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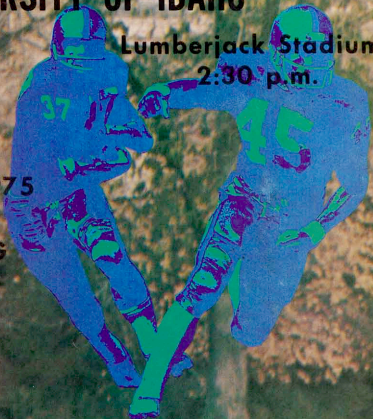

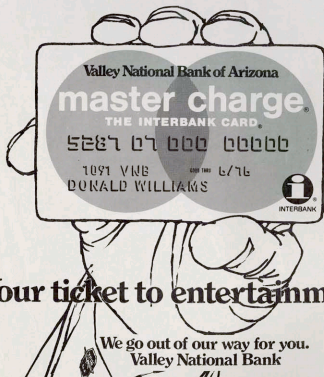

PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

A significant factor in the growth of Northern Arizona University has been the dynamic leadership provided by Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup who is starting his 18th year as the university's president.

NAU had 1,342 students and the campus consisted of 18 buildings on 162 acres when Dr. Walkup was named president in 1957. Today, NAU's enrollment is 10,600 and there are 62 buildings on 686 acres.

Dr. Walkup came to NAU in 1948 as director of the University Elementary School then two years later he became head of the Education Department, the same as the Dean of the College of Education, and within a few months, he was elevated to dean of instruction and in 1955 he was named dean of the university.

A man of many interests, Dr. Walkup has been a teacher, coach and administrator during his long and distinguished career in education. He has been a leader in community activities, particularly in the development of cultural aspects.

Dr. Walkup holds the bachelor of science degree from Central Missouri State University and the master and doctoral degrees in education from the University of Missouri.

Throughout his career at NAU, Dr. Walkup has maintained an enthusiastic interest in the fortunes of Lumberjack athletic teams and his strong support and encouragement has been a key factor in the growth and development of the NAU athletic program.

Dr. Walkup's wife, Lucy, is a former teacher.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

T.H. "Hank" Anderson is now in his second full year as Northern Arizona University's director of athletics and the Lumberjack athletic program has started to be noticed. The previous two years, NAU was last in the All Sports Trophy race in The Big Sky and this past year the Asers vaulted into third place.

Before coming to NAU, Anderson spent two years as head basketball coach at Montana State and prior to that, he was head basketball coach and director of athletics at Gonzaga University for 21 years. He was a key member of the organizational force behind the formulation of the Big Sky Conference.

The hard-working Anderson ranked in the Top 10 in the nation for most career basketball wins with 318 when he gave up coaching to become NAU's Director of Athletics. Anderson was Big Sky Conference basketball coach of the year in 1962 and his Gonzaga teams shared the league title in 1965-66 and again in 1966-67.

Anderson earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon in 1941 and he earned his master's degree from Gonzaga in 1965. Before going to Gonzaga, Anderson's high school teams at three Oregon high schools -- Grants Pass, Baker and Medford -- had 167 wins against only 43 setbacks. Anderson's teams at the high school and collegiate level were always well drilled and fundamentally sound. His 1973-74 Montana State team defeated his alma mater, Oregon, just two weeks before the Ducks topped mighty UCLA.

A charter member of the Basketball Hall of Fame, Anderson is frequently sought out by coaches for his advice on a variety of situations from coaches from several different sports.

From 1968-72 Anderson served as director of the Greater Spokane Sports Association which is operated through the Chamber of Commerce. During his coaching years at Gonzaga, he coached three Helms Foundation All-America Basketball players.

He got his 300th collegiate win in 1973 as his Montana State team beat arch rival the University of Montana, 70-65.

Anderson and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five children, four of whom are grown and one daughter, Elizabeth, who is 19, and is a student at Flagstaff High School.



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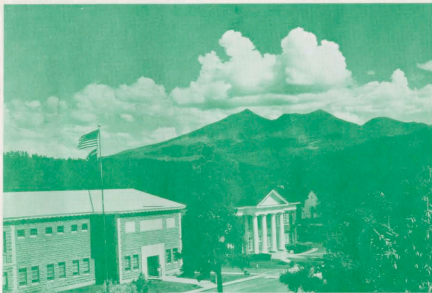
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NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Last year Northern Arizona University celebrated its 75th anniversary. Northern Arizona Normal School was founded in 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 49th state of the union in 1912.

This year is Flagstaff's 99th birthday. Pioneers traveling through the area in 1876 skinned a tall ponderosa pine tree for a "flag staff" to celebrate the nation's 100th birthday on July 4th.

NAU opened its doors to 23 students in 1899 and this fall, more than 10,600 are enrolled.

NAU acquired university status in the spring of 1966 and before that the university had gone through a series of name changes with its growth and development. The first name was Northern Arizona Normal School, then came Northern Arizona State Teachers College March 6, 1925.

The third change came July 1, 1929 when the institution became Arizona State Teachers College at Flagstaff then came Arizona State College at Flagstaff on July 1, 1963 and that name remained until March 1, 1966 when the name was changed to NAU.

Sincere concern for the development of the student as an individual has long been NAU's philosophy.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on Northern Arizona's 6,800-foot high Coconino plateau and the University's 686-acre tree-shaded campus is known for its beauty. The campus lies in the shadows of the 12,000-foot San Francisco Peaks, the highest point in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which contains the largest stands of Ponderosa Pine in the world.

Over the past 10 years, NAU has experienced rapid growth and the quality of education has also grown. The man providing the leadership during this growth stage has been Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup, who is now in his 18th year as president. Dr. Walkup has been associated with NAU for 28 years and was named president in 1957.

More than 76 percent of NAU's faculty have the earned doctoral degree, which ranks the university among the top three in the nation.

NAU offers students a wide range of majors -- from accounting to zoology. Students can select from 112 major programs as well as a wide range of minor programs. NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctoral degree.

NAU offers its degree programs through the colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the Schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The Graduate College administers all advanced studies.

Centrally located, NAU students are near some of the most spectacular scenery in the world. America's astronauts trained throughout Northern Arizona, the back side of the moon was mapped by the U.S. Geological Survey in Flagstaff and Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered in Flagstaff, at Lowell Observatory.

LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

In nine years as head coach at the University of South Dakota, Joe Salem transformed a losing program into a winner. Now in his first year as head coach at Northern Arizona University, the hard-working Salem has started to lay a solid foundation under the Lumberjack football program.

Salem's USD teams won 29 of their last 37 games before he departed for NAU and over the past three seasons, his teams tied for the North Central Conference crown.

Four of Salem's nine USD teams were nationally ranked in the top 15 in the nation and his best seasons were 9-7 finishes in 1968 and 1972. He also serves as offensive coordinator.

As a player, Salem was a quarterback on the University of Minnesota team in 1959 when the Golden Gophers won Big 10 and national championships. He keyed several Minnesota rallies during that big 1959 season. Following his playing days, Salem was backfield coach for five years at Minnesota before moving to South Dakota.

Salem, 37, was selected as District 6 Coach of the Year in 1972 by the American Football Coaches' Association and he was south Dakota Collegiate Coach of the Year in 1968.

Since arriving at NAU, Salem and his tireless staff have worked hard at establishing solid public relations with coaches in Arizona. This past season NAU landed several top players from within the state.

Salem and his wife, Sue, have four sons, Tim, 13, Wade, 11 and six-year old twins Brad and Brent.

DAN RUNKLE is the veteran assistant on Joe Salem's staff. Runkle, 29, is in his fourth year as defensive coordinator, having served that capacity at South Dakota for three years. He also coaches the defensive ends and linebackers. He earned 10 letters during his collegiate days at Illinois College -- four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. Runkle was an end in football and a forward in basketball. Runkle served as coordinator of scouting for the University of Utah. Runkle and his wife, Jackie, are the parents of a five-year old son, Tad.

DICK HEESCH is the man who teaches the blocking skills to NAU's offensive line. Heesch, 34, is in his second year of college coaching as he was line coach at South Dakota last season. He was head coach at Central High in Sioux City, Iowa for four years then moved to West High in Sioux City for two years before going to USD. He was an all-conference end at Huron College. Heesch is a captain in the Arizona National Guard. Heesch and his wife, Rita, are the parents of four daughters, Robin, 10, Julie, 7, Susan, 4; and Kristie, 2.

LONNIE ROGERS, a former halfback at the University of Iowa, is the defensive backfield coach at Northern Arizona University. Rogers is in his second year as a member of Salem's staff, having served in the same capacity last fall at the University of South Dakota. He has also coached at Morrisingside College and Upper Iowa University. He played in the Blue-Gray Classic and in the Canadian League at Winnipeg. He holds the puntling record of 83-yards at Iowa. Rogers and his wife, Judy, are the parents of two children, Michelle, 7; and Jeff, 5.

JERRY JANSON will handle the interior defensive line for NAU this fall. His prime work will be with the tackles and middle guards. Janson, 25, is the line backer on the NAU staff and he came from the University of South Dakota where he was defensive line coach a year ago. He spent the 1972-73 seasons as a graduate assistant at Ohio State where he worked with the national champion Buckeyes. Janson graduated from Carthage College in Wisconsin where he played football, basketball and baseball.

JOE GLENN, a graduate of the University of South Dakota, will be the offensive backfield coach at NAU this fall. Last fall the 26-year old Glenn was a graduate assistant at USD. Glenn played quarterback and wide receiver for Salem at USD before serving a two-year stint in the US Army during the 1971-72 seasons where he coached and played football and basketball. He was captain of the 1970 USD team where he set a record for most receptions in a season. Glenn and his wife, Michelle, are the parents of a two-year old daughter, Erin.

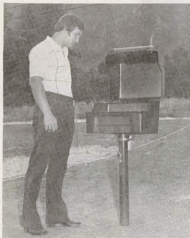

DON BEACHUM, 5-10, 165, JR, DB (strong corner), CLOVIS, N.M. --- A two-year starter at Arizona Western JC. Had a good spring and is counted on to be a starter this fall.

CHUCK APT, 6-2, 186, SR, DB, IOLA, KANSAS --- After a fourth varsity letter started last spring and was in on 54 tackles in nine games. Ended spring drills as top strong safety.

PAUL BERLIN, 6-4, 198, SR, TE, OAKLAND, CALIF. --- Earned starting tight end spot in spring ball. Good blocker, good hands, should have solid senior year. Played at Laney JC.

MIKE BAIL, 6-4, 236, SO, DT, PAGE, ARIZ. --- Redshirted last fall after transferring from the University of New Mexico. Earned starting job in spring drills. Could be top defender for NAU the next three years.

RANDY BERRY, 6-0, 182, SO, QB, ARVADA, COLO. --- Was redshirted last fall after starting injury in fall drills. Lettered as freshman and earned starting quarterback job in spring drills. Led Arvada West (Colo.) to 39 wins in a row. Was star of 1973 Colorado prep All-Star game.

JIM BAKER, 5-10, 210, SR, FB, GLOBE, ARIZ. --- A high school teammate of Abel's at Globe High. Played two years at Mesa, Ariz., JC. Rushed for 41 years last fall. Didn't have a very good spring; needs to improve but has potential.

DAVID BRYANT, 6-2, 225, JR, MG, NYACK, N.Y. --- A two-year starter at Lakewood Union, JC. Ended spring drills as top middle guard. Ran a 4.75 40-yard dash and could develop into the top middle guard in the Big Sky.

RANDY FERRELL, 5-10, 182, SR, DB (weak safety), SAN BERNARDINO, CALIF. --- Had good spring practice, was starter last fall and led team in kickoff returns and was second in Big Sky in KO returns, returning 24 kicks for 560 yards. Set school and Big Sky records with 100-yarder against Drake. Was in on 47 tackles last fall and had 11 pass deflections. Could be a real key for NAU this fall.

RICH CARLBERG, 6-1, 195, SR, SE, BENSON, ARIZ. --- Moved to tight end in spring drills. A very good receiver who earned All-State football and basketball at Benson High. Will see action at tight end and wide receiver.

LARRY FRIEDRICH, 6-2, 221, SO, OG, ARLINGTON HEIGHTS, ILL. --- Very good blocker. Had one spring and last fall as a frosh, he didn't miss a single offensive down. Could develop into one of the top Big Sky offensive linemen.

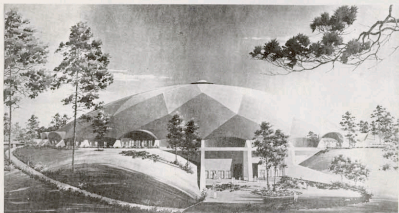

TODAY'S GAME

This is supposed to be the year the University of Idaho contends for the Big Sky Conference title. But the Vandals will have to tighten up a leaky defense, especially against the run, to reverse last year's 2-8-1 rebuilding season under then first year head coach Ed Travel.

The 1974 Vandals were last in the Big Sky in rushing defense, total defense and passing offense while operating out of the veer "T" offense and the 5-2 defense. UI was third in the Big Sky race with a 2-2-1 record, but had the league's worst over all mark and went 0-6 against non-conference opponents.

Senior quarterback Dave Comstock (14) engineers the veer "T" with senior tight end Steve Duncanson (82) his favorite passing target and senior fullback J.C. Chaband (44) the primary running threat.

Both Chaband and Duncanson were first team all Big Sky last year and the 6-0, 200-pound fullback is expected to become only the third rusher in Vandal history to gain more than 1,000 yards in a single season.

UI opened its season last week with a 23-6 loss to Arkansas State University if Jonesboro, allowing three TD's on the ground. Chaband's five-yard run was the lone Vandal score.

NAU is 29-2-2 in Homecoming contests and 1-0 for the year under new head coach Joe Salem after last week's 34-30 conquest of California Collegiate Athletic Association favorite Cal-Riverside.

Today's game, besides being the Lumberjacks' Homecoming, marks a number of firsts: The first time the two teams have played in football, the first conference game of the '75 season, and Salem's inaugural game as a Big Sky coach. Obviously each coach would like to get a jump on the other schools in pursuit of the elusive league title.

The schedule doesn't get any easier for the Vandals in the next five weeks. They open the home season next weekend against surprisingly powerful Idaho State, return to Arizona the following weekend to face Arizona State, dedicate the new Kibbe Dome against defending Big Sky champion Boise State Oct. 11, travel to dangerous Missoula to play the University of Montana the next week where Travel's son, Van, is the starting quarterback, head West to face highly respected University of Nevada-Las Vegas, and finally get back to Missoula to host conference co-favorite Montana State.

NEXT NAU GAMES: The Lumberjacks are on the road the coming two weeks to play Cal-Poly of Pomona and Conference opponent Idaho State Oct. 4, respectively. Pomona whipped Cal State Chico 38-3 last week and features a quarterback line nicknamed "The Pfankenstein line." Idaho State opened the '75 season with a 16-3 victory over Western Athletic Conference foe University of Wyoming. The Jacks return home Oct. 18 to face Eastern Montana, a 26-0 loss to Colorado College last week.

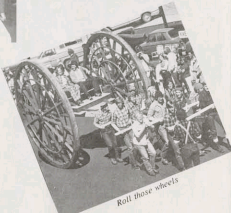

THE UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO

The University of Idaho, located in Moscow, Idaho just a scant stone's throw from the Washington State line in northwest Idaho, opened its doors for the first time in 1889 with six students and this fall more than 7,300 students.

Academically, all of the University's colleges coordinate their programs sufficiently to assure the emergence of well qualified professional programs in any of 130 areas. The graduate school offers master degree programs in 63 areas as well as doctoral programs in 20 areas.

Idaho's campus is growing as attested by the construction of new buildings for the College of Law, the Performing Arts Center, a 12-story dormitory, the College of Education, an ultra modern swimming complex, an 18-hole golf course, a new nine-lane track facility, a College of Forestry and phase one of Idaho's new domed stadium.

Phase two of the domed stadium, Kibbe Dome, was completed this summer and the facility holds 23,000 for football.

The University of Idaho is a charter member of the Big Sky Conference and Vandal athletic teams have laid claim to an outright football title in 1971 while tying for the gridiron championship in 1965 with Weber State and again in 1968 with Weber and Montana State. The Vandals claimed cross country crowns in 1963 and 1965.

This fall begins the 82nd year of intercollegiate football at Idaho. The Vandals first football play came in 1893 against the Spokane (Wash.) Athletic Club and the result was an 8-8 tie. The first collegiate action came a year later in a 10-0 loss to Washington State.

Idaho and Washington State have met 73 times in football and WSU holds a commanding 56-14 edge and three games have ended in ties. Idaho and WSU use to have a unique twist to their rivalry as if the visiting team lost, on the road, they had to walk home --- a distance of eight miles.

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ON FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL



BIG SKY CONFERENCE OUTLOOK

Boise State University is the odds-on favorite to wait to a third consecutive Big Sky Conference football championship and beyond the Boise Broncos, it looks like a wild scramble and almost anyone could finish in the top three with a few breaks and the avoidance of key injury.

Montana State has finished second to Boise the past two years. In 1972, Montana State vaulted from last place in the Big Sky to first place in one game and they didn't lose a game. Idaho, Idaho State, Montana, Weber and NAU could rise to the occasion on any Saturday and surprise someone. The Big Sky is perhaps the finest football conference in the nation as proven by the number of conference players making All-America, playing in post-season All Star games and then playing professional football.

BOISE STATE: (10-2 and 1-0) In seven years as a head coach at Boise State, Tony Krupar has compiled a 62-17 mark and he has the talent on hand to lead the Big Sky which includes two titles and a second place finish in the last four years. Quarterback Leo Hays (48 of 130 for 677 yards) has big shoes to fill from the departed Jim McMillan, the nation's top Division II quarterback last fall. Running back John Smith who led the conference in scoring with 17 TD's starts as the top two receivers, Mike Holten (46 receptions for 1,080 yards and 13 TD's) and John Crabtree (60 catches for 621 yards and six scores). A rugged offensive front and a sound defense also await Boise fans.

MONTANA STATE: (7-3 and 4-2) Since his arrival at his alma mater five years ago, coach Sonny Holland has produced a 31-18-1 mark, which includes a conference crown and two runner-up spots. Concentrating on Montana State, the MSU Bulldogs have built a solid program in which a large number of experienced and talented players are now returning each season.

Steve Krueher was the Big Sky's top rusher last fall, picking up 1,098 yards, to finish almost 300 yards ahead of the second effort of J.C. Chubbard of Idaho (758). Part-time starting quarterback Mike Holder-408 yards through the air and 15 TD passes returns as dove split end Brian Flagg who caught 31 passes for 536 yards and six scores. Plinekicker Pat Bolton who has 174 points of his "right leg" in the Big Sky.

IDAHO: (2-8-1 and 2-3-1) With the new 25,000 seat Kibbie Dome in use this fall, great interest in Vandal football should develop in this second-year head coach Ed Troell has a big and talented team. The Vandals, the only Division II football team in the Big Sky plays a hefty schedule and if they can survive the wear and tear, they could be a definite factor in the conference race.

Fullback J.C. Chubbard, the second leading rusher in the Big Sky with 758 yards promises to make the Vandal "veer"-effective. Tight end Steve Duncanson who caught 17 passes for 275 yards last fall is a staunch blocker with a dirty pair of hands. The offensive line is almost intact headed by 6-5 center John Yarno and tackles John Adams and Will Overgaard.

NORTHERN ARIZONA: (3-6-0 and 2-3-0) Northern Arizona University is starting its sixth year in the Big Sky Conference and on hand to lead the Azona is dynamic Joe Sauer who spent nine years as head coach at the University of South Dakota before coming to NAU.

Just 14 seniors are on hand and there are more freshmen than upper classmen, so NAU is in phase one of a major rebuilding cycle. The progress of the youngsters plays the absence of key injuries will just about dictate the success the Azona have this season.

It's been since 1969 that NAU enjoyed a winning season and that year NAU was 7-and-3 and nationally in the polls. Key players include senior tackle Charlie Brunck, senior defensive back Randy Ferrell, senior tight end Paul Berlin, sophomore guard Larry Ruffalo, senior linebackers Mike Mangieri, Don Rowell and junior fullback Jerry Wallace. A hefty schedule also awaits NAU. Last NAU one for 79-79, 1970, 46-43 and more than a third of those losses were incurred by teams.

MONTANA: (3-6-1 and 2-3-1) Jack Swarthout, dean of the Big Sky football coaches, starts his ninth year and he hopes to return his Grizzlies to the form of the early 1970's when a pair

of undefeated seasons brought two conference crowns and two Camellia Bowl bids. Greg Anderson, the national NCAA Division II champ in kickoff and punt returns offers a definite threat every time he touches the football as he scored five times last fall, two punts on each punt and kickoffs, and once on a pass interception return. He averaged 23.5 yards on kickoffs and 20.2 on punts.

Defensive tackles Doug Betters, 6-5, 230 and Dan Argo, 6-2, 235, should be tough to run against and the pivot of the Grizzly line will center Ron Leback, Halback Del Spear, who he can avoid injury, should be a positive factor in the Montana wishbone attack. Montana quarterback Van Troel is the son of Idaho's head coach, Ed Troell, so that Oct. 18 meeting in Missoula should be interesting.

IDAHO STATE: (5-5 and 2-4) Injury has wrecked Idaho State the past two seasons and fourth-year coach Bob Griffin, one of the top persuasive coaches in collegiate circles, hopes to have the depth and team balance this fall to make up for lost time.

The Bengals won four of their last five games last fall and most of the talent that led that surge. A rugged early schedule which includes Wyoming, Nevada-Las Vegas and Idaho will be a factor and if a quick early start is forthcoming, the rest of the Big Sky could be in trouble. Sophomore Steve Tschuch who led three of the ISU wins last fall as a frosh, is back. He completed 44 of 104 attempts for 803 yards and five scores. With 35 letterman back, ISU's strong point appears to be defense and during the final five games, the Bengal defenders were the best in the Big Sky.

WEBER STATE: (4-7 and 1-5) Despite its last-place finish in the Big Sky, Weber had second-place finisher Montana State, 28-10, in a game the Wildcats completely dominated. Several close defeats prevented a winning season — a 21-20 loss to NAU and a 10-8 loss to Idaho State.

Third-year coach Dick Gains feels his rebuilding is over and a favorable home slate, seven home games which includes four of six Big Sky games, gives the Wildcats some room to talk.

With 28 lettermen on hand and eight blue-chip transfers and a couple of solid redshirts, Weber could move back into the spotlight in the conference. Redshirt quarterback Bob Martin, redshirt kicker Dan Morelli promise much excitement. The team strength will lie in the running backs and receivers headed by all conference-running back Chad Creadwell who gained 705 yards last fall, five vets return on the offensive line while six are back on the defensive front.

BIG SKY CONFERENCE: The Big Sky will be in its 13th year of operation this fall and conference teams have been involved in eight post-season appearances in the last 12 years. Annually, Big Sky teams rank high in the national rankings and this fall should be no exception to that rule.

Rugged non-conference slates again on tap as Big Sky teams will meet teams from the Pac-9, Western Athletic Conference, Mid-America Conference, the Southland Conference as well as some top independent teams.

More than 50 former Big Sky football players were in pro camps this summer and many of them will be playing before national TV audiences this fall.

NATIONAL LEADERS: The Big Sky Conference led in four of the seven individual categories last fall and in three of the eight in team stats kept by the NCAA.

Individual leaders were Idaho's quarterback Jim McMillan who led in passing with 19.2 completions per game and 33 TD passes as well as total offense with 310.1 yards a game. Montana's Greg Anderson led in kickoff returns and punt returns with averages of 33.5 and 20.2, respectively. In team stats, Boise led the nation in total offense with 316.8 yards per game, in passing with 334.5 yards per cent and in scoring with 44.6 per cent.

Despite the loss of some key personnel on offense and defense, Boise State University is the odds-on favorite to claim a third consecutive Big Sky football title this fall.

Boise lost its defensive starback and five on offense and the wide-open Bronco attack offensively will, however, be boosted with the return of running back John Shaw, the Big Sky's top scorer last fall plus the top two receivers Mike Helton and John Chubbert.

Leo Marx, a 6-1, 211-pound senior quarterback who hit on 49 of 90 passes last fall for 617 yards and 12 scores will apparently inherit Jim McMillan's old job. McMillan averaged 110 yards total offense a game last fall.

Coach Tony Knapp's Broncos scored 71 TD's last fall, more than double the 35 scored by Montana State who was in second place in conference scoring last fall. Boise averaged 46.6 points a game as rank as the top NCAA Division II scorer last fall.

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

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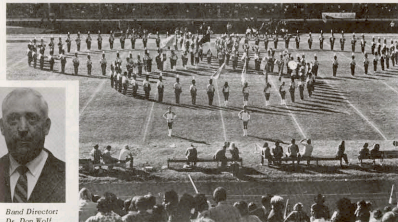
