

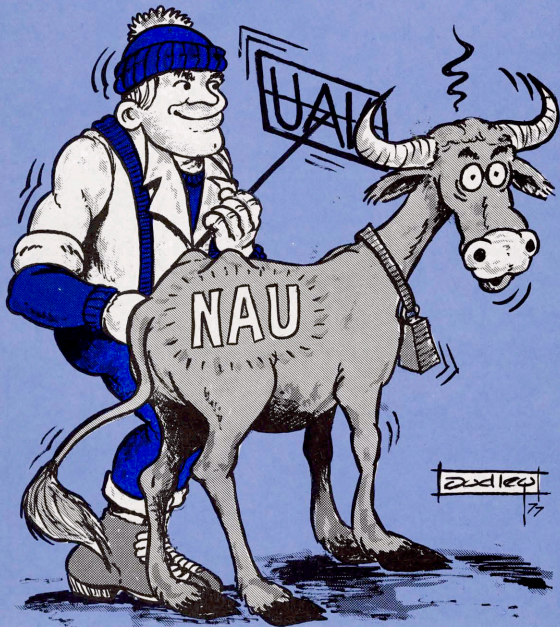

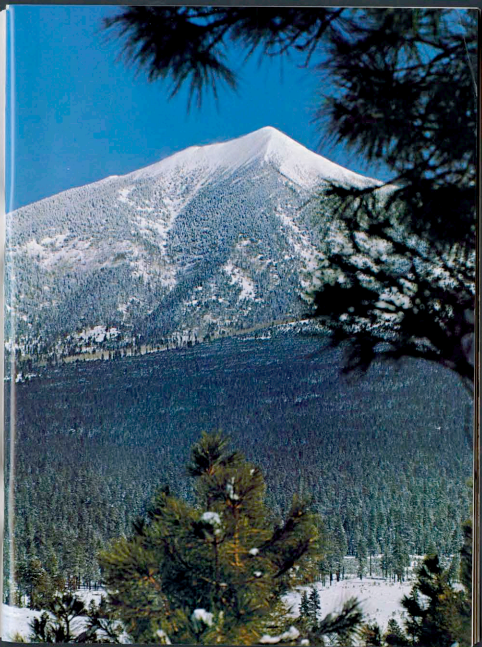

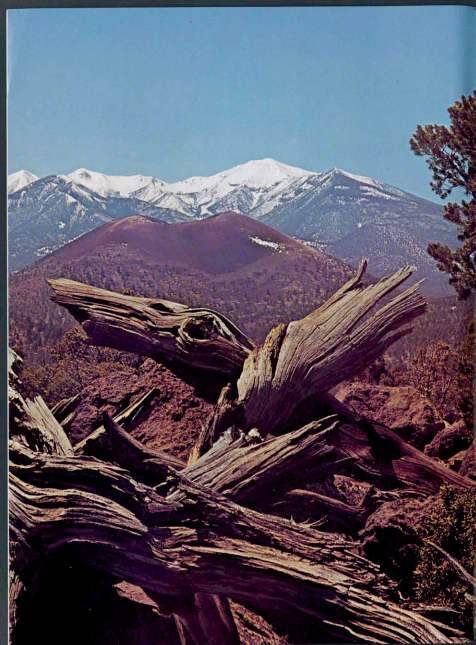

## PRESIDENT

Twenty years ago when Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was named president of Northern Arizona University, there were 1,142 students and the campus was housed in 18 buildings which covered 162 acres.

This fall more than 11,500 students are enrolled — a 10-fold increase since Dr. Walkup has been president and the 686-acre campus has more than 60 buildings.

In keeping pace with the needs of a growing university, the opening of the 272,000-square foot multi-purpose domed stadium this year is an example of the vision Dr. Walkup has possessed during his presidential tenure. His foresight has also provided the northland with a wide range of educational programs.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the University Elementary School and two years later, he was named head of the Education Department, equal to the Dean of the College of Education by today's standards. He was later named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1955 he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by many organizations. He has been teacher, coach and administrator.

Dr. Walkup holds the bachelor of sciences degree from Central Missouri State University while his master and doctoral degrees were earned at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Walkup's wife, Lucy, is a former teacher. They have one grown daughter.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

One momentous weekend last winter made the 27 years T. H. "Hank" Anderson has devoted to intercollegiate athletics well worth the time spent.

That's the weekend when Anderson's former basketball players gathered in Spokane, Wash., before a Gonzaga-NAU game for a reunion. The doctors, lawyers, dentists, educators and businessmen attending were testament enough that Hank had done his job well in working with young people. These successful people had played, at one time or another, for Hank during his 21 years at Gonzaga as athletic director and head basketball coach.

Anderson spent two years as head basketball coach at Montana State before coming to NAU where he is now in his fourth year as director of athletics of one of the quickest emerging athletic programs in the nation.

He was one of four finalists for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year last spring, a tribute to what he has done for NAU athletics.

Anderson helped organize the Big Sky Conference which started in 1962 and he has been a key part of its growth as it has gained in national prominence. His organizational skills and leadership ability have been instrumental in NAU's growth over the past four years.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become NAU's director of athletics he ranked in the top 10 nationally for career wins of active coaches with 316 triumphs. Anderson's Gonzaga teams shared Big Sky titles in 1966 and again in 1967 and he was conference coach of the year in 1966.

Anderson was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941 and he earned his master's degree from Gonzaga in 1965. He had a 167-43 prep record, coaching at Grants Pass, Baker and Medford in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1968-72 he served as director of the Greater Spokane (Wash.) Sports Association. He and his wife, Betty, are the parents of two grown children.

## NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state on this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 11th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era. The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686-acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 76 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world.

Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

## LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

Those familiar with Joe Salem's ability as a football coach were not at all surprised when he produced an 8-3 finish last season - NAU's best record in 18 years and first winning season since 1963.

Those that were surprised, now better appreciate his ability as a leader, organizer and recruiter - all of which add up to a successful program. After a 1-9 finish in 1975, pre-season tabulations pegged NAU for a 1-10 finish last fall and to go winless in Big Sky play. Salem and his staff took just four senior starters and an energetic group of underclassmen to that momentous 8-3 season which included a 4-2 league mark, good for third place. NAU reached as high as No. 6 nationally among NCAA Division II schools in the national rankings, seven Auer players made All-Conference and two more All-America. Six of those All-Conference players return.

Strong academic counseling and insistence that his football players work steadily toward a college degree has been Salem's philosophy as he enters his 12th year as a head coach at the college level. "When they are 35, they will appreciate the fact they have an education and a saleable job skill," says Salem. Before coming to NAU, Salem, 39, spent nine years as head coach at the University of South Dakota and his last three years there - 1972-73-74, his teams shared the North Central Conference titles. He was District C Coach of the year in 1972 and in 1968 he was named South Dakota Collegiate Coach of the Year.

In his final three years at South Dakota, his teams were 29-8 and he took over when the stock in South Dakota football was not too likely to enjoy a dip. He took over under similar circumstances at NAU.

"We can win with Arizona athletes," was one of Salem's first remarks after being named NAU's coach. Last fall more than half of the team was home grown as will be the case this fall - 10 of the 11 starters on the defensive unit last fall were Arizonans.

Salem and his wife, Sue, are the parents of four sons - Tom, 15, Wade, 13 and seven-year old twins Brent and Brad.

DAN RUNKLE is now in his sixth year as a member of Joe Salem's staff and he coordinates the defensive play of the Auer. Last year the defensive unit led the Big Sky in total defense and defense against the rush and for most of the season NAU's defense was nationally ranked in several categories. The 21-year old Runkle earned 10 varsity letters at Illinois College - four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He earned his master's degree at Western Illinois. He coordinates NAU's summer sports camp program. Runkle and his wife, Joelle, are the parents of a seven-year old son, Tad, and a year-old daughter, Sara Joelle.

DICK HEESCH - Last fall the offensive line at NAU started showing the "Dick Heesch touch" - that of producing consistent blocking to keep sustained drives alive. The 36-year old Heesch is in his fourth year of working under Salem and his coaching skills are apparent as his linemen know their assignments and execute them well. Was an all conference and at Huron College and earned his master's at South Dakota. Is a captain in the Arizona National Guard. Heesch and his wife, Rea, are the parents of four daughters, Robin 13, Julie 10, Susan 7 and Kristie 4.

JERRY JANSON - Also a four-year member of the Salem staff. The 27-year old Janson is in his second year of coaching the NAU defensive backs. Earlier he worked with the defensive line at NAU and South Dakota. Graduated from Carthage College in Wisconsin and earned his master's degree from Ohio State, where he was a graduate assistant during the 1972 and 1973 seasons, working with the national championship Buckeye teams. Earned varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball at Carthage.

JIM CLEMENTS - Heading into his second year as a member of the NAU coaching staff after serving a year as a graduate assistant in 1976. Coaches the defensive line and helped develop two first freshman tackles last fall in A. J. Bril and Jim Anders. The 27-year old Clements graduated from Arizona State and earned his master's degree from Eastern Michigan. Coached 12 years in native Detroit and at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. Has been valuable member of NAU's soccer division. Clements and his wife, Holly, are the parents of three children, Julie, 11, Tommy 5, and Jill 3.

MIKE SHANAHAN - After serving two years on the University of Oklahoma staff where he worked with the offensive unit and helped coach the Sooner junior varsity, Mike Shanahan came to NAU after the 1976 Fiesta Bowl. The 24-year old Shanahan earned his bachelor and master degrees from Eastern Illinois University where he played quarterback and defensive back. Shanahan is a rewinded, having married the former Peggy Brandt earlier this year.

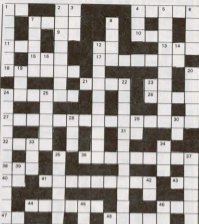

# TONIGHT'S GAME

For the University of Nebraska-Omaha, tonight's game marks the end of a madrace season. But, for Northern Arizona University, it hopefully signals the start of a second season and eventually a national championship.

Since before the Montana State game, the Lumberjacks have frequently been mentioned as having a very good chance of being one of eight teams invited to the Division I playoffs. ... if they could win all of their remaining games.

So far, NAU has lived up to their part with only tonight's game left on the schedule.

The Mavericks come into the Englewood with a record of 3-6-2. They have played one opponent common with Northern Arizona, Augustana College, also of the North Central Conference. In that game, NAU won 31-30 to open the season in Flagstaff while UNO lost 31-14 on the road at mid-season.

This marks the fourth meeting between the Mavericks and NAU, with the Lumberjacks winning all previous games.

Last year, NAU trailed 13-0 in a game played in the rain at Omaha, but came back in the second half to win going away 18-13. In that game, UNO's Danny Fulton, who was named All-America, put on a fine show catching eight passes for 177 yards including an 80-yard touchdown pass.

Although Fulton has been out of action for part of the current season, the 6-2 180-pound senior is back causing plenty of problems for opposing defensive backs, catching 87 passes for 1,587 yards and 16 touchdowns. He also set an NCAA record with 23.5 yards per catch reception.

Fulton has 35 receptors for 485 yards while Joe Noonan has 31 receptors for 435 yards.

Other UNO players to watch are running backs John Bowerscamp and Bob Bass. Bass has been among the top ten nationally in rushing and has gained 732 yards this season and has a 4.2 yards per carry average.

So, in a nutshell, tonight's contest is one in which UNO hopes to end the season on a winning note, and one in which NAU hopes will secure an invitation to the Division I playoffs.

The last time an NAU football team was in post-season play was 1986 when the Auerl lost in the finals of the NAU playoffs 13-12 to Northeastern Oklahoma in the Holiday Bowl before a nationwide TV audience.

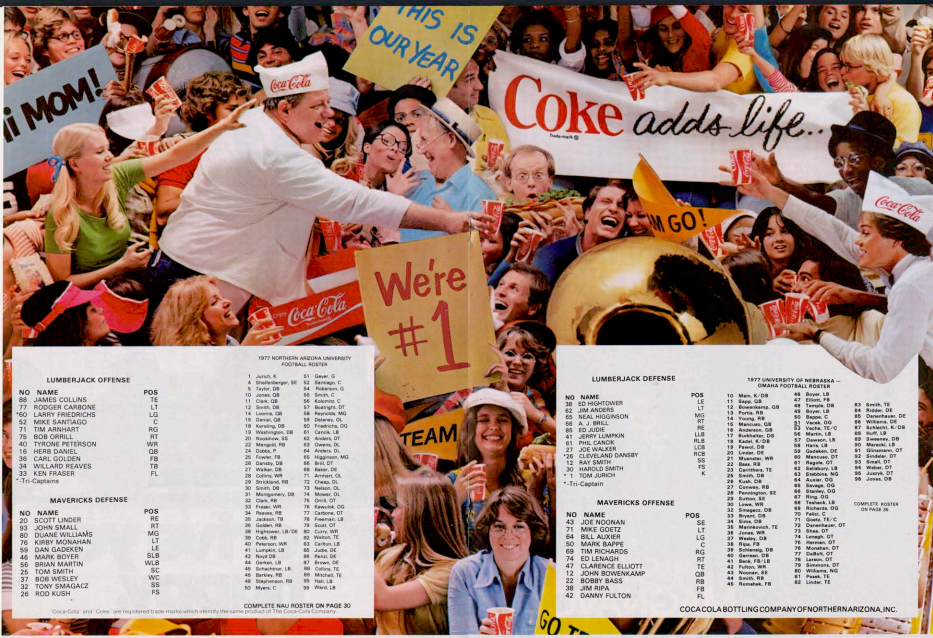

## YAVAPAI COUNTY ONE OF THE ORIGINAL FOUR

One of the four original counties established by the Arizona Territorial Legislature in 1864, Yavapai County's history is as rich as the varied landscapes rising out of the western desert land into the lush, full mountain areas occupying nearly 50 per cent of the county's 8,091 square miles.

Prescott, Coconino and Tonto National Forest covers 44 per cent of the land surrounding Arizona's first territorial capital, Prescott, today the county seat.

But with livestock and mining listed along with tourism as the principal industries, Yavapai County also offers vast rangeland to the north and desert areas in the west.

### FARM COUNTRY

According to the 1976 Arizona Statistical Abstract, nearly 400 Yavapai County farms sit on 2,314,393 acres while mining operations produce copper, cement, zinc, sand and gravel, molybdenum, stone lime, silver, gypsum, lead, clays gold and iron ore.

For the visitor, statistics are meaningless when compared to the natural beauty displayed throughout the countryside, a veritable recreational paradise with the

countryside, hunting, fishing, off road vehicle routes and even skiing for the cross country enthusiast during the winter months.

The Verde Valley flows with the Verde River and Clear Creek in and out of peaceful canyons.

### PLEASANT WEATHER

And Yavapai County offers all four seasons replete with their colors and yearly blooming with mean temperature of 52.8 degrees and a 12-month average rainfall totalling 19.32 inches.

Historically, John N. Goodwin, as the first Arizona governor, chose Prescott as his state capital, initially at Fort Whipple and later within what was then the new city of Prescott. Goodwin and his administrators found transportation and mining among the major problems of the day.

Today the county population approaches 40,000 with more than seven thousand people becoming new residents between 1960 and 1970.

Named for the Yavapai Indian, the county name means Sun People.

## Football Notes

With one regular-season game left, NAU has already made a massive assault on the record book as five team marks have fallen and former high school teammates Tom Jurich and Herb Daniel have accounted for the 16 individual records -- nine for Jurich, seven for Daniel.

Team marks to fall include most total offense in a season, 3,815 (old 3,669 in 1969); most points 287 (old 284 in 1969); most conversions in a game 10 (old 9 vs Cal-Northridge 1973); most field goals game 3 (old mark of 2 on 10 occasions); most field goals in season 15 (old 6 in 1971).

Jurich's marks include most points in a season 75 (old mark of 70 by Cruz Salas in 1956); most career points 143 (old mark of 101 by Monte Harris, also a kicker, in 1962-64); most career conversions 74 (old mark of 71 by Harris in 1962-64); most conversions in a game 10 (old mark of 9 by Gary Galati in 1973 vs Cal-Northridge); most field goals in a game 3 (Weber and Cal Poly Pomona) old mark of 2 done four times by Jurich, five times by Galati and once by Sonny Campbell;

Most field goals in a season 15 (old mark of 6 by Galati in 1971); most career field goals 23 (old mark of 16 by Galati in 1970-73); most 50-yard field goals in a season 3 (old was 2 by Galati in 1973). Most kick-scoring points in a game 12 vs Weber (old mark of 9 by Galati in 1973).

Daniel's marks include most career TD passes 24 (old of 19 by Mike Olson in 1968); most total offense 2,965 (old mark of 2,233 yards by David Estrada, 1961-64); most passing yardage 2,838 (old mark of 2,123 by Bob Stewart in 1969).

Most pass completions 209 (old mark of 139 by Olson 1968 and Stewart, 1969); most pass attempts 417 (old mark of 322 by Olson in 1968); most TD's responsible for career 30 -- 24 passing, six scored -- (Old record of 20 by Ron Cote, 1956-59).

Last season Daniel set a one-game mark with five TD passes in NAU's 34-7 win over Idaho State. Daniel and Jurich prepured at Arcadia, Calif., High.

Jurich continues to rank among the national scoring leaders in NCAA Division II circles with his 75 points. Other national leaders include Joe Walker and Ray Smith in punt returns -- Walker is averaging 16.8 yards a return and Smith 14.1.

Dan Fulton, Nebraska-Omaha's fine receiver, has fought off injury this season after a record-shattering performance a year ago when he caught 67 passes for 1,581 yards and 16 TD's. His yardage was a new NCAA Division II national mark as was his 23.6 yards per catch. Eight of the 11 games last fall he caught more than 100 yards in passes, including 317 against South Dakota.

A win over Nebraska-Omaha would give NAU the second most wins ever by an NAU team. The 1958 team was 11-1, losing in the finals of the Holiday Bowl in St. Petersburg, Fla., to Northeast Oklahoma before a nationwide TV audience, 19-13.

Seniors playing their final regular-season game at home tonight include Larry Friedrichs (60), Tom Jurich (1), Cleveland Dansby (26), Herb Daniel (79), John Walton (82), Joe Kersting (18), and Steve Scott (79). Thanks seniors for your dedication to the NAU football program.

## LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

### LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Biome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on ground which is now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six or seven foot cross cuts with one man working on each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two... (From this the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumber Jacks.... Mr. Biome is the younger son of R. H. H. Biome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter was written in July, 1977.

### WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were used by the Industrial Arts Club as a "float." In 1934, they were used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

### COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in Feb. 1933, that it was stolen.

The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshman football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodae Neece, Paul Guthrie, James Jacoetini, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Albert Dalmolin.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, cradled in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."

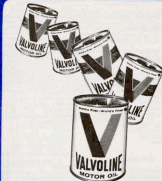

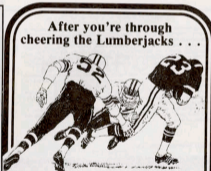

## BOISE STATE CAPSULE OUTLOOK

Last fall the Boise Broncos, who had celebrated Big Sky titles in 1973, 1974 and 1975, had to win their first two games to go 8-0 in the season and 2-0 in league play.

That, however, could serve as a springboard to another outstanding Boise State team as second year head coach Jim Coles returns 36 of 48 teammates. Four of Boise's seven best fall-ranked players (19 places) — all with top-10 conference stats — a better record of junior college talent and the word is: Look out! Nine offensive and seven defensive starters return.

Time-honored local support has elevated Idaho's athletic base since evolving from the minor college ranks in 1888 and over the past nine years, Boise has a fantastic 79-2-2 football record — even tall Boise stats in records of 11,000 season tickets.

The only new recruits in junior Fred Goodie who ranked 177 times for 716 yards and 7 TDs, still catching 34 passes for 833 yards and 4 TDs returns as does sophomore Mitch Brumley who had 537 yards on 106 carries and caught 17 passes for 98 yards — all at a frosh.

If last year's sole quarterback Don Pickett is injury free, he could lead a devastating Boise attack. If he isn't, redshirt sophomore Huskin Hogan could step in.

## MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY CAPSULE OUTLOOK

What do you give a coach who won the 1976 national NCAA Division I football championship? Well, Montana State University head coach Sorny Holland would be delighted with a repeat and if the cards fall right in developing a sound running attack, he could be on business.

Last fall MSU became the first Big Sky team to win a national title when the Bobcats beat Akron University of Ohio 24-13 for the title before a nationwide TV audience. MSU returns 55 of 67 lettermen. Last fall the Bobcats were coming off a 5-5 year in 1975 and the offensive and offensive lines were stout and that's a classic example of what the play means to successful football — regardless of the level of play.

Quarterback Paul Dennis played for 885 yards and 10 TDs and ran for 488 yards and scored 17 times as a sophomore and his steady play was a key to MSU's 12-1 season. Quarterbacks last year's career blocking football rushed for 495 yards and may be moved to outside. MSU returns four starters and six back up players on each half offensive and defensive line. Placekicker Jeff Muir scored 82 points last year as a frosh, hitting on 74 of 207 field goals and 24 of 28 conversions.

After winning the Frontier Conference championship in 1975, the Yellowjackets posted a 3-6 record last fall. But the Yellowjackets have some outstanding players back.

Early injury on offense forced a lot of young players into action and as a result, the Yellowjackets gave up 400 yards a game, including 212 yards in the all-opposing-press-attacks game. 12 corner against SMC, while the SMC passing attack could muster only 38 yards a game passing and two TD passes all season.

Last season the University of Nebraska-Omaha played, perhaps the toughest Division I schedule in the nation - against the Mavericks winning 10 fewer than their season which made the top 10 during the course of the season.

After being an independent last fall, the Mavericks move into the South North Central Conference for the first time this fall, replacing Montana of Minnesota which dropped football last fall.

The running of fullback Bobby Egan who had 852 yards last fall transfer will pass UWO's conference and the addition of senior back Bobby Egan a former Univ. of Oklahoma player who had 1,000 yards and 10 touchdowns in 1976.

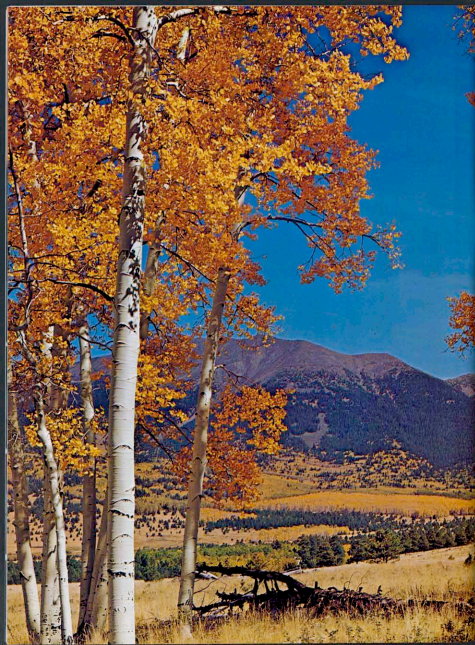
