

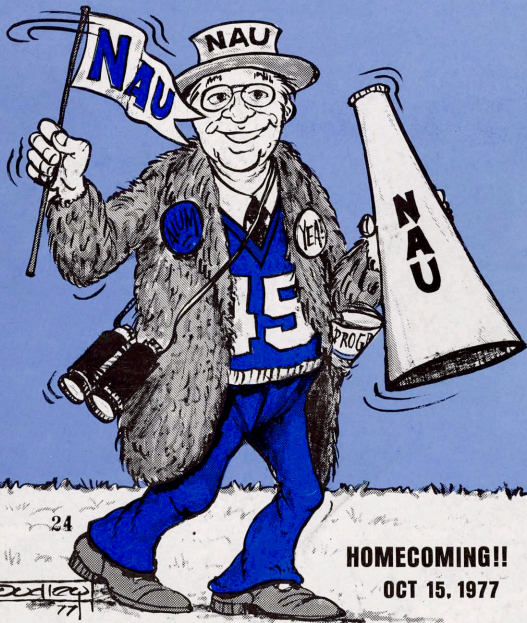

## PRESIDENT

Twenty years ago when Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was named president of Northern Arizona University, there were 1,142 students and the campus was housed in 18 buildings which covered 162 acres.

This fall more than 11,500 students are enrolled — a 10-fold increase since Dr. Walkup has been president and the 686-acre campus has more than 60 buildings.

In keeping pace with the needs of a growing university, the opening of the 272,000-square foot multi-purpose stadium this year is an example of the vision Dr. Walkup has possessed during his presidential tenure. His foresight has also provided the northward with a wide range of educational programs.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the University Elementary School and two years later, he was named Head of the Education Department, equal to the Dean of the College of Education by Issy's standards. He was later named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1955 he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by many organizations. He has been teacher, coach and administrator.

Dr. Walkup holds the bachelor of science degree from Central Missouri State University while his master and doctoral degrees were earned at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Walkup's wife, Lucy, is a former teacher. They have one grown daughter.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

One momentous weekend last winter made the 27 years T. H. "Hank" Anderson has devoted to intercollegiate athletics well worth the time spent.

That's the weekend when Anderson's former basketball players gathered in Spokane, Wash., before a Gonzaga-NAU game for a reunion. The doctors, lawyers, dentists, educators and businessmen attending were testament enough that Hank had done his job well in working with young people. These successful people had played, at one time or another, for Hank during his 21 years at Gonzaga as athletic director and head basketball coach.

Anderson spent two years as head basketball coach at Montana State before coming to NAU where he is now in his fourth year as director of athletics of one of the quickest emerging athletic programs in the nation.

He was one of four finalists for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year last spring, a tribute to what he has done for NAU athletics.

Anderson helped organize the Big Sky Conference which started in 1962 and he has been a key part of its growth as it has gained in national prominence. His organizational skills and leadership ability have been instrumental in NAU's growth over the past four years.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become NAU's director of athletics he ranked in the top 10 nationally for career wins of active coaches with 318 triumphs. Anderson's Gonzaga teams shared Big Sky titles in 1966 and again in 1967 and he was conference coach of the year in 1966.

Anderson was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941 and he earned his master's degree from Gonzaga in 1965. He had a 167-43 prep record, coaching at Grants Pass, Baker and Madras in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1968-72 he served as director of the Greater Spokane (Wash.) Sports Association. He and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five grown children.

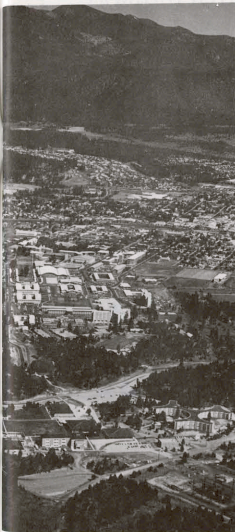

## NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state of this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 111th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era.

The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco Peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 76 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world. Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

## LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF



JOE SALEM  
Head Coach

Those familiar with Joe Salem's ability as a football coach were not at all surprised when he produced an 8-3 finish last season -- NAU's best record in 16 years and first winning season since 1969.

Those that were surprised, now better appreciate his ability as a leader, organizer and recruiter -- all of which add up to a successful program.

After a 1-9 finish in 1975, pre-season tabulations pegged NAU for a 1-10 finish last fall and to go winless in Big Sky play. Salem and his staff took just four senior starters and an energetic group of underclassmen to that monumental 8-3 season which included a 4-2 league mark, good for third place.

NAU reached as high as No. 8 nationally among NCAA Division II schools in the national rankings, seven Awar players made All-Conference and two more All-America. Six of those All-Conference players return.

Strong academic counseling and insistence that his football players work steadily toward a college degree has been Salem's philosophy as he enters his 12th year as a head coach at the college level. "When they are 35, they will appreciate what they have an education and a valuable job skill," says Salem.

Before coming to NAU, Salem, 39, spent nine years as head coach at the University of South Dakota and his last three years there -- 1972-73-74, his teams shared the North Central Conference titles. He was District 6 Coach of the year in 1972 and in 1968 he was named South Dakota Collegiate Coach of the Year.

In his final three years at South Dakota, his teams went 29-8 and he took over when the stock in South Dakota football was not too likely to enjoy a split. He took over under similar circumstances at NAU.

"We can win with Arizona athletes," was one of Salem's first remarks after being named NAU's coach. Last fall more than half of the team was home grown as well as the case this fall -- 10 of the 11 starters on the defensive unit last fall were Arizonans.

Salem and his wife, Sus, are the parents of four sons -- Tim, 15, Wade, 13 and seven-year old twins Brent and Brad.

DAN RUNKLE is now in his sixth year as a member of Joe Salem's staff and he coordinates the defensive play of the Avars. Last year the defensive unit led the Big Sky in total defense and defense against the rush and for most of the season NAU's defense was nationally ranked in several categories. The 31-year old Runkle earned 10 varsity letters at Illinois College -- four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He earned his master's degree at Western Illinois. He coordinates NAU's summer sports camp program. Runkle and his wife, Joelle, are the parents of a seven-year old son, Tad, and a year-old daughter, Sara Joelle.

DICK HEESCH--Last fall the offensive line at NAU started showing the "Dick Heesch Touch" -- that of producing consistent blocking to keep sustained drives alive. The 36-year old Heesch is in his fourth year of working under Salem and his teaching skills are apparent as his linemen know their assignments and execute them well. Was an all conference end at Huron College and earned his master's at South Dakota. Is a captain in the Arizona National Guard. Heesch and his wife, Rea, are the parents of four daughters, Robin 12, Julie 10, Susan 7 and Kristie 4.

JERRY JANZON--Was a four-year member of the Salem staff. The 27-year old Janzon is in his second year of coaching the NAU defensive backs. Earlier he worked with the defensive line at NAU and South Dakota. Graduated from Carthage College in Wisconsin and earned his master's degree from Ohio state, where he was a graduate assistant during the 1972 and 1973 seasons, working with the national championship Buckeye teams. Earned varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball at Carthage.

JIM CLEMENTS--Heading into his second year as a member of the NAU coaching staff after serving a year as a graduate assistant in 1975. Coaches the defensive line and helped develop two first-team tackles last fall, J. Brill and Jim Anders. The 37-year old Clements graduated from Arizona State and earned his master's degree from Eastern Michigan. Coached 12 years in varsity football at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. Was a three season member of NAU's booster drive. Clements and his wife, Holly, are the parents of three children, Julia, 11, Tommy 6, and Jill 3.

MIKE SHANAHAN--After serving two years on the University of Oklahoma staff where he worked with the offensive unit and helped coach the Sooner junior varsity, Mike Shanahan came to NAU after the 1976 Fiesta Bowl. The 24-year old Shanahan earned his Bachelor and master degrees from Eastern Illinois University where he played quarterback and defense in 1972 and 1973 seasons, having married the former Peggy Brandt earlier this year.

(84) DAN ANDERS, 6-6, 241, FR. DL, UC, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Has the size we need, says defensive coordinator Dan Runnie. In addition to solid football background, Anders is an outstanding wrestler. Younger brother of Jim, both prep'd at Tucson's Santa Rita High.

(82) JIM ANDERS, 6-2, 247, SO, DT, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Started all 11 games for NAU last year as a frosh at defensive tackle. Led down line men for 57 stops, forced six fumbles, recovered three and had three quarterback sacks. Placed third in Big Sky wrestling tournament at heavenweight.

(86) FRANK BAKER, 6-2, 209, JR, DE, BOULDER, COLO.—A hard worker who could use a lot of action. Was non-DB tackle in a reserve role last fall and made some key plays in NAU's 23-21 road win at Montana. Very popular with teammates. Prep'd at Boulder High.

(87) LINDSAY "SCOTT" BOATRIGHT, 6-4, 212, SO, DT, MIAMI, FLA.— Saw limited action last fall because of illness. His ability and could see considerable action and needs only added aggressiveness to become a standout performer. Played on State 4-A championship Hales Line team in Miami.

(85) A. J. BRILL, 6-3, 231, SO, DT, GARDEN GROVE, CALIF.—Like Jim Anders, Brill started all 11 games last fall at defensive tackle as a frosh and he was in on 71 stops. Was only non-Arizona prep graduate in starting defensive unit last fall which led Big Sky in total and rushing defense. Had excellent spring. Prep'd at Garden Grove High.

(87) PHIL BROWN, 6-4, 210, SO, MG, PHOENIX, ARIZ.—Played last year at Glendale Community College. Also played high school basketball.

(81) PHIL CANICK, 6-2, 210, SO, LB, SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ.—Started at defensive end as a freshman but missed last year with knee injury. Had 87 tackles as frosh and forced three fumbles. Injured again in spring ball and if he's healthy, will be a major contributor to the team this fall. Prep'd at Channahon High where he had 30 tackles in single game.

(83) DAVE CARLTON, 6-5, 209, SO, LB, YUMA, ARIZ.—Played in just four winning games in his three years at Yuma High and he doubted that during NAU's 8-3 season. Part-time starter as frosh, very consistent and as strength developer, could be outstanding. Was in on 50 tackles last fall.

(82) CLEVELAND DANSBY, 5-11, 170, SR, DB, PHOENIX, ARIZ.—Was second in Big Sky with six interceptions, was in on 64 tackles, blocked three kicks and had eight pass deflections and his name was left off the Big Sky All-Conference ballot in error. Had excellent spring and has fine team leadership qualities. Played at North Mountain High and Phoenix College.

(78) JOHN FREEMAN, 6-5, 219, SO, LB, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Started last part of 1976 as a frosh. Was redshirted last season. Made giant strides in spring practice until injured and if he continues, improvement, will be a major factor in the defensive unit's performance this fall. Prep'd at Tucson's Selwahn High.

(44) GREG GERKEN, 6-5, 198, FR, LB, DENVER, COLO.—An outstanding all round athlete at Regis High in Denver. Has wide range of athletic skills and most important, has a big desire to go with excellent size. Rated one of Colorado's top prep players.

19 tonight's Homecoming game against Cal Fullerton, the 'Jacks undoubtedly will show different facet of their personality.

Enroute to a 5-1 record, NAU has won big, won small and done just about everything else. It's a guessing game trying to keep up with the Jacks... in the home opener against Augustana, the Loggers ran to a 21-0 lead before fumbling and coming over to Weber State (28-7) and Montana (25-24) and a 36-10 put-in-all-together decision over Weber State for a 20-16 loss to Nevada-Las Vegas.

Then came last week's 16-0 shutout of Cal Poly-Pomona, a game in which NAU played well enough to lose.

So, take a guess. Homecoming in the Dome against Fullerton will mean: A) A big victory; B) A big loss; C) Something in between. D) All of the above.

Fullerton certainly won't be a pushover, coming off a 31-10 victory over Northeast Louisiana. The Titans are 2-3, but the loggers have come against NCAA Division I teams San Diego State, Long Beach State and San Jose State. Fullerton's other victory came against Cal State Northridge, 45-14.

The Titans have a strong rushing attack, which has netted 636 yards the last two weeks, including 359 last week.

An interesting match-up will arise in tonight's game as the Titans are averaging 256.4 yards a game rushing and have scored 15 touchdowns through the first five games on the ground.

On the other hand, NAU ranks in the top five among NCAA Division II schools, having given up 88.5 yards a game rushing.

This is the third meeting between the two schools in football. The Titans won 10-7 to open the 1976 season in Flagstaff while NAU won 20-17 to close the 1976 season in California.

Jay Bennett led the Titans with 108 yards on 19 carries.

The Lumberjacks aren't anxious, seeing the Big Sky Conference in total offense, total defense and defense against the rush.

This is a "designated" Big Sky Conference game for NAU, which doesn't play Idaho this season. Fullerton takes Idaho's place on the Lumberjack schedule.

**NEXT WEEK:** The Lumberjacks travel to Boise, Idaho to meet potent Boise State University in a 7:30 p.m. Big Sky game (8:30 p.m. Arizona time). The Broncos took a 4-1 overall mark (3-0 in Big Sky) into a non-conference game at Nevada-Reno the afternoon. That game can be heard live, over KCLB (800) in Flagstaff, KATC-FM (92.3) in Phoenix, and KRGE (1360) in Page.

Following the game at Boise, NAU will visit OIdo, then close out regular season play at home with games against Montana State, Eastern Montana and Nebraska-Omaha.

## CAL STATE - FULLERTON

Any history of California State University, Fullerton must, of necessity, be short.

Cal State Fullerton opened its doors for classes in the fall of 1959 after being founded in 1957 by the State Legislature as the first public, four-year institution of higher learning in Orange County. At the outset the institution's name was Orange County State College, but it was changed several times with the present identification adopted in 1972.

The first permanent structure, the six-story Letters and Science Building, was occupied in 1963. Prior to that, the institution operated in off-campus leased quarters for one year, then in temporary buildings on the permanent campus.

During the first 18 years of its existence, Cal State Fullerton has grown from 452 students to approximately 23,000 and its full-time teaching faculty has increased from five members to approximately 800. Enrollment is expected to peak at nearly 27,000 students in the 1980s.

Drawn from throughout the world, the faculty is distinguished by its commitment to teaching and scholarly activity. Its members have a wide variety of experiences and accomplishments in research, the arts, professional work, consulting and other creative endeavors. Three out of every four members have earned their doctorates, and these have come from more than 100 major colleges and universities.

Criteria for selection to the faculty include mastery of knowledge in an academic specialty, demonstrated skill and experience in teaching, and continuing interest in scholarly study and research. Retention and promotion criteria also include service to the university and to the community.

Most of the curriculum is offered by the university's five schools. The schools are Arts, Business Administration and Economics; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Mathematics, Science and Engineering. Degree programs number 41 at the undergraduate level and 34 at the graduate level. One degree, the Master of Public Administration, is offered both on campus and at the Santa Ana Civic Center.

Among newer degree programs are the B.S. in Child Development, the B.A. in Criminal Justice, the B.S. in Human Services, the B.S. in Nursing and the M.S. in Psychology with a clinical community concentration. Last year, more than 4,000 degrees were conferred.

Because of the university's remarkable growth, the state has invested more than \$60 million in capital improvements, the latest of which are a three-level student union and a large general classroom building. On the drawing boards is an addition to the Art Center.

## LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

### LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Blome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on ground which is now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six or seven foot cross cuts with one man working on each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two... (From that) the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumber Jacks." Mr. Blome is the younger son of R. H. Blome, second greatest of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter was written in July, 1977.

### WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were used by the Industrial Arts Club as a "float." In 1934, they were used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

### COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in Feb., 1933, that it was stolen. The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshman football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodes Noice, Paul Ludwig, James Jasolent, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Albert Dalmolin.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is preserved, cradled in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."

# 1976 NAU FOOTBALL RECORD

## GAME 1 Sept. 4 UNL International

Attendance: 6,500 Temp 80

FLAGSTAFF — Al DeGrate rambled for 155 yards and scored twice and Tom Jurich booted field goals of 21 and 43 yards as NAU beat US International of San Diego, 20-0 to open the season.

## WEBER STATE COLLEGE CAPSULE OUTLOOK

An early season "anonymous schedule" a year ago which Weber faced three early season games against nationally ranked teams, was a prime factor in the Wildcats going 2-8. Last season Weber had seven road games. This fall, new coach Pat Ruhlman has 28 between-pace and the Wildcats have six home games, including the first three of the season, as a team momentum can be gained. The Weber crew could be a surprise. Weber's last winning season was a 7-2-7 finish in 1971.

Ruhlman and his new staff got to work immediately during spring drills and the 1976 Eastern Arizona College player had some anatomy in the Williams Ruhlman's familiar with Big Sky football as his teams at Ohio State in California played Boise State in the early 1970's and Central American East Boise in the Cascade Bowl before Boise rather for a 32-28 win.

Weber returns three of its top four rushers headed by Mark Williams who stepped 39 times for 438 yards last fall. Top receiver Tomery Coleman, who caught 42 yards for 537 yards to lead the Big Sky in air also. If quarterback help and offensive line replacement develop, Weber could be tough. ## UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA-LAS VEGAS CAPSULE OUTLOOK

The University of Nevada Las Vegas is playing its final season in the Division I ranks as the Rebels are going up to join the Western Athletic Conference. Last season UNLV finished a 9-3 record, losing a first round NCAA playoff game to Akron when UNLV averaged 32.1 points a game and had many top performers back. 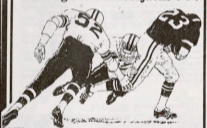

**CAL-FULLERTON CAPSULE OUTLOOK**

If a rugged early-season schedule can be met with some success, the California State University Fullerton Titans could come up with their finest football performance since the 1974 Titans went 7-4.

Last year the Titans were 3-7 and the 1976 team went 9-8 under Coach Jim Colletto. Colletto has had some solid recruiting years and he feels he has the talent to produce a great team this fall - but the first three games include Long Beach State, San Diego State and San Jose State.

The major college Titans - members of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association - stand 1-1 against NAU. The Aztecs won 20-17 to close the season last fall in California when the Titans were a come-from-behind 10-7 game to snatch the 1974 season for NAU.

## BOISE STATE CAPSULE OUTLOOK

Last fall the Boise Broncos, who had claimed Big Sky titles in 1972, 1974 and 1975, had to wait their first two games to go 0-1-1 in the season and 2-4 in league play.

That, however, could serve as a spring board to another outstanding Boise State team as second year head coach Jim Cooper returns 36 of 48 letterman. Four of Boise's substitutes now had acted up to over 18 snaps — so, with a lot of experience plus a banner wave of junior college talent on hand the word is: Look out! Nine opponents and seven defensive players return.

Tremendous local support had keyed Boise athletic base since avoiding from top junior college ranks in 1976 and over the past four years. Boise has a franchise 76-24 football record, each fall has set in excess of 71,000 season tickets. The top two rushers in junior football games who rushed 117 yards for 715 yards and 7 3/4 yard catching, 24 passes for 653 yards and 3 TD's return as does sophomore Mike Britton who had 537 yards on 106 carries and caught 71 passes for 96 yards — all as a freshman.

If last year's awe quarterback Dan Pickett is injury free, he could lead a devastating Boise attack. At the same time, sophomore Houston Huggen could step in.

What did you give a coach who won the 1976 national NCAA Division II football championship? Well, Montana State University head coach Sonny Holland would be delighted with a repeat and if the truth be told in developing a second running attack, he could be in business.

Last fall MSU became the first Big Sky team to win a national title when the Bobcats beat Auburn University of Ohio 24-13 for the title before a record crowd of 79,000 fans. MSU returns 65 of 87 letterman. Last fall the Bobcats were coming off a 5-6 year in 1975 but the defensive and offensive lines were intact and they're a classic example of what line play means to successful football — regardless of the level of play.

Quarterback Paul Demuth passed for 885 yards and 10 TD's and ran for 489 yards and caught 17 times as a sophomore and his steady play was a key to MSU's 12-1 season. After winning the Frontier Conference championship in 1975, the Yellowjackets posted a 3-6 record last fall. But the Yellowjackets have some outstanding players back.
