

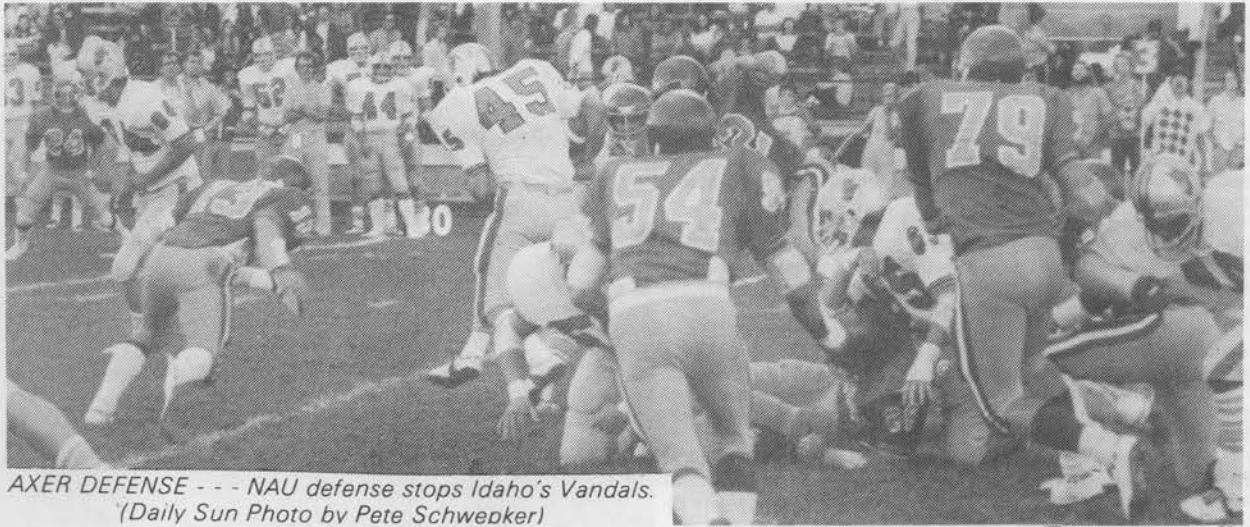

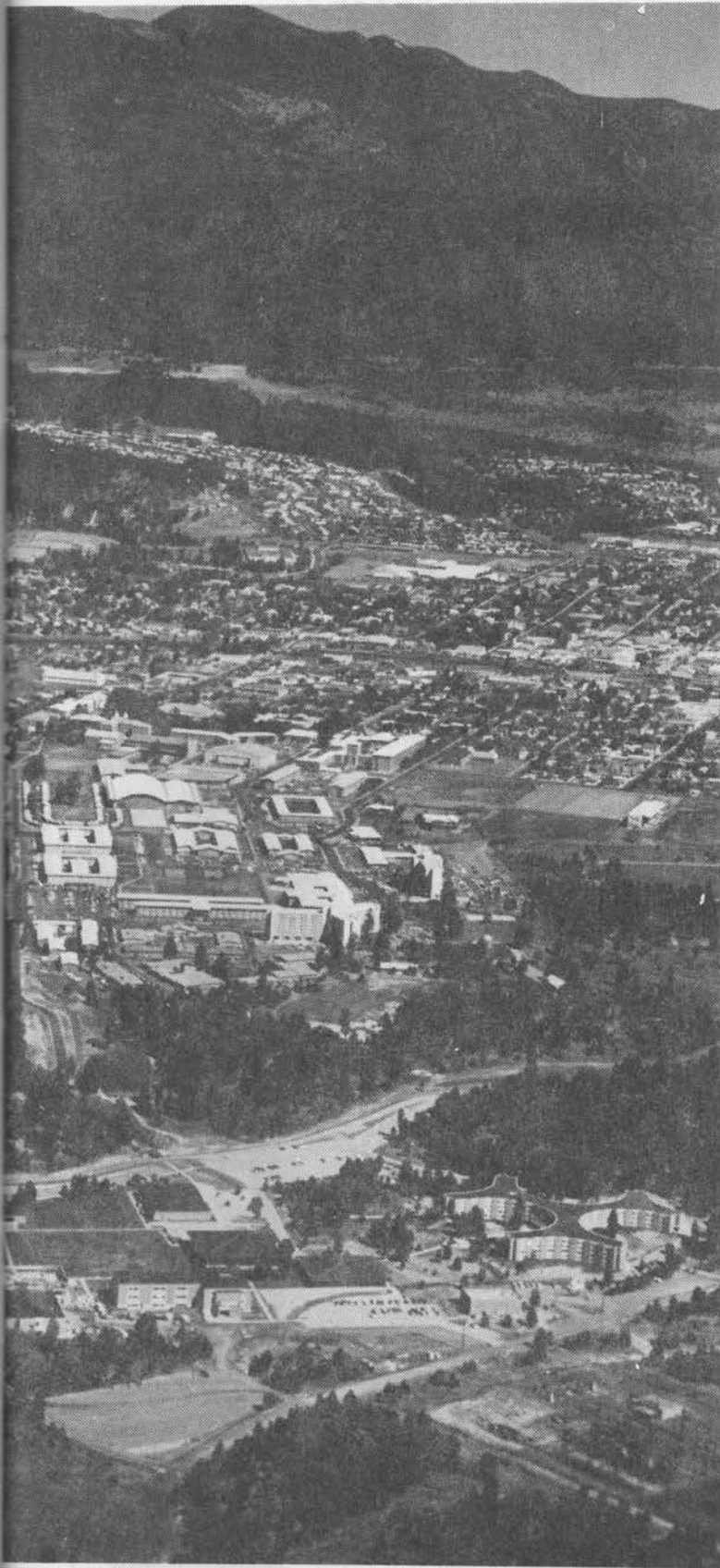

NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



As the nation celebrates its 200th birthday this bi-centennial year, the City of Flagstaff has been busily celebrating its 100th birthday.

When pioneers in their covered wagons were passing through the majestic pine tree covered Northland in 1876, they stopped over on July 4th, skinned a tall Ponderosa Pine and used that as their "flag staff" to run up a flag and celebrate the nation's 100th birthday.

Northern Arizona University first opened its doors in the fall of 1899 to 23 students and this was some 13 years before the Arizona territory was admitted as the 48th State of the United States on Feb. 14, 1912.

Over the last two decades NAU has enjoyed a steady growth and that growth continues today as the university strives to meet the needs of citizens not only in Arizona but throughout the entire nation.

Although NAU's enrollment is more than 80 percent Arizonans, students come from virtually every state as well as many foreign nations.

This past May NAU celebrated its 10th year as a full-fledged university and the institution has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School which covered the 1899-1925 era. The second name was Northern Arizona State Teacher's College and the third change came in 1929 when the institution became Arizona State Teacher's College at Flagstaff and that lasted until 1945 when the next-to-last name was Arizona State College at Flagstaff.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 76 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world. Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

Joe Salem is wasting no time in putting a solid foundation under the football program at Northern Arizona University.

The pesonable and hard-working Salem and his staff have had two solid recruiting years and have brought some quality student-athletes on campus. The first wave of freshmen went through the program last year and as many as 11 freshmen started and last year's frosh, as a group, had a sound 2.7 grade point average (4.0) is perfect and several made the dean's list.

Strong academic counseling and the insistance that his football players work steadily toward a college degree has been Salem's philosophy all 10 years as a head coach --- nine at South Dakota and one at NAU.

In nine years at South Dakota, all freshmen Salem brought in except for four, graduated! Dedication to the classroom go hand-in-hand with successful athletic programs and four of Salem's teams at South Dakota were nationally ranked and three shared North Central Conference championships. His 1968 and 1972 USD teams were 9-1.

The 38-year old Salem firmly established himself as a player at the University of Minnesota where he played a vital role, as a quarterback, on the 1960 Golden Gopher team that won the Big Ten and National championships. He keyed several Minnesota rallies enroute to the national title and a berth in the Rose Bowl.

After his playing days, he remained at Minnesota as backfield coach for five years before moving to South Dakota to begin a rebuilding program there. Before his arrival, USD had a long losing history and he built them into winners -- his three-year mark before coming to NAU was 29-8.

In 1972 Salem was selected District 6 Coach of the Year and in 1968 he was chosen as South Dakota Collegiate Coach of the Year.

His coaching peers have great respect for him and his ability to turn losing programs around into solid producers.

The Salem staff have established solid footing with Arizona prep coaches and they have proven they are interested in state athletes.

Salem and his wife, Sue, are the parents of four sons, Tim, 14; Wade, 12; and seven-year old twins Brent and Brad.

DAN RUNKLE is now in his fifth year as a member of Joe Salem's staff -- three at South Dakota and two at NAU. The 30-year old Runkle is NAU's defensive coordinator and coaches the defensive ends and linebackers. During his collegiate days at Illinois College, he earned 10 varsity letters -- four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He played end in football and forward in basketball. Before going to South Dakota, he was coordinator of scouting at Utah. He earned his master's degree at Western Illinois. Runkle and his wife, Joelle, are the parents of two children, a six-year old son, Tad and an infant daughter, Sara Joelle.

DICK HEESCH is the man who is working with the fine young offensive linemen at NAU. The 35-year old Heesch is in his third year with Joe Salem -- two at NAU and one at South Dakota. He was head coach at Central High in Sioux City, Iowa for years then moved across town to West High for two years as head coach before going to USD. As a player at Huron College, he earned All-Conference honors at end. Heesch is a captain in the Arizona Air National Guard. He earned his master's degree at South Dakota. Heesch and his wife, Rea have four daughters, Robin, 11; Julie, 7; Susan, 4; and Kristie, 3.

JERRY JANSON moved from the defensive line to the defensive backfield for his coaching assignment this past spring. The 26-year old Janson is also in his third year with Joe Salem, having spent one year at USD before coming to NAU. He spent the 72-73 seasons as a graduate assistant at Ohio State where he earned his master's degree and worked with the national championship Ohio State teams. He graduated from Carthage College in Wisconsin where he played football, basketball and baseball.

JIM CLEMENTS was named full-time assistant at NAU last January and he will be coaching the interior defensive line after spending a year as a graduate assistant with the Axers. The 36-year old Clements earned his bachelor's degree at Arizona State and his master's from Eastern Michigan. He played his football at ASU and Otero, Colo., JC. He coached 12 years in his native Detroit and at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. In addition to his ability to work with young men, Clements was highly instrumental in NAU's booster drive this year. Clements and his wife, Holly, have three youngsters, Julie, 10; Tonny 4; and Jill 2.

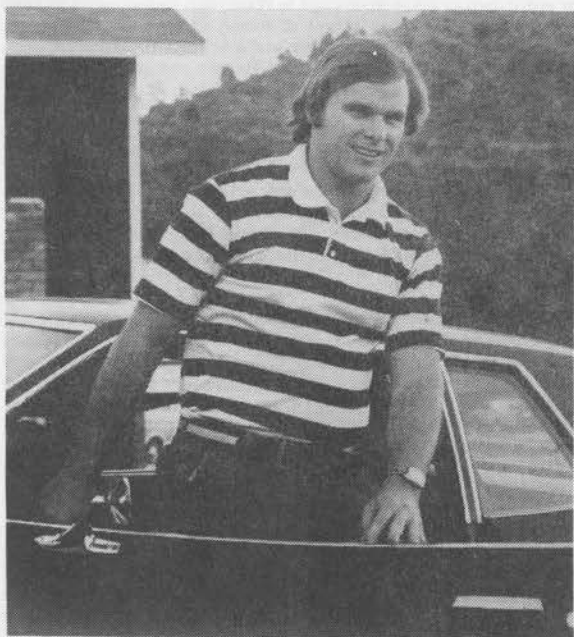
CHUCK HEATER joined the NAU staff as offensive backfield coach in August when Joe Glenn left to become head coach at Doane College. The 23-year old Heater is a proven player as he finished his collegiate career as Michigan's sixth all-time leading rusher, gaining 1,992 yards in three years. He was second-team All Big Ten running back in 1973 and was offensive player of the game in the 1972 Michigan-Ohio State clash. Besides his outstanding football abilities, Heater has been active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and has worked with Athletes In Action, a Christian athletic group in America.



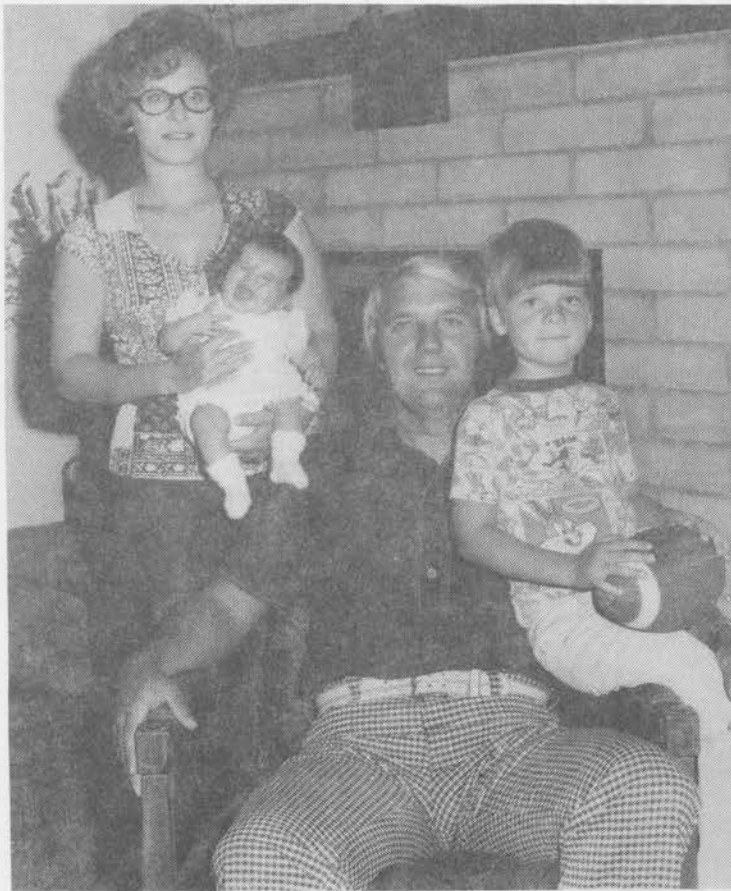

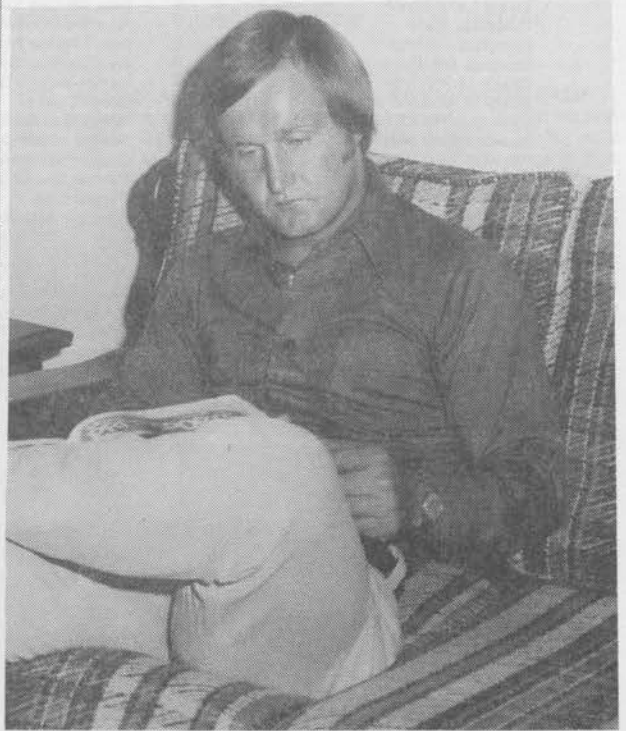

Traveling with the NAU football team, the band has performed at numerous colleges and universities within the Big Sky, including Montana State, Idaho State and Boise State.

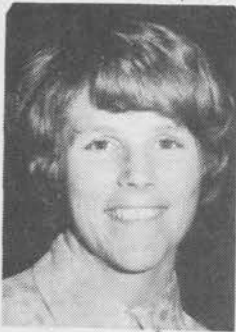

TODAY'S GAME

Idaho State's Bengals enter this year's season much like Northern Arizona did last year - a new head coach, a new offense and a lot of question marks.

But there's two noticeable differences. ISU head coach Joe Pascale was the defensive coordinator in the Bengal system last year, and that league-leading defense returns a starter or letterman at 10 of the 11 positions.

ISU's experience and second-place Big Sky Conference finish makes today's opponent one of the favorites to unseat three-time defending league champion Boise State.

But Pascale doesn't like playing a conference game this early in the schedule, especially since his team still is learning the "veer" offense and the four non-conference games which follow today's encounter would be a good experimental period.

Last year the Lumberjacks played their best game in leading the favored Bengals 7-0 for nearly three quarters before ISU cashed in on Logger mistakes for a 17-7 victory. In that game in ISU's picturesque Minidome, today's starting quarterback Leo Cook came off the bench to direct the Bengals to two second-half touchdowns and a field goal. The 6-0, 190-pounder led ISU on an 80-yard TD drive and caught NAU pass defenders sleeping for a 33-yard TD aerial the first play after a Greg Taylor interception.

Taylor, a 6-3, 190-pound defensive end, is billed as a budding All-America choice while 5-9, 205-pound fullback Tony McCright - another Bengal starter today - scored the first ISU touchdown on a 1-yard plunge in that 17-7 game. With Cook, McCright and 5-10, 160-pound halfback Curt Ashton in the Bengal backfield, the ISU offense will be strong despite the new system.

Defensive standouts include Taylor, linebacker Wayne Hill, 6-1, 228, cornerback Ken Parks (6-2, 182) and tackle Ota Tabron (6-2, 230).

Two pro-sized offensive tackles - 6-4, 250-pound Rick Scribner and 6-3, 245-pound Bob Howard - should help move the veer while split end Craig Norby (5-11, 170) gives the Bengals a fine pass catching threat.

As good as the Idaho State defense was last year, it didn't score one shutout, a tribute Pascale gives to NAU's head coach Joe Salem in the Axer's 20-0 win over U.S. International last Saturday.

In the only other Big Sky Conference game today, Idaho is at Boise State in an early test of league contenders. Non-conference games feature Montana State at North Dakota, Montana at Nevada-Las Vegas and Weber at Long Beach State.

The Lumberjacks are idle next week before a non-league contest at Nebraska-Omaha Sept. 25.

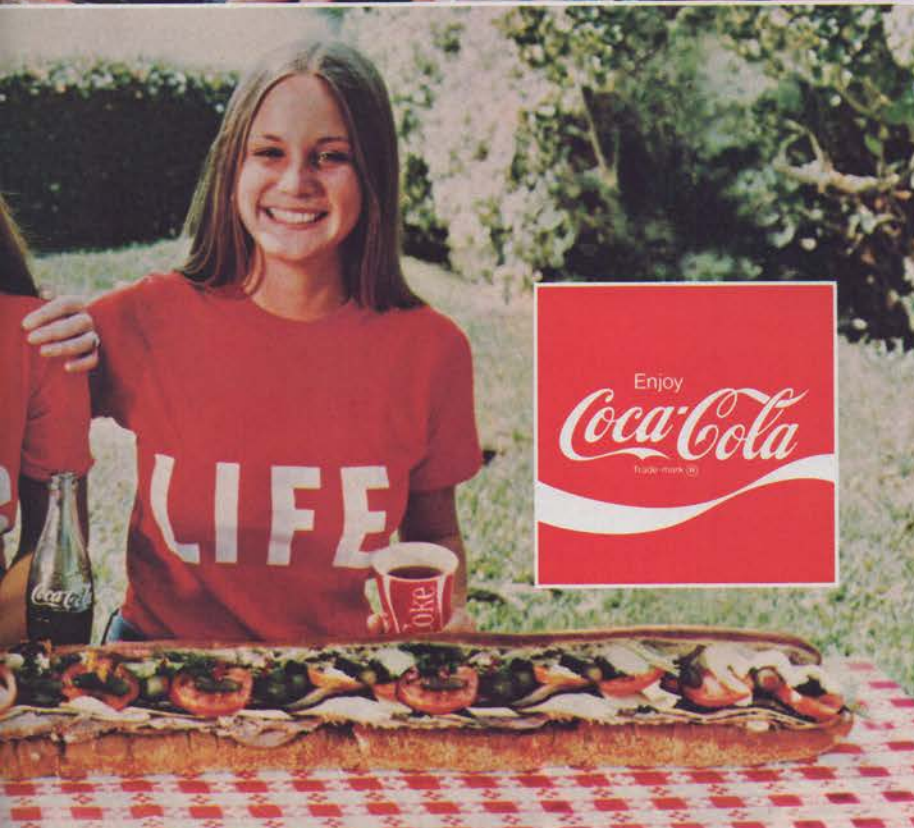

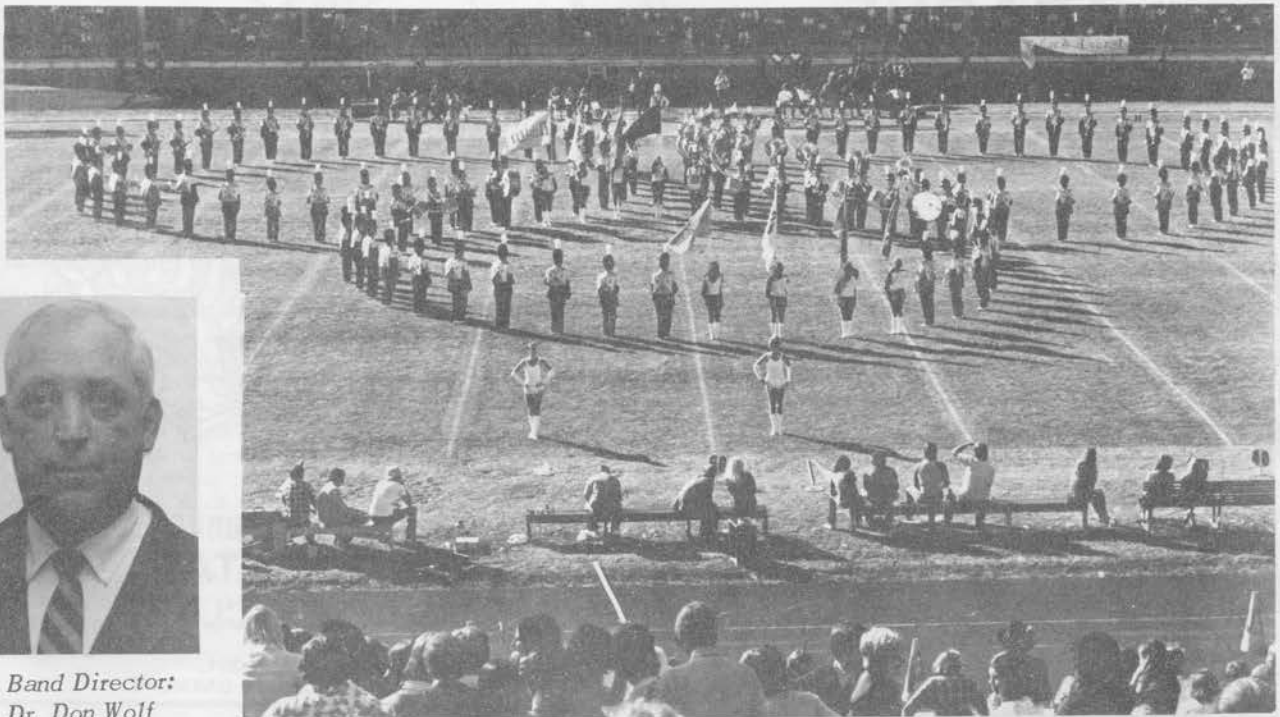
