winner and a molder of men without peer. He's a sportswriter's dream come true—in every respect.

I thrill every time I see my friend Russ Tillman on a television screen in the Washington Redskins line-up and the success story of a player named Walt Mannon, when he returns at homecoming to tell it, is the same kind of thrill;

Lumberjack football memories!

I must have a thousand of them, names, faces, numbers. The faces—today Bruce Ivor, Jim Smith, Jim Bullard—join a long procession that have given me countless Saturday afternoons and evenings of pleasure.

They've all gone on to become outstanding citizens, in one way or another, proving my long-standing theory that football—Lumberjack football—is a game that teaches success.

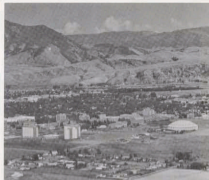
Montana State University is a multi-purpose institution offering programs in the liberal arts, professional areas, education, engineering, the basic sciences and agriculture. There are six separate colleges. Course work may be pursued toward the bachelor's degree in 44 curricula, the master's degree in 31 and the doctorate in 19.

The enrollment of 8,000 students allows for closer student-faculty relations than are possible at larger universities. The university is large enough to offer a variety of established academic programs and yet small enough to insure each student the individual attention and academic counseling that are so important in achieving a meaningful college education.

The location and setting of the university provide a unique atmosphere that offers unlimited opportunities for combining academics and recreation into an individualized educational experience for each student. The 1,170-acre campus is composed of more than 40 major buildings. It is located on the outskirts of Bozeman, a city of 23,000 situated in one of the outstanding scenic and recreation areas of the nation, only 90 miles north of Yellowstone National Park.

As the land-grant institution for the state of Montana, MSU has created an environment of outstanding research effort and adult education services in harmony with its academic instruction. The Engineering Experiment Station, the Cooperative Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station are all parts of the University with the specific function of expanding and diversifying the scope of the University's programs and serving the state and the nation.

Montana State University maintains a comprehensive program of financial assistance for entering freshmen and upperclass students—including scholarships, loans and work-study employment—which is intended to recognize and assist students who otherwise would be unable to continue their educational careers.

## NAU DEDICATES SOUTH ACADEMIC CENTER

Northern Arizona University is unique in its approach to higher education. While most universities and colleges expand their campus by building more facilities on the already existing one, NAU's President, J. Lawrence Walkup, saw the need some 10 years ago for an entirely separate campus to handle the responsibility of educating young people.

About four years ago a construction period began to develop the South Academic Center into an independent community. Eight buildings were completed in the first stage: the Liberal Arts, Administration and Science buildings; the Library, Dormitory, Heating Plant, Student Union, and Cafeteria.

Last month, (October 23), three more South Campus buildings, worth \$5.5 million, were dedicated—the Business Administration building, the Activity Center and the Engineering and Technology building. Still under construction is a 152 unit married student housing complex.

The total \$11,676,399 cost of the South Center classroom buildings (excluding the dormitory and heating plant) is very reasonable when one considers that the cost per square foot is between \$27 and \$48, compared to about \$45 average, said Pres. Walkup. These buildings provide about 420,000 square feet of usable space.

"We are very proud of this low figure, especially today when people are so conscious of the cost of education," said Walkup. "The South Academic Center provides one of the most attractive settings for education in the nation."

President Walkup is to be praised for his foresight and planning and for perpetuating Northern Arizona University's image: "To become educated is to become more human."
