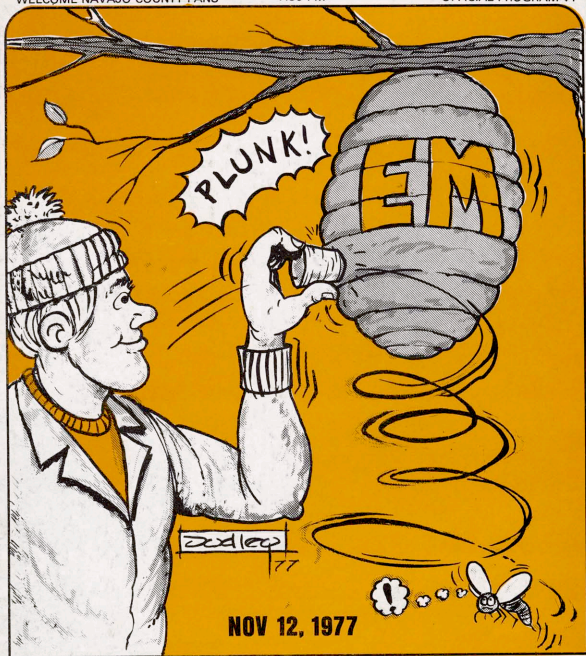


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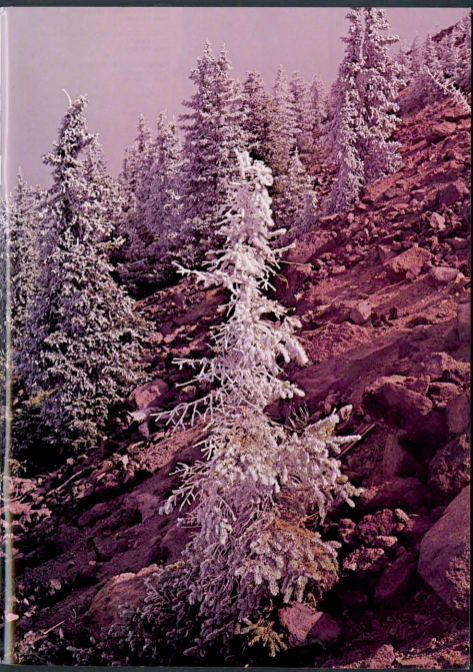

PRESIDENT

Twenty years ago when Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was named president of Northern Arizona University, there were 1,142 students and the campus was housed in 18 buildings which covered 162 acres.

This fall more than 11,500 students are enrolled — a 10-fold increase since Dr. Walkup has been president and the 686 acre campus has more than 60 buildings.

In keeping pace with the needs of a growing university, the opening of the 272,000-square foot multi-purpose domed stadium this year is an example of the vision Dr. Walkup has possessed during his presidential tenure. His foresight has also provided the northland with a wide range of educational programs.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the University Elementary School and two years later, he was named head of the Education Department, elected to the Dean of the College of Education by today's standards. He was later named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1965 he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by many organizations. He has been teacher, coach and administrator.

Dr. Walkup holds the bachelor of science degree from Central Missouri State University, while his master and doctoral degrees were earned at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Walkup's wife, Lucy, is a former teacher. They have one grown daughter.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

One momentous weekend last winter made the 27 years T. H. "Hank" Anderson has devoted to intercollegiate athletics well worth the time spent. That's the weekend when Anderson's former basketball players gathered in Spokane, Wash., before a Gonzaga-NAU game for a reunion. The doctors, lawyers, dentists, educators and businessmen attending were testament enough that Hank had done his job well in working with young people. These successful people had played, at one time or another, for Hank during his 27 years at Gonzaga as athletic director and head basketball coach.

Anderson spent two years as head basketball coach at Montana State before coming to NAU where he is now in his fourth year as director of athletics of one of the quickest emerging athletic programs in the nation.

He was one of four finalists for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year last spring, a tribute to what he has done for NAU athletics.

Anderson helped organize the Big Sky Conference which started in 1962 and he has been a key part of its growth as it has gained in national prominence. His organizational skills and leadership ability have been instrumental in NAU's growth over the past four years.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become NAU's director of athletics he ranked in the top 10 nationally for career wins of assistant coaches with 318 triumphs. Anderson's Gonzaga teams shared Big Sky titles in 1966 and again in 1967 and he was conference coach of the year in 1966.

Anderson was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941 and he earned his master's degree from Gonzaga in 1965. He had a 167-43 prep record, coaching at Grants Pass, Baker and Medford in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1968-72 he served as director of the Greater Spokane (Wash.) Sports Association. He and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five grown children.

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NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state of this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 11th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era. The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 75 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world. Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

Those familiar with Joe Salem's ability as a football coach were not at all surprised when he produced an 8-3 finish last season - NAU's best record in 18 years and first winning season since 1969.

Those that were surprised, now better appreciate his ability as a leader, organizer and recruiter - all of which add up to a successful program. After a 1-9 finish in 1975, pre-season tabulators pegged NAU for a 1-10 finish last fall and to go winless in Big Sky play. Salem and his staff took just four senior starters and an energetic group of underclassmen to the monumental 8-3 season which included a 4-2 league mark, good for third place. NAU reached as high as No. 6 nationally among NCAA Division II schools in the national rankings, seven Auer players made All-Conference and two more All-America. Six of those All-Conference players return.

Strong academic counseling and insistence that his football players work steadily toward a college degree has been Salem's philosophy as he enters his 12th year as a head coach at the college level. "When they are 35, they will appreciate the fact they have an education and a saleable job skill," says Salem. Before coming to NAU, Salem, 39, spent nine years as head coach with the University of South Dakota and his last three years there - 1972-73-74, his teams shared the North Central Conference titles. He was District 6 Coach of the year in 1972 and in 1968 he was named South Dakota Collegiate Coach of the Year.

In his final three years at South Dakota, his teams were 29-8 and he took over when the stock in South Dakota football was not too likely to enjoy a split. He took over under similar circumstances at NAU.

"We can win with Arizona athletes," was one of Salem's first remarks after being named NAU's coach. Last fall more than half of the team was home grown as well as the case this fall - 10 of the 11 starters on the defensive unit last fall were Arizonans.

Salem and his wife, Sue, are the parents of four sons - Tim, 15, Wade, 13 and seven-year old twins Brent and Brad.

DAN RUNKLE is now in his sixth year as a member of Joe Salem's staff and he coordinates the defensive play of the Azacs. Last year the defensive unit led the Big Sky in total defense and defense against the run and for most of the season NAU's defense was nationally ranked in several categories. The 21-year old Runkle earned 10 varsity letters at Illinois College - four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He earned his master's degree at Western Illinois. He coordinates NAU's summer sports camps program. Runkle and his wife, Joelle, are the parents of a seven-year old son, Tad, and a year-old daughter, Sara Joelle.

DICK HEESCH - Last fall the offensive line at NAU started showing the "Dick Heesch touch" - that of producing consistent blocking to keep sustained drives alive. The 30-year old Heesch is in his fourth year of working under Salem and his coaching skills are apparent as his linemen know their assignments and execute them well. Was an all conference end at Huron College and earned his master's at South Dakota. Is a captain in the Arizona National Guard. Heesch and his wife, Rose, are the parents of four daughters, Robert 13, Julie 10, Susan 7 and Kristie 4.

JERRY JANSON - Also a four-year member of the Salem staff. The 27-year old Janson is in his second year of coaching the NAU defensive backs. Earlier he worked with the defensive line at NAU and South Dakota. Graduated from Carthage College in Wisconsin and earned his master's degree from Ohio State, where he was a graduate assistant during the 1972 and 1973 seasons, working with the national championship Buckeye teams. Earned varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball at Carthage.

The 31-year old Clements graduated from Arizona State and earned his master's degree from Eastern Michigan. Coached 12 years in native Detroit and at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. Heesch, valuable member of NAU's booster drive. Clements and his wife, Holly, are the parents of three children, Julie, 11, Tommy 5, and Jill 3.

MIKE SHANAHAN - After serving two years on the University of Oklahoma staff where he worked with the offensive unit and helped coach the Sooners junior varsity, Mike Shanahan came to NAU after the 1974 Fiesta Bowl. The 24-year old Shanahan earned his bachelor and master degrees from Eastern Illinois University where he played quarterback and defensive back. Shanahan is a newwed, having married the former Peggy Brandt earlier this year.

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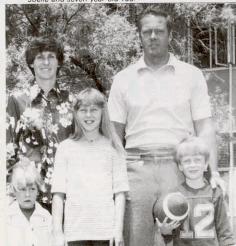

(64) DAN ANDERS, 6-5, 241, FR, DL, TUCSON, ARIZ. —Has the size we need, says defensive coordinator Dan Runkle. In addition to solid football background, Anders is an outstanding wrestler. Younger brother of Jim, both prepved at Tucson's Santa Rita High.

(62) JIM ANDERS, 6-2, 247, SO, DT, TUCSON, ARIZ. —Started all 11 games for NAU last year as a fresh at defensive tackle. Led down linemen with 57 stops, forced six fumbles, recovered three and had three heavyweight sacks. Placed third in Big Sky wrestling tournament at heavyweight.

(68) FRANK BAKER, 6-2, 208, JR, DE BOULDER, COLO. —A hard worker who could see a lot of action. Was in on 298 tackles in a season, one last fall and made some key plays in NAU's 23-21 road win at Montana. Very popular with teammates. Prepved at Boulder High.

(57) LINDSAY "SCOTT" BOATRIGHT, 6-4, 212, SO, DT, MIAMI, FLA. —Saw limited action last fall because of illness. Has ability and could see considerable action and needs only added aggressiveness to become a standout performer. Played on State 4-A championship Miami Lakes team in Miami.

(66) A. J. BRILL, 6-3, 231, SO, DT, GARDEN GROVE, CALIF. —Like Jim Anders, Brill started all 11 games last fall at defensive tackle as a freshman and he was in on 71 stops. Was only non-Arizona prep graduate in starting defensive unit last fall which led Big Sky in total and rushing defense. Had excellent spring. Prepved at Garden Grove High.

(87) PHIL BROWN, 6-4, 210, SO, MG, PHOENIX, ARIZ. —Played last year at Glendale Community College. Also played high school basketball.

(83) DAVE CARLTON, 6-5, 209, SO, LB, YUMA, ARIZ. —Played in just four winning games in his three years at Yuma High and he doubted that during NAU's 3 season. Part-time starter as frosh, very consistent and as strength develops, could be outstanding. Was in on 50 tackles last fall.

(26) CLEVELAND DANSBY, 5-11, 170, SR, DB, PHOENIX, ARIZ. —Was second in Big Sky with six interceptions, was in on 64 tackles, blocked three kicks and had eight pass deflections and his name was left off the Big Sky All-Conference ballot in error. Had excellent spring and has fine team leadership qualities. Played at South Mountain High and Phoenix College.

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MEET OUR NAVAJO COUNTY NEIGHBORS

When he spoke in Holbrook recently at the opening of the county fair, Wesley Bolin, then secretary of state and now Arizona's governor, pointed out that Navajo County has one foot in the past and one in the future.

Governor Bolin was noting the historical heritage of Navajo County. Its land is rich in the lore of the Old West—the days of the cowboys, the pioneers, the explorers and others.

And yet, these were only "newcomers" compared with the people who have lived at what is now Oraibi, the site of the oldest continuously inhabited community in the country. People were living in Oraibi centuries before Columbus took his ocean voyage.

NAVAJO COUNTY IS LARGER THAN SOME STATES

Navajo County is larger than some states. It is more than 225 miles from north to south and more than 50 miles from east to west. There is a great diversity of landscape from Kayenta to the north to Whiteriver to the south.

The county is today a center of much activity although it may not always be apparent to someone passing through the area.

The single largest project is the \$900 million Arizona Public Service Generating Plant, now under construction just west of Joseph City. The initial unit of the Cholla Plant went into operation in 1962. In recent years, APS has started construction on three more generating units, and engineering plans are currently being drafted for a fifth unit. More than 1400 construction people are employed at the plant site at present.

CHOLLA PLANT STATE'S LARGEST GENERATING PLANT

When all five units go into production, the Cholla Plant will be the largest plant of its kind in the state.

Another major construction project was completed last year at the Southwestern Forest Industries' Snowflake Pulp and Paper Mill. The recent \$75 million addition has expanded the plant's production facilities and the mill is one of the most modern of its kind in the country. The plant has more than 500 employees, most of whom live in the Snowflake-Taylor-Heber area. The plant produces newsprint used by many newspapers in Northern Arizona as well as other newspapers in the western part of the country.

SANTA FE HEADQUARTERS AT WINSLOW

Winslow is the division headquarters for Santa Fe, and the railroad has more than 950 employees in the county. Most of the employees live in the Winslow area, and Santa Fe's payroll of more than 10,000,000 a year is the largest single payroll in the county. This stable payroll has a significant and beneficial impact on the entire county's economy.

Holbrook is the county seat, and many federal and state governmental units are located in the community in addition to the county government. Last year a new \$4,500,000 Navajo County Governmental Center was opened just south of Holbrook, and it is the location for most county functions in the community.

Show Low, Lakeside and Pinetop have long been three of the favorite recreational areas in the state. This area is not only a summer paradise, but has also become an outstanding winter area as well, especially since the development of the Sunrise ski area.

THREE RESERVATION AREAS IN NAVAJO COUNTY

Navajo County includes parts of three different Indian reservations: Navajo, Hopi and Apache. Each of the tribes contributes its own special cultural heritage to a rich and diversified country.

Northland Pioneer College, one of the state's newest community colleges, has major centers in Winslow, Holbrook, Snowflake and Show Low. The college also offers classes at many other locations in the area.

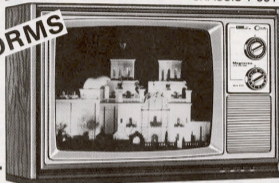
New shopping facilities, new schools, new church building, new offices along with many new residences have been completed in recent years and others are ready to start in the immediate future.

But the county has never forgotten its Western heritage. One example is the Haskinville Sheriff's Posse which is not just a Sunday riding club. The posse helps law enforcement agencies throughout the year. It is probably next known, however, for its annual Pony Express Ride from Holbrook to Scottsdale which recalls the famous Pony Express riders of a century ago.

While there are many things occurring in Navajo County, its residents also appreciate the many good things that are happening all over the northern part of the state. Navajo County extends its congratulations to Northern Arizona University on the completion and opening of the Dome this fall. We also congratulate the Lumberjacks on a fine season and wish them the very best in tonight's game.

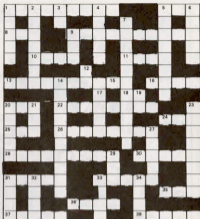

TONIGHT'S GAME

A new one of college football in Arizona occurred September 17th when the first indoor football game was played in Flagstaff. That night Northern Arizona University edged the University of Montana 25-24.

Last week NAU defeated Montana State in the dome 28-21 and as far as head coach Joe Salter is concerned, that victory was more meaningful. To Coach Salter, last week's victory was the realization of a goal set two football seasons ago: the arrival of a winning football program for Northern Arizona University.

Flagstaff conference play last Saturday with a 5-1 record and possessing an overall 7-2 mark, the Lumberjacks kept alive hopes for a possible share of the Big Sky title and an opportunity for a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs. For a share of the Big Sky title, they must hope Idaho again ignites leading Boise State on Nov. 26th. For the opportunity of a possible playoff berth, NAU must win its final two games. Thus, the importance of tonight's game against Eastern Montana.

The Lumberjacks will again look to establish a solid ground game. Last week, NAU had one of its best running performances of the year with Carl Golden scoring three touchdowns. Most impressive in the Lumberjack's running attack was Wilford Reeves as the freshman from Coconino High School carried the ball 19 times for 82 yards. The Lumberjacks should be at relative full strength tonight.

NAU fits next Eastern Montana in 1975 in Flagstaff. The Yellowjackets resisted to win that game 36-34. This will be the second meeting for the two teams. The Yellowjackets are 2-5 overall this year and 2-2 in Frontier Conference action. They're trying to equal last year's output in the new column. After losing their first five games, the Yellowjackets are riding a two game win streak. Last week they defeated Rocky Mountain 35-21 after losing 13-0 in the first quarter.

The Yellowjacket offense is led by quarterback Brett Pruitt. Pruitt will be handing the football to running backs Greg Martin and Joe Rubin. Last week Bolton scored two touchdowns with runs of 3 and 35 yards. When Pruitt hits the air, he's looked primarily for tight end Bill Davis and wide receiver Rich Mart. Leading the defense for the Yellowjackets last weekend against Rocky Mountain was defensive back Doug Dewald who intercepted three passes including one for a 16 yard touchdown.

NEXT WEEK: NAU closes out its regular-season play next week at home against the University of Idaho-Oreaha. The game will have a 7:30 p.m. start in the NAU dome and guest that evening will be city and county officials from Coconino and Yavapai Counties as well as from Flagstaff and Prescott. 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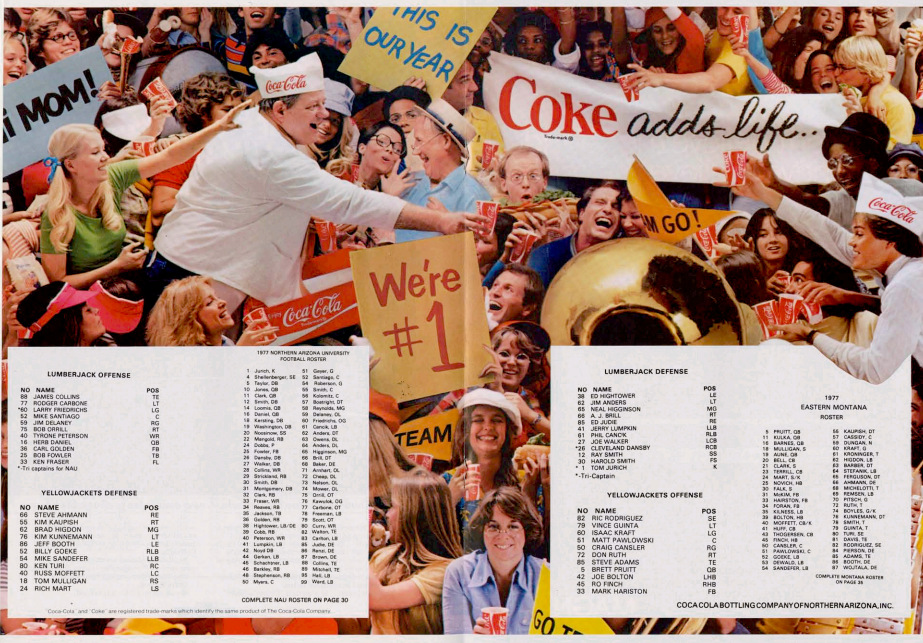

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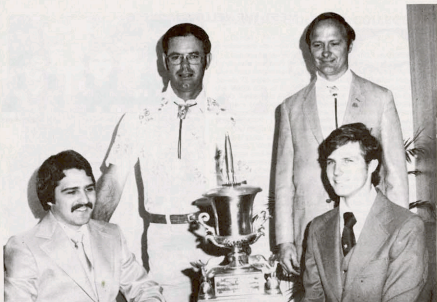

Football Notes

With last weekend's 28-21 come-from-behind win over Montana State University's defending Big Sky and NCAA Division II national champs, Northern Arizona University's Lumberjacks pushed their seasonal record to 7-2. Last year NAU was 8-3.

That win over Montana State gives the Lumberjacks their first ever back-to-back seasons of at least seven football victories since the institution gained university status in 1966. The last time the Lumberjacks had back-to-back seasons with this much success was the B-1 finish in 1957 and the 11-1 record, the most wins ever by an Aztec team, in 1959.

The last time a Lumberjack football team appeared in post-season play was that 1958 team. The Azecs opened NAIA Division I play that year by defeating Gustavus-Adolphus of Minnesota 41-12 in the first round playoffs in Tucson. Then, NAU lost a hard-fought contest 19-13 to Northeastern Oklahoma in the Holiday Bowl in St. Petersburg, Florida for the national title before a nationwide TV audience. In that game, NAU became the first Arizona school to appear in a nationally televised game.

NAU still has a shot at gaining a share of the 1977 Big Sky football title as the Azecs have finished league play at 5-1, but Boise State, the leader at 5-0, must play its season finale November 26 at Idaho in a league encounter. Over the past six years, Idaho has given Boise State (year in and year out) more trouble than any league team.

That November 26 game will keep Boise State out of the NCAA Division II national playoffs as that's the first day of the eight-team national playoff.

Last week's 28-21 win by NAU over defending NCAA Division II champ, Montana State, opened the door for NAU to get a bid from the West. If NAU finished 9-2, the Azecs stand a strong chance of hosting one of the four first-round Division II playoff games on November 26.

Another solid team effort has carried Northern Arizona University to another fine season this fall. Tom Jurich, the Lumberjack plackicker, is the lone individual leader in the league's statistical tabulation. However, the Azecs solidly out several categories.

Last fall NAU was the league's top team against the rush and in total defense and the Azecs have led both of those categories all season this fall.

NAU's new domed stadium continues to get attention from around the nation. Last week, a 51-inch story appeared in the Los Angeles Times, the second time in less than three months the 1-million plus circulated newspaper has carried a story on the NAU Dome. Arizona's newspapers, radio stations and TV stations as well as some magazines have given the NAU facility excellent coverage.

The ABC television network carried a 3-minute feature on the NAU dome nationwide in October and the university has feedback from the Houston, Tex., area, Pittsburg, Pennsylvania; Denver, Colorado; Minneapolis, Minnesota; Dallas, Texas and Kansas City, Missouri from people who saw the presentation.

LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Blome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on ground which is now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six or seven foot cross cuts with one man working on each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two... (From this) the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumber Jacks..." Mr. Blome is the younger son of R. H. H. Blome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter was written in July, 1977.

WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were used in the Arizona Arts Club as a "float." In 1934, they were used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in Feb. 1933, that it was stolen.

The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshman football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhoden Neece, Paul Guthrie, James Jacofetti, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Alben Delmonico.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, cradled in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."



TWO TIME WINNER — Larry Friedrichs, 6-2, 234-pound senior offensive guard won the John G. Yost Memorial award, symbolic of NAU's most valuable lineman for the second straight year. Presenting the award is Howard Yost who started the award in 1946 in honor of his brother who died in World War I, and was a member of NAU's first football team.

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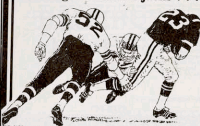

BOISE STATE CAPSULE UPDATE

Last fall the Boise Broncos, who had clinched Big Sky titles in 1973, 1974 and 1975, had to win their final two games to go 5-2-1 on the season and 4-4 in league play.

That, however, could serve as a spring board to another outstanding Boise State team to succeed what head coach Jim Crisp regards as 66 of all-time. Four of Boise's setbacks last fall added up to just 19 points -- or, with a lot of returns plus a banner wave of major college talent on hand the next year. Look out! These offense and seven defensive players return.

Teammates local support had helped Boise athletes beat some swelling from the junior college ranks in 1976 and over the past two years. Boise had a fantastic 78-24 2-point record -- each fall Boise wins an average of 11,000 season tickets. MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY CAPSULE UPDATE

What if you give a coach who won the 1976 national NCAA Division II football championship? Bobcats Montana State University head coach Eddy Holland would be delighted with a repeat and if the earth fall right in developing a sound running attack. No coach is in business.

Last fall MSU became the first Big Sky team to win a national title when the Bobcats beat Akron University of Ohio 24-7 for the title before a television TV audience. MSU scored 55 of 87 points. Last fall the Bobcats were coming off a 6-6 year in 1975 but the offensive and offensive lines were intact and there is a classic example of what line play means to successful football -- regardless of the level of play.

Quarterback Paul Demmy passed for 885 yards and 10 TD's and ran for 488 yards and scored 11 times as a sophomore and as a senior play was a key to MSU's 12-1 season. Deane Jones, best senior track blocking back, rushed for 495 yards and may be missed in back. MSU returns four starters and six back-up players on one of the offensive and defensive lines. Placekicker Jeff Muir scored 82 points last year at a total. Among on 14 of 25 field goals and 8 of 36 conversions.

EASTERN MONTANA COLLEGE CAPSULE OUTLOOK

After winning the Frontier Conference championship in 1976, the Yellowjackets posted a 3-6 record last fall. But the Yellowjackets have some outstanding players back.

Early injury on defense forced a lot of young players into action and as a result, the Yellowjackets gave up 450 yards a game, including 219 gains in the air. Opposing quarterbacks averaged 13 times against EMC while the EMC passing attack could muster only 26 yards a game passing and threw 256 on the ground in the Yellowjackets' run-oriented attack.
Greg Martin returns after gaining 637 yards last fall and Alabama transfer Joe Bolton gained 143 yards in the spring game when Brandon Finch who gained 3,400 yards and scored 44 times in high school will be on the ground for the first. Eastern Montana ranked 10th NAU in a wild game 36-34 in Flagstaff in 1976. In addition to playing NAU this year, the Yellowjackets also play Idaho State of the Big Sky.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA-OMAHA CAPSULE OUTLOOK

Last season the University of Nebraska-Omaha played perhaps the toughest Division I schedule in the nation, against the Mavericks and on top of losing to fewer than seven teams which made the list. It's moving the course of the season.

After being an independent last fall, the Mavericks move into the tough North Central Conference for the first time this fall, replacing Montana of Minnesota which dropped football last fall.
Last fall NAU ranked to beat the Mavericks in Omaha on a cold, rainy night, 28-17. UNO moved to a 13-0 lead and NAU started gaining momentum and scored eight before the half.
Last fall, IMP held various aim at restoring its semipro, status.

Last fall UNO relied heavily on the pass receiving of sensation Danny Fulon who caught 67 passes for 1,587 yards and 16 TD's. His 1,587 yards broke Ed Bear's Idaho State national mark and had 22 4-way air reception in an all-conference national mark. The running of fullback Clarence Elliott who had 852 yards last fall on 206 attempts plus the addition of sophomore Bobby Bess a former University transfer will help. UNO's defense will be improved if the line proves as tough as the offense does and linemen.

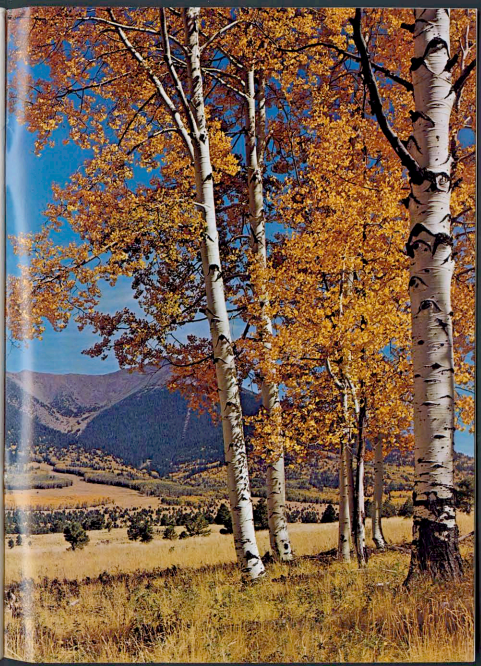

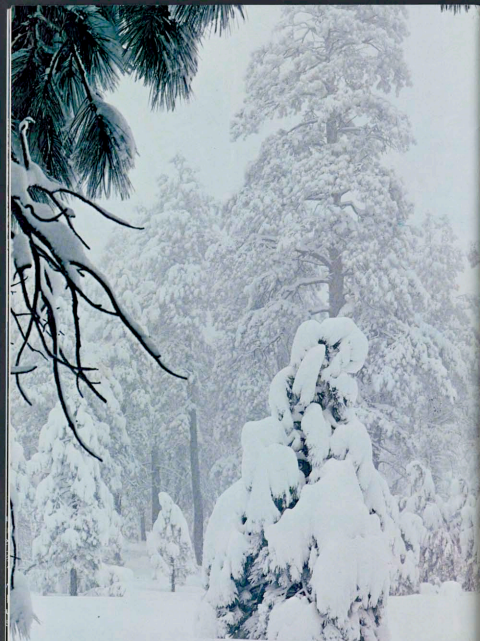
