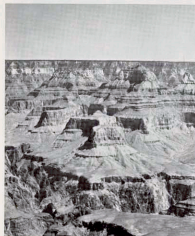

TODAY'S GAME

The University of Montana will be trying to win its first road game in the last 12 tries today when the Grizzlies take the field against Northern Arizona University's Lumberjacks.

Montana's road play is much better than its record indicates as the Grizzlies lost a 21-10 contest last weekend in Houston, Texas to Rice University of the Southwest Conference. Jack Swartout, Montana coach, said that his team played well enough to win against Rice.

NAU also played well enough to win; however, the Lumberjacks have not had any breaks fall on their side of the fence in a long time. Weber beat NAU 25-13 last weekend in Ogden, Utah despite the fact that the Lumberjacks dominated the stats.

Dave Mendez, junior quarterback from Mesa, continues to lead the Big Sky in passing as he has hit on 33 of 51 passes for 320 yards and one score. His glittering .647 completion percentage is also among the best in the nation. Gary Galati kicked the third longest field goal in Big Sky history last week against Weber—a 55-yarder. The record of 59 yards is jointly held by Jan Stenerud of the Kansas City Chiefs and Joe Petrone, former Idaho State player. Stenerud played at Montana State.

Montana's wishbone attack hasn't quite jelled and is averaging just 244 yards a game—164 rushing and 80 passing. However, Montana's rugged defense is the best in the Big Sky and is permitting just 237 yards a game. Rice managed just 221 yards last weekend—106 rushing and 115 passing.

AXER NOTES: Jimmy Smith continues to lead NAU's rushing game with a 68-yard per game average. Willie Perry and Jim Bullard are now over the 40-yard a game average. Kenny Allen's nine pass receptions is tops in that category while Rick Wilson and Smith each have caught six passes. Rich Carlberg and Rocky Loyce each have five receptions.

NEXT GAME: NAU will journey to Ruston, Louisiana to meet nationally rated Louisiana Tech University. That game will be aired locally, live, over KCLS (600) with airtime at 5:45 p.m. and kickoff at 6 p.m.

NEXT HOME GAME: NAU will host Texas Lutheran at 1:30 p.m. on Oct. 13. The Bulldogs are one of the top independent teams in Texas.

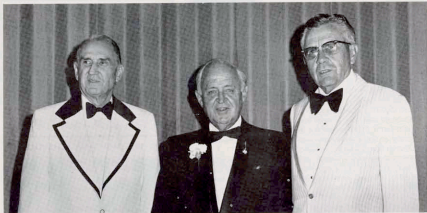

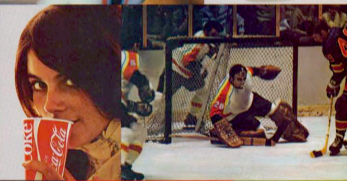

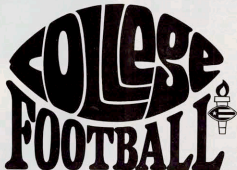

When Wesley (Wes) Brown, Jr., started the police science program at Northern Arizona University in 1959 with 43 students, he expected the department to grow.

Well! This fall, the department has mushroomed to 632 students and four full-time instructors plus five other part-time instructors. The program's enrollment this fall is a hearty 20 percent over what it was this time last fall.

The need and demand for well-trained police officers all across the nation is creating the increasing need for these graduates. NAU graduated 59 seniors last May and all of those wanting to go to work immediately had a job—in fact, many had several offers.

Outstanding pay and job opportunities are two reasons people are looking seriously at police work as a career. NAU graduates can think in terms of around \$10,000 in starting pay according to Brown. The Los Angeles Police Department starting pay is \$13,200 for a college graduate and some government agencies pay a bonus of up to \$1,200 if a student graduates in the upper 10 percent of his class.

Junior colleges are increasing their police science curriculums across the nation and many bachelor degree students are getting offers as teachers. In Arizona, there are police science programs in 10 junior colleges—Arizona Western, Central, Cochise, Eastern, Glendale, Mesa, Phoenix College, Pima, Scottsdale and Yavapai.

Many departments across the nation will now only accept college graduates—even for beginning jobs. The scientific work required today by policemen is generally learned in college which means they are ready to roll up their sleeves and go to work once they are on the job.

NAU's department is well equipped with such things as the polygraph, stereo and medical microscopes, finger printing and study equipment, document comparison, ballistic microscope and camera, investigative and recording devices as well as many instruments to help weigh evidence and its importance to a particular case. Soon to be added is a psychological stress evaluator which determines truthfulness from the tone of a voice.

A wide range of specialized courses are offered and just this past summer 118 students from all over the Southwest came to NAU to participate in two five-week "Delinquency Control Institutes."

NAU graduates have been highly successful as patrolmen, officers, FBI agents, Secret Service agents, Internal Revenue agents and other U.S. departments. Two Navajo graduates of NAU's programs—Larry Smith and Mike Nez have become the first U.S. Marshall and FBI agent, respectively, in the nation's history. Dave Cahill, former NAU star football player and pro star is now an FBI agent while George Herman, also, a former NAU football star and pro player is with the Arizona State Correctional Board. Police Science is within the School of Applied Science and Technology at NAU, under Dr. Chester Ainsworth, dean.
