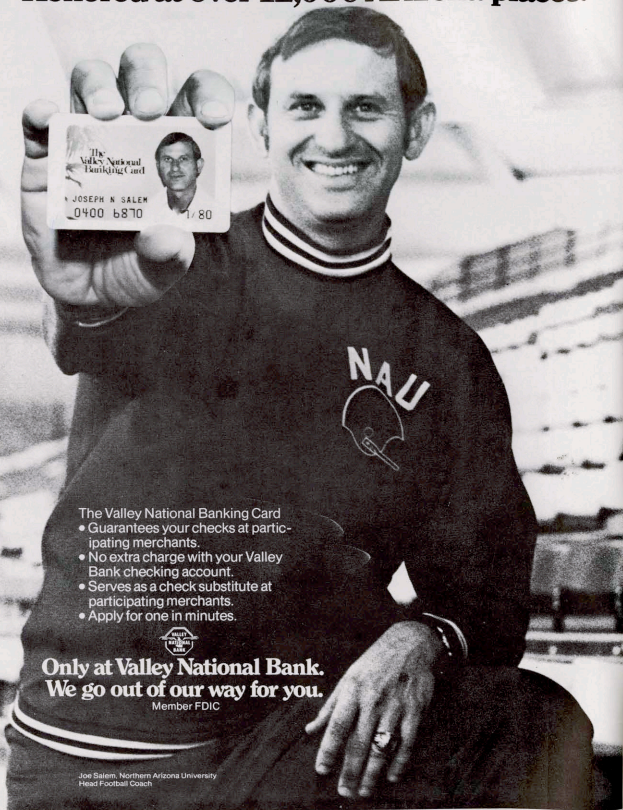

## PRESIDENT

Twenty years ago when Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was named president of Northern Arizona University, there were 1,142 students and the campus was housed in 18 buildings which covered 162 acres.

That fall more than 11,500 students are enrolled -- a 10-fold increase since Dr. Walkup has been president and the 686 acre campus has more than 60 buildings.

In keeping pace with the needs of a growing university, the opening of the 272,000-square foot multi-purpose domed stadium this year is an example of the vision Dr. Walkup has possessed during his presidential tenure. His foresight has also provided the northland with a wide range of educational programs.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the University Elementary School and two years later, he was named head of the Education Department, equal to the Dean of the College of Education by today's standards. He was later named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1955 he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by many organizations. He has been teacher, coach and administrator.

Dr. Walkup holds the bachelor of science degree from Carroll Missouri State University while his master and doctoral degrees were earned at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Walkup's wife, Lucy, is a former teacher. They have one grown daughter.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

One momentous weekend last winter made the 27 years T. H. "Hank" Anderson has devoted to intercollegiate athletics well worth the time spent.

That's the weekend when Anderson's former basketball players gathered in Spokane, Wash., before a Gonzaga-NAU game for a reunion. The doctors, lawyers, dentists, educators and businessmen attending were testament enough that Hank had done his job well in working with young people. These successful people had played, at one time or another, for Hank during his 27 years at Gonzaga as athletic director and head basketball coach.

Anderson spent two years as head basketball coach at Montana State before coming to NAU where he is now in his fourth year as director of athletics of one of the quickest emerging athletic programs in the nation.

He was one of four finalists for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year last spring, a tribute to what he has done for NAU athletics.

Anderson helped organize the Big Sky Conference which started in 1962 and he has been a key part of its growth as it has gained in national prominence. His organizational skills and leadership ability have been instrumental in NAU's growth over the past four years.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become NAU's director of athletics he ranked in the top 10 nationally for career wins of active coaches with 318 triumphs. Anderson's Gonzaga teams shared Big Sky titles in 1960 and again in 1967 and he was conference coach of the year in 1966.

Anderson was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941 and he earned his master's degree from Gonzaga in 1965. He had a 167-43 prep record, coaching at Grants Pass, Baker and Medford in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1966-72 he served as director of the Greater Spokane (Wash.) Sports Association. He and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five grown children.

## NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state of this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 111th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era. The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 76 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world. Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

**DEFENSIVE UNIT**

(64) DAN ANDERS, 6-6, 241, FR, DL, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Has the size we need, says defensive coordinator Dan Runkle. In addition to solid football background, Anders is an outstanding wrestler. Younger brother of Jim, both prepved at Tucson's Santa Rita High.

(62) JIM ANDERS, 6-2, 247, SO, DT, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Started all 11 games for NAU last year as a frosh at defensive tackle. Led down linemen with 87 stops, forced six fumbles, recovered three and had three quarterback sacks. Picked third in Big Sky wrestling tournament at heavyweight.

(68) FRANK BAKER, 6-2, 209, JR, DE, BOULDER, COLO.—A hard worker who could see a lot of action. Was in on 28 tackles in a reserve role last fall and made some key plays in bowl's 23-21 road win at Montana. Very popular with teammates. Prepved at Boulder High.

(57) LINDSAY "SCOTT" BOATRIGHT, 6-4, 212, SO, DT, MIAMI, FLA.—Saw limited action last fall because of injuries. Has ability and could see considerable action and needs only added aggressiveness to become a standout performer. Prepved on State 4-A championship Hialeah Lakes team in Miami.

(66) A. J. BRILL, 6-3, 231, SO, DT, GARDEN GROVE, CALIF.—Like Jim Anders, Brill started all 11 games last fall at defensive tackle as a frosh and he was in on 75 stops. Was only non-Arizona prep graduate in starting defensive unit last fall which led Big Sky in total and rushing defense. Had excellent spring. Prepved at Garden Grove High.

(87) PHIL BROWN, 5-4, 210, SO, MG, PHOENIX, ARIZ.—Played last year at Glendale Community College. Also played high school basketball.

(61) PHIL CANKIC, 6-2, 210, SO, LB, SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ.—Started at defensive end as a freshman but missed last year with knee injury. Had 87 tackles as frosh and forced three fumbles. Injured again in spring ball and if he's healthy, will be a major contributor to the team this fall. Prepved at Chaparral High where he had 30 tackles in single game.

(83) DAVE CARLTON, 6-5, 209, SO, LB, YUMA, ARIZ.—Played in just four winning games in his three years at Yuma High and he doubled that during NAU's 3-3 season. Part-time starter as frosh, very consistent and as strength developer, could be outstanding. Was in on 50 tackles last fall.

(26) CLEVELAND DANSBY, 5-11, 170, SR, DB, PHOENIX, ARIZ.—Was second in Big Sky with six interceptions, was in on 64 tackles, blocked three kicks and had eight pass deflections and his name was left off the Big Sky All-Conference ballot in error. Had excellent spring and has fine team leadership qualities. Played at South Mountain High and Phoenix College.

(78) JOHN FREEMAN, 6-5, 219, SO, LB, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Started last part of 1976 as frosh and was three-time most inspirational player in spring practice until injured and if he continues improvement, will be a major factor in the defensive unit's performance this fall. Prepved at Tucson's Sahuarito High.

(44) GREG GERKEN, 6-5, 198, FR, LB, DENVER, COLO.—An outstanding all round athlete at Regis High in Denver. Has wide range of athletic skills and most important, has a big desire to go with excellent size. Rated one of Colorado's top prep players.

(51) DAN GEYER, 602, 209, FR, LB, LAKE TAHOE, CALIF.— Twice selected at conference and was three-time most inspirational player on his team at South Tahoe High. Also played baseball, tennis and track.

(86) NEAL HIGGINS/SCHE 6-3,218, JR. MG. WINSLOW, ARIZ.—Found a home at middle guard last fall and turned in a superb job, making 86 tackles. Very consistent and has excellent speed and should be a key to the defensive unit. Was a 1,000-yard winner in high school as a fullback.

(38) ED HIGHTOWER, 6-0, 204, JR. DE/LB. PRESCOTT, ARIZ.—Started last season and was in 123 starts, forced four fumbles and had three sacks. Very consistent, excellent speed and played some as defensive end during fine spring practice. Should be another key to defensive unit. A 1,000-yard back at Prescott High and played in State All-Star game.

(85) ED JUDIE, 6-3, 213, FR. DE, TEMPE, ARIZ.—An outstanding athlete who excelled at conference and all state honors in both football and basketball at Tempe High. Good size and speed and his athletic skills include amateur boxing.

(18) JOE KERSTING, 6-0, 180, SR. DB. PHOENIX, ARIZ.—A spot player in 1976 after redshirting following transfer from northeast Missouri State. Had a very good spring, is a smart player who can make a big contribution this fall.

(41) JERRY LUMPKIN, 6-0, 207, JR. LB. SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ.—Came to NAU as a 105-pound walk-on defensive back in 1975 and last fall he established a school record for tackles with 128 from his linebacker spot and was honored by the Western Reserve Sports Democrat of Warren, Ohio for his major contribution to NAU's 9-3 season. Forced four fumbles, recovered two and had two sacks. Prep'd at Scottsdale High.

(48) DOUG MILAK, 6-10, 170, FR. LB. TUCSON, ARIZ.—Was defensive captain at Santa Rita High last fall and was named the team's most valuable defensive player. A hard-nosed football player.

(31) HAYWARD MONTGOMERY, 6-1, 188, FR. DB. COLORADO SPRINGS, COLO.—An all around athlete at Weason High in Colorado Springs where he started on excellent Thunderbolt football and basketball teams. Rushed for more than 500 yards, intercepted eight passes and was considered one of the top athletes in Colorado Springs.

(20) DAVE NOOSHOW, 6-0, 170, FR. SS, SPARTA, N. J.—Earned all conference and all area honors last fall at Sparta High. Also played basketball.

(42) KEVIN NOYD, 6-0,170, FR. DB. PHOENIX, ARIZ.—Excellent foot mobility and has ability to cover receivers on man-to-man basis. Outstanding mobility and coverer at a lot of territory quickly. Should fit into NAU's defensive unit well. Prep'd at East High in Phoenix.

(63) RUSSELL OWENS, 6-4, 236, FR. DL. PALMATA, CALIF.—An outstanding football player who has size, speed and is extremely aggressive. Is very fast for a big man. Was one of LaPore's standout athletes last two years.

(86) RICK RENZI, 6-2,208, SO. DE. SIERRA VISTA, ARIZ.—Started most of last fall as a fullback and had three sacks and two interceptions. Very aggressive and played with intensity and performed well last fall. Shoulder injury needed surgery in spring and is questionable for this fall. Prep'd at Buena High in Sierra Vista and played in State All-Star game.

(86) TONY REYNOLDS, 6-5, 232, SO. MG. AVONDALE, ARIZ.—Was named the outstanding senior athlete at Agua Fria High. Played football and basketball. Could develop into one of the top defensive players ever at NAU.

(45) JOHN SCHACHTNER, 6-4, 211, FR./LB. GLENDALE, CALIF.—A very sound all round athlete, with very good athletic skills. Has good size, excellent speed and can play either defensive end or linebacker. Should make instant contribution to NAU football. Prep'd at Avondale High.

(4) LEEV STELLENBERGER, 5-8, 150, FR. DB. TORRINGTON, WYO.—Lettered two years at Torrington High in Florence, Ariz. Also was member of the track team.

(30) HAROLD SMITH, 6-2, 195, JR. DB. FLORENCE, ARIZ.—An all-around athlete at Florence High where he made all state in football and basketball and was a 1,000-yard back in high school and set all-time Arizona prep record with 30 career interceptions. Unlimited potential and can improve as much as he wants. Was first-team All Big Sky as a sophomore, was in on 81 tackles, had three interceptions and forced three fumbles.

(12) RAY SMITH, 5-8, 195, JR. DB. FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ.—Led Big Sky and was third nationally last fall in punt returns with an 18.1 average. Had a 90-yard run against Weber for a score and a 12-yard, against Fullerton for another, following a short punt that took a favorable NAU bounce. Was in on 64 tackles, forced two fumbles and had five pass deflections. Another 1,000-yard prep back who starts on defense—(offert: Hugginson, Hightower and Harold Smith. All-State in football, basketball, and baseball at Flagstaff's Cocomino High. Has played baseball and JV basketball at NAU and his play at spring safety in spring was steady and should have fine fall.

(27) JOE WALKER, 6-0, 171, JR. DB. SIERRA VISTA, ARIZ.—Has excellent footwork and the ability to run man-to-man coverage. Was in on 48 tackles and had seven deflected passes last fall. An all round athlete at Buena High in Sierra Vista where he was an honor student. Was able to improve as much as he desires.

(119) MIKE WASHINGTON, 6-0, 185, SO. DB. LONG BEACH, CALIF.—Was a spot player as a freshman, starting one game and seeing a lot of action with the special teams on kick situations. Was in on 19 tackles. Needs to show marked improvement and become more consistent to help the team. Prep'd at Poly High in Long Beach.

(89) STEVE WARD, 6-0, 180, FR. LB. EVANSTON, ILL.—Was a two-year letterman at Evanston Township High, earning all conference and all area honors. Also played LaCrosse.

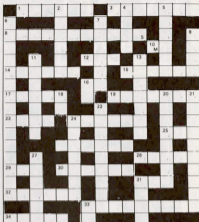

TONIGHT'S GAME

As far as Northern Arizona University's football team is concerned, last weekend's open date couldn't have been more strategically planned.

In their 27-13 Big Sky loss to Boise State two weeks ago, the Lumberjacks not only were beaten outright but were beaten up both physically and mentally. If they could have been ready to play a team the caliber of tonight's opponent, Montana State.

Key defensive players, young safety Ray Smith and end Ed Judie, limped off the Boise field with knee injuries. While they may be questionable tonight, they certainly would not have played last weekend. And many other players received more than the usual amount of bumps and bruises. The week off certainly helped them heal. That will be a big help tonight.

And tonight's conference finale is important for NAU. The Jacks, 4-1 in league play, still could tie or pass league-leading Boise State should they beat Montana State tonight and the Broncos visit Idaho State Nov. 5 or Idaho Nov. 26. An NAU victory tonight also could give the Jacks a Nov. 26 date in the Division II playoffs. Boise is ineligible to go because of its game against Idaho that first date in the playoffs.

A big plus for NAU tonight would be the return of Allan Clark, the Axers' top rusher with 805 yards in 123 carries. Clark suffered a knee injury three weeks ago against Cal-Fullerton and is extremely doubtful tonight. Since his injury the rushing game has been anemic.

NAU will be looking to Fullback Carl Golden, himself plagued by injuries, to pick up the slack. He has 570 yards in 124 attempts. Quarterback Herb Daniel has completed 96 of 192 passes for 1,340 yards and 10 touchdowns.

It's been a disappointing year for Montana State, poked by many to defend its Big Sky and perhaps its Division II National crown. But the Bobcats now stand 6-2 overall and 3-2 in conference following their 24-19 win against rival Montana last week.

An interesting aspect of tonight's game will be how the Jacks handle Delmar Jones, Montana State's star tightback. NAU, which had been strong against the running game all season, was destroyed by the ground force of Boise's Terry Zahner (206 yards) and Cedric Minter (113).

The Bobcats don't throw often, but when they do quarterback Paul Dennish looks to wide receivers Mark McGrath, Jeff Muri and Scott Quisenberry and tight end Ron McCullough.

Last year the Bobcats bombed NAU 33-0 in Bozeman. Overall they hold a 9-2 series edge over the Lumberjacks.

**NEXT HOME GAMES:** Next week's game with Eastern Montana will be Nevigo County night and large crowd from the Winlaw and Holdrege areas are expected. Tickets in Holdrege may be picked up at Hall-Masters and in Winlaw at Mosley-Hall Motors.

The Nov. 19 game with Nebraska-Omaha will be Yampack County Night and tickets for that game are available in Prescott at Steward's Shoes and One-Hour Martinizing Dry Cleaning and Prescott Drive-In Cleaners. Both of those games will have 7:30 p.m. starts.

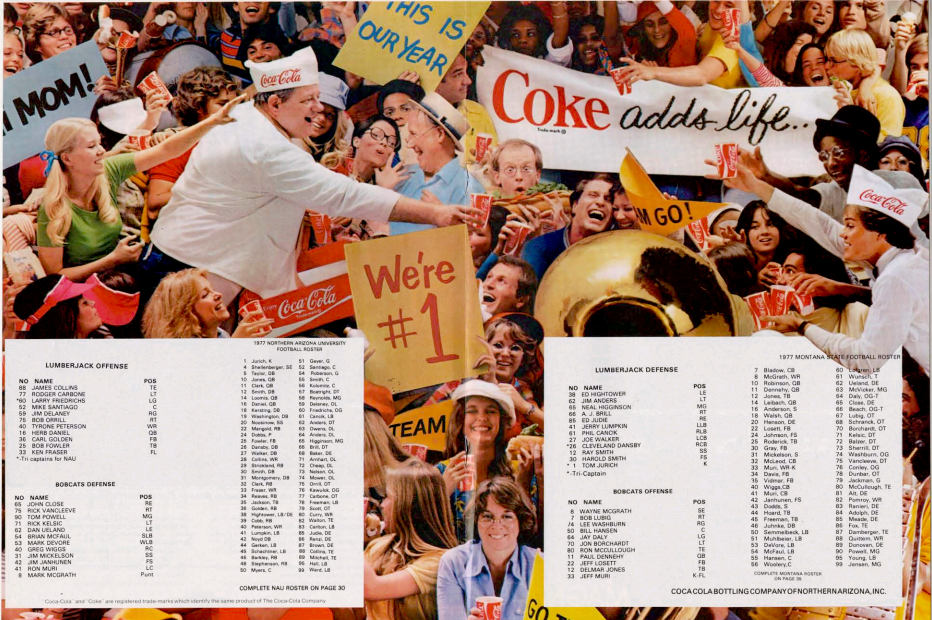

## LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

### LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Blome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on ground which is now one of about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six or seven foot cross cuts with one man working on each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two... (From this) the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumber Jacks..." Mr. Blome is the younger son of R. H. Blome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter was written in July, 1977.



**TWO TIME WINNER** — Larry Friedrichs, 6-2, 234-pound senior offensive guard won the John G. Yost Memorial award, symbolic of NAU's most valuable lineman for the second straight year. Presenting the award is Howard Yost who started the award in 1946 in honor of his brother who died in World War I, and was a member of NAU's first football team.

### WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were used by the Industrial Arts Club as "floats." In 1934, they were used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

### COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in Feb., 1933, that it was stolen. The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshman football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodes Neece, Paul Guthrie, James Jiacometti, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Albert Delmonin.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, carried in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."

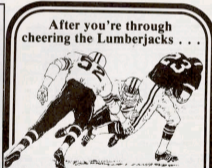

Now head coach Jim Jones welcomes back 28 freshmen from last fall's 9-6-1 team. Jones observes a balance between the recruiting and passing attack. Jones brought in 10 junior college transfers plus 20 freshmen, so the Broncos will have several new faces to go with some returned returners.

Jones, a 1959 graduate of the University of California, will use the 1/1 formation offensively and defensively. He Broncos will utilize the 52 foot. Jones had a 72-26-3 high school record.

Cal Poly welcomes back ace receiver Teddy Myers who caught 32 passes for 389 yards and 7 TD last fall. The running game will have to be rebuilt and the offensive line looks to get back together with Sammy Biss, who completed 22 of 66 last year as a reserve, the new apartment. Richard Dan Moran is also in the running.

**CAL FULLERTON CAPSULE OUTLOOK**

If a rugged early-season schedule can be met with some success, the California State University Fullerton football team will have their best record since the 1974 Titans went 7-4.

Last year the Titans went 9-7 and the 1975 team went 2-9 under Coach Jim Coakley. Coakley has had some solid recruiting years and he feels he has the talent to produce a good team this fall. But the first three games include Long Beach State, San Diego State and San Jose State.

The major college Titans - members of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association - started 1-7 against NAU. The Titans won 20-12 to close the season but fell in California when the Titans won a come-from-behind 10-7 game to launch the 1974 season for them.

Among the 32 returning letterman are 18 starters and 28 newcomers from junior college and high school camps and others. Cal Fullerton's linebacker coach is Larry Abate, who quarterbacked NAU in 1962-66.

## BOISE STATE CAPSULE OUTLOOK

Last fall the Boise Broncos, who had claimed Big Sky titles in 1973, 1974 and 1975, had to wait their first two games to go 6-5-1 on the season and 2-8 in league play.

That, however, could serve as a spring board to another outstanding Boise State team to record year head coach Jim Coyle returns 68 of 88 returning. Four of Boise's seniors last fall added up to just 19 points -- so, with a lot of returnees plus a banner wave of junior college talent on hand the word is: Look out! None offensive and seven defensive starters return.

Temperatures listed against the Boise State athletic state still evolving from the junior college ranks in 1976 and over the past nine years, Boise has a terrific 78-24-2 football record -- each fall Boise teams in excess of 17,000 season spectators. ## MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY CAPSULE OUTLOOK

What if you give a coach who won the 1972 national NCAA Division II football championship? Well, Montana State University head coach Sunny Holford would be delighted with a repeat and if the cards fall right in redeveloping a sound running attack, he could be in business.

Last fall MSU became the first Big Sky team to win a national title when the Bobcats beat Akron University of Ohio 24-7 for the title before a nationwide TV audience. MSU returns 85 of 87 starters. Last fall the Bobcats were coming off a 5-0 year in 1975 but the defensive and offensive lines were intact and that's a classic example of what one only plays to successfully football -- regardless of the size of play.

Quarterback Paul Dennery passed for 489 yards and 10 TD's and ran for 488 yards and scored 17 times as a sophomore and his steady play was a key to MSU's 7-2-1 season. Quarterback Jones, last year's crack blocking fullback, rushed for 488 yards and may be moved fullback. MSU returns four starters and six back-up players on each the offensive and defensive line. Pilebacker Jeff Muir scored 82 points last year as a frosh, hitting on 14 of 22 field goals and 34 of 38 conversions.
