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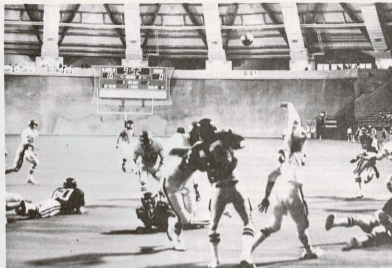
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LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL: A WINNER

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PRESIDENT

When Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was appointed president of Northern Arizona University 2 1/2 years ago, the enrollment that fall semester of 1957 was 1,622 students and the campus encompassed 16 buildings on 162 acres.

This fall, more than 12,500 students will be utilizing the 80 buildings located on 686 acres to advance their educations.

In keeping with the needs of a growing university, the opening of a new nursing building, the planning of additions to the library and bookstore and of course the opening of the 272,000 square foot multi-purpose domed stadium reflected Dr. Walkup's vision of the university's needs during his presidential tenure. The northland now has a wide range of educational programs at all levels because of his guidance.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the university elementary school and two years later, he was named Head of the Education Department, equal today to the Dean of the College of Education. Later, he was named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1955, he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by numerous organizations and societies. He has been teacher, coach and administrator. He received his undergraduate education at Central Missouri State University and his advanced degrees from the University of Missouri. Dr. Walkup was a finalist for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year in 1976.

Dr. Walkup and his wife, Lucy, a former teacher, have a grown daughter.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Athletics at Northern Arizona University received a motivational boost when T. H. "Hank" Anderson was named athletic director in the spring of 1974. Hank Anderson and the Big Sky Conference are familiar with each other — Hank helped in organizing the fast growing league in the early 1960's and his guidance and direction have been sought by all members of the Big Sky as well as other institutions across the country, at one time or another.

Anderson spent 21 years as head basketball coach and athletic director at Gonzaga University then as head basketball coach at Montana State University for two years before coming to NAU to restructure the Lumberjack athletic fortunes.

For his immediate influence not only on NAU athletics but around Arizona as well, Anderson was a finalist for the Arizona Sports Personality of the Year in 1977.

During the winter of 1977, Anderson's former Gonzaga players at Gonzaga staged a reunion and the former Gonzaga players that played for Anderson who now are doctors, dentists, educators and businessmen was testament enough that he did his job well in working with young people.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become athletic director at NAU, he ranked in the top 10 of active coaches for career wins with 218. His Gonzaga teams shared the Big Sky title in 1966 and 1967 and he was Big Sky Coach of the Year in 1966.

Anderson, who was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941, had a 167-43 record as a prep coach at Grants Pass, Baker and Medford — all in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Holms Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1968-72 he served as director of the greater Spokane, Wash., Sports Association and he and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five grown children.

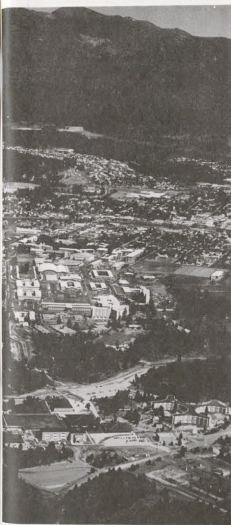


NAU Athletic Director Hank Anderson and wife Betty

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NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state of this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 11th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era. The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 76 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world.

Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here and the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

Stock in Lumberjack football has taken a sharp up-turn and the man behind the surge in the past three years has been Joe Salem who is heading into his fourth year as Northern Arizona University's head coach.

Last fall NAU finished 9-3 and tied for the No. 5 spot nationally in the final NCAA Division II poll and for this, Salem was named Big Sky and NCAA District 8 coach of the year honors. His 1976 team was 8-3 and strongly showed things were brought on the horizon for NAU football.

Before coming to NAU the 40-year old Salem had been head coach at the University of South Dakota for nine years and his teams there won 29 of their last 37 games and sharing North Central Conference titles in 1972, 1973 and 1974. Salem's first NAU team in 1975 was 1-9, but that crew was mostly freshmen and those "yearlings" will be putting on their collegiate caps for the final time this fall.

As a player, Salem helped quarterback the University of Minnesota to the 1960 national title and a shot in the Rose Bowl. He then spent five years as an assistant at Minnesota before going to South Dakota, taking over a team such as he inherited at NAU.

Strong academic counseling and insistence that his football players work steadily toward a degree program has been a Salem trademark during his 12 years as a head coach. As a result, more than 30 percent of Salem's players have graduated over the past 12 years. "We expect our players to have a positive attitude toward their alma mater once their playing days are over," says Salem. "Academic degree helps in this respect."

Salem and his wife, Sue, have four sons - Tim, 16, Wade, 14, and eight-year old twins Brad and Brent. Tim is a budding athlete on his own, having started at quarterback at Flagstaff's Cocconino High as a sophomore last fall. Wade is a developing baseball player and the twins seldom miss an NAU football practice.

JERRY JANSON A five-year member of the Salem staff. The 28-year old Janson is in his third year of coaching the defensive backfield. He coached the defensive line for two. A graduate of Carthage College in Wisconsin and earned his master's degree at Ohio State where he was a graduate assistant during the 1972 and 1973 seasons, working with national championship Buckeye teams. Earned varsity letters at Carthage College in football, basketball and baseball.

PAT MORRIS

PAT MORRIS is new to the Northern Arizona University football coaching staff, having joined NAU for spring drills to replace Dick Hesch who entered business in Flagstaff. He will coach the offensive line. The 24-year old Morris is a 1976 graduate of the University of Southern California. Morris played offensive guard on the 1975 USC team which won Rose Bowl and national titles. He also played on the 1976 Liberty Bell championship team. A graduate of Aetnary High in Missoula, Mo., Morris played eight years of rugby during high school and college days.

DAN RUNKLE is the man behind the chalk that has drawn up the NAU defense which has led the Big Sky in total defense and defense against the rush the past two seasons. NAU led the Big Sky in defense against scoring last year and was 13th nationally against the rush. This is Runkle's seventh season as Joe Salem's defensive coordinator. Since Runkle joined Salem's staff, the duo have worked out a 47-23 record. The 32-year old Runkle earned 10 varsity letters at Illinois College - four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He earned his master's at Western Illinois. In the summer, he coordinates the NAU Sports Camp. Runkle and his wife, Joelle, are the parents of an eight-year old son, Tad, and a two-year old daughter, Sara Joelle.



JIM CLEMENTS

JIM CLEMENTS the 38-year old Clements is in his third year of coaching the NAU defensive line and his forward wall has been a key factor in several NAU games over the past three years. A graduate assistant in 1975 and has helped with the steady progress of the tough NAU defense. A graduate of Arizona State University who earned his master's degree at Eastern Michigan. Coached 12 years in native Detroit and at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. Has been outstanding at working with young defensive linemen and developing their skills. Has been a key member of the NAU booster club fund raising staff. He and his wife, Holly, are the parents of three children, Julie, 12, Tommy, 6 and Jill, 4.



PAT LAVIN

PAT LAVIN one of the top prep coaches in Arizona high school history joined the NAU staff in the winter when Mike Shanahan left to take the offensive coordinator's post at his alma mater. A 1968 graduate of Arizona State University, Lavin earned his master's at Phoenix State. After graduating from ASU, Lavin was assistant at Phoenix State. He spent 1974 after head job in 1971 and held a stint coming to NAU. His seven-year mark was 64-13-2 and he had four consecutive Division and State playoff appearances before coming to NAU. He coached 14 All-Stars, including two prep All-Americans He and his wife, Linda, have three children, Jeanne, 9, Brent, 7 and Natalie, 5.

(84) DAN ANDERS, 6-5, 230, SO, DT, GILBERT, ARIZ.—Really established himself in spring football. Prepped at Tucson's Santa Rita High where he was solid football player and wrestler. Had 19 sacks and 3 sacks as frosh last fall. Younger brother of Jim.

(82) JIM ANDERS, 6-3, 251, JR, DT, GILBERT, ARIZ.—Has started every game since arriving on campus. Was second team All Big Sky defensive tackle last fall. Has finished third in Big Sky wrestling tournament as heavyweight last two seasons. Had 107 tackles last fall, including seven sacks. Forced four fumbles and recovered six. Had 87 tackles, six forced fumbles and three recoveries as frosh. Prepped at Tucson's Santa Rita High. Family now lives in Gilbert.

(81) PH CANICK, 6-2, 221, JR, LB, SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ.—Started at defensive end as freshman in 1975, but sat out '76 with an injury returned last fall and earned starting linebacker spot where he was in on 83 ticks, forced five fumbles and recovered two and had four sacks. Had 87 tackles as NAU frosh. Had 30 tackles in one game in high school for Chapparral against Yuma.

(83) DAVE CARLTON, 6-6, 219, SO, DE, YUMA, ARIZ.—Saw considerable action in 1976 as frosh, but was injured early last fall after gaining a starting spot. Looked very effective in spring drills and should be ready for a solid year this fall. Prepped at Yuma High and is very aggressive.

(85) BRIAN DALEY, 6-3, 215, FR, DL, LONG BEACH, CALIF.—Was first-team All City at St. Anthony's High in Long Beach. Made several key plays last fall for St. Anthony's and should fit right into NAU's defensive scheme for 1978.

(86) ANTHONY "TONY" FELIX, 6-2, 217, FR, LB, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Was All-State, All-Conference and All-City the past two seasons at Tucson's Amphitheater High where he helped team win two spots in state AA playoffs. Hard-nosed player with the ability to make key play.

(84) GREG GERKEN, 6-4, 214, SO, DE, DENVER, COLO.—Started to assert himself in spring drills after being a key member of the specialty teams last fall. An all-around athlete at Regis High in Denver, where he was one of state's top prep players. Has size and desire to become quality player.

(85) NEAL HIGGINSON, 6-3, 231, SR, MG, WINSLOW, ARIZ.—Third year as starting middle guard. Had 105 tackles last fall, forced four fumbles, recovered two, and had seven sacks. Had 96 sacks as a sophomore. Was a 1,000-yard fullback as a senior at Winslow High. One of most underrated defensive players in Big Sky Conference.

(88) ED HIGHTOWER, 6-0, 207, SR, DE, PRESCOTT, ARIZ.—Led NAU with 128 ticks last fall after having 123 as a sophomore. Had eight forced fumbles, five recoveries and 18 sacks last season but earned only "honorable mention." All Big Sky. Made many key defensive plays. Was a 1,000-yard back at Prescott High where he made All-State both offensive and defensive. Played in State All-Star games. Drove covers for Academic All-America last fall.

(87) JON HIGHTOWER, 6-0, 171, FR, DB, PRESCOTT, ARIZ.—In addition to being a productive football player, Jon was also one of the state's top prep punters last year. Rushed for over 1,000 yards last fall.

(76) **STEVE JOHNSON**, 6-3, 200, FR, DL, MIRA COSTA, CALIF.—A wide range of athletic ability who has the skill to develop into a productive member of the lumberjack program. Showed a lot of promise last fall at Mira Costa High.

(85) **ED JOSE**, 6-3, 227, SO, DE TEMPE, ARIZ.—Has come to be recognized as one of the top young defensive ends in college football—regardless of classification. An injury forced him into starting lineup last fall early in the season and he made 83 tackles, forced three fumbles, recovered two and had 17 ticks. Cagy player who is hard to block away from the ball carrier. Was an All-round guard at Tempe, Ariz.

(41) **JERRY LIMPKE**, 6-0, 210, SR, LB, SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ.—Was first-team All Big Sky and honorable mention All-America last fall. Was second on team in tackles with 120 after setting school record with 135 as a sophomore. Came to NAU as a 165-pound walk-on defensive back from Scottsdale, Ariz. High hand-work and dedication moved him into starting lineup as a sophomore and he's been solidly entrenched ever since.

(18) **CLIFFORD SELLS**, 5-11, 184, FR, DL, PHOENIX, ARIZ.—A four-year varsity performer at Phoenix St. Mary's High. Helped team to 42-6 record and played in state AAA playoffs all four years. Earned All-State honors last fall. Had seven interceptions. Very quick and tough.

(30) **HAROLD SMITH**, 6-2, 206, SR, DL, FLORENCE, ARIZ.—A two-time first-team All Big Sky Conference line safety who was honorable mention All-America last fall. Covers a lot of territory and plays the run as well as any defensive back in America. Made 134 tackles last two seasons and has forced five fumbles last two seasons. Was All-State in football and basketball at Florence High. Set all time Arizona prep record with 30 pass interceptions. Was also a 1,000-yard plus running back at Florence.

(12) **RAY SMITH**, 5-6, 185, SR, DL, FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ.—Was first-team All-State in football, basketball and baseball at Flagstaff's Cocconino High. Led NAU in interceptions with five last fall and was in on 74 tackles. Is the career Big Sky punt return leader with 533 yards. Was third nationally as a sophomore and seventh last fall in punt returns. Was another 1,000-yard plus running back in high school—one of four which start on defense. Ed Highwater, Higginson and Harold Smith are the others.

(27) **JOE WALKER**, 5-11, 180, SR, DL, SIERRA VISTA, ARIZ.—A three-year starter at cornerback. Quick feet and plays the pass well. Led Big Sky in punt returns last fall and was third nationally. Teams with Ray Smith to go NAU one of the top punt return units not only in the Big Sky but the NCAA Division I-AA ranks as well. One of three former Sierra High players in NAU's starting lineup. (Lynne Peterson and Rick Renzi, and others)

(84) **STEVE WARD**, 6-0, 183, SO, DE EVANSTON, ILL.—Was a two-year letterman at Evanston, Township High, earning All-Conference and All Area honors. Very physical and tough for size. Showed some promise in spring drills.

(11) **CHUCK WALLIG**, 6-0, 184, FR, DL, SANTA FE SPRINGS, CALIF.—Set an all-time California prep record with 10 pass interceptions last season. Was first team All Southern California and made several Prep All-America teams. Sought after by several of the bigger schools, but picked NAU for its close-knit atmosphere.

(16) **ROBERT MILLER**, 5-8, 166, FR, DL, IDAHO FALLS, IDA.—Earned the reputation as Idaho's hardest-hitting defensive back last fall at Idaho Falls' Highland High. All Conference, All Area and All State. An All-round athlete who gives a 110 percent on every play.

(31) **HAYWARD MONTGOMERY**, 6-0, 183, SO, DL, COLORADO SPRINGS, COLO.—Saw considerable action last fall as a freshman and learned spring drills as the top strong safety, a spot vacated when Ray Smith moved to cornerback. Montgomery made several key plays on speciality teams last fall. Was an all-round athlete at Watson High in Colorado Springs, helping football and basketball teams to state playoffs.

TONIGHT'S GAME

The Lumberjacks are returning home for their first game in the Dome since their October 7th game with Cal Poly-Pomona. After NAU's stunning 43-22 win at Montana State two weeks ago, the Avers knew they'd have a smooth ride back into town, because they rode all the way in the Big Sky Conference driver's seat.

All the Asxas have to do now is win either tonight's game with Boise State or next week's season finale with Weber State and they've got their first Big Sky football championship trophy, and you can bet that the Jacks would like to get it over with as soon as possible. Add to that the fact that NAU needs to win both games to have a chance at a berth in the NCAA's Division I-AA national playoffs.

Boise State will be a formidable foe. Coach Joe Salem says they're the best team in the league. They have a 7-2 overall record and their 3-2 conference mark still gives them a mathematical shot at a tie for the Big Sky crown. The game will be televised live back to Boise. The Broncos lead the series with six wins in seven games with NAU. The only Lumberjack win was a 42-7 victory in 1976. Last year Boise State won in Boise, 27-13.

Among the speculators in the Dome tonight will be Big Sky commissioner Steve Belko. The league has always had a representative in the post-season playoffs since there have been playoffs to go to. If NAU does win this week and next, it'll still be anybody's guess as to whether they're invited. Two wins would give the Jacks an 8-2 record and the selection committee might feel that's good enough for one of the four berths.

The only Big Sky championships that NAU has won in the past have been in track and field (1971 and 1975) and a tie for the conference title in 1971.

Tonight's game will feature the league's top two rushers, Boise State's Cedric Minter (20) and Lumberjack Allan Clark (32). It'll be interesting to see what adjustments the Broncos make defensively to stop NAU's "new offense" under the direction of quarterback Steve Loomis. The "new offense" premiered against Montana State two weeks ago and was virtually unstoppable.

The Lumberjacks feel they have something to prove tonight against Boise State, and if they want next week's game to not be their last, they'd better do it.

NEXT WEEK: NAU will play Weber State in the final Big Sky game of the season in the NAU Dome and kickoff is set for 7 p.m. Boise State plays at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo in a non-conference encounter.

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BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY

Boise State University's 110 acre campus with many modern buildings is located along the Boise River green belt and pedestrian mall. A footbridge connecting it with beautiful Julia Davis Park, just across the river, adds to the attractiveness of the campus.

Founded in 1932 as a private community college, BSU grew steadily through the depression and war years. Idaho's legislature accorded four-year status to Boise College in 1965, then approved its entry into the state university system in 1974 as Boise State University. Today BSU's student enrollment is the largest in Idaho.

The university is arranged in six schools of instruction: Arts and Sciences with 17 departments and 38 majors; Business with 7 departments and 15 majors; Education with 3 departments and 9 majors; Health Sciences with 4 departments and 12 majors; Vocational-Technical with 5 departments and 21 majors; and the Graduate School offering 3 degrees with areas of emphasis in 16 fields.

On campus, more than 80 clubs and



organizations are the main thread of social life. For most students participating in intramural and lifetime sports as well as watching Big Sky championship teams throughout the year, creates an enjoyable and exciting atmosphere.

Boise State University's football program is in its third year under the direction of Coach Jim Criner, a 1962 graduate of Cal Poly-Pomona and had assistant coaching stints at Cal-Hayward, Cal-Berkeley, BYU and UCLA before being named to the head spot at Boise when Tony Knap went to Nevada-Las Vegas three years ago.

His first year was a 5-5-1 finish and last year the Broncos were 9-2, winning the Big Sky title and Boise takes a 7-2 into tonight's game with NAU.

Assisting Criner are Gene Dahiquist, Bill Dutton, Chuck Banker, Rudy Kadlub, Dave Campo, Kevan O'Hara, Claude Tomasini, Chester Grey and Steve Woodard. ARIZONANS: Dahlaquist, the Broncos' offensive coordinator, played quarterback at the University of Arizona in the early 1960's. Banker, the linebacker coach, was born in Prescott.

The Golden Eagle Award

Peggy Kennedy was selected as the first woman athlete to receive the GOLDEN EAGLE AWARD because, while maintaining a Dean's list academic standing, she was the first athlete to bring outside recognition of Northern Arizona University women's athletics, in recent history.

Miss Kennedy, a 5-8 two-year veteran of the Lumberjill basketball team, would be more appropriately middle-named "First." The name would, at least, be indicative of her athletic career at NAU where she has re-written many of her own records.

Last May, she was one of the ten best women university athletes in Arizona, and the only basketball player, honored at a banquet sponsored by The Arizona Republic. She was the first NAU athlete to be so honored.

Earlier in the year, Miss Kennedy became the school's first player named to an All-Intermountain Conference team, although as a freshman she had been the first to earn honorable mention.

The highly enthusiastic guard finished the 1977-78 season third in overall conference scoring with a 19.8 average, upping that of her freshman year when she was ranked fifth with an 18.5 average



and became the first NAU player listed in the conferences top ten players.

Additionally, she was the conference's eighth leading rebounder, averaging 10.1, and was second in free throw percentage at 81.3, having hit 39 of 48 attempts. During her first year at NAU, Miss Kennedy was ninth in conference rebounding.

Her single-game high scoring has also put her among the top conference players. She chalked up 30 points against University of

Arizona as a freshman and last year scored 29 against both UA and University of Texas-El Paso.

Miss Kennedy also holds the NAU records for the most points scored in a season, 356 in 1977-78, and in a career, 671. She leads in season and career rebounding, 227 and 427, respectively, and in season and career steals and assists.

Her performances have earned her recognition at NAU as the first and second recipient of the Lumberjill Award, an honor presented to the school's outstanding female athlete in any sport.

A member of Delta Delta Delta national social sorority, Miss Kennedy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Kennedy of Schaumburg, Ill., who have come west each year to see her play for NAU. She attended Western Illinois State University before coming to NAU and is expected to graduate in May with a bachelor of science degree in recreation.

GOLDEN EAGLE SALES is proud to honor Peggy Kennedy for her outstanding achievements in the classroom and on the basketball court. To qualify for the award, a student must letter in varsity athletics and maintain a minimum cumulative 3.0 (B) grade point average.

Rob Evers, the trainer at Austin High in El Paso, Texas, and a student trainer at NAU for 1973-77, who was winner of the 1977 National Athletic Trainers Association \$500 scholarship for outstanding student training and scholastics, joined the Lumberjack Booster Club as Homcoming this fall, saying "NAU did a lot for me while I was a student here, now I want to repay some of that help."

Gary Roach and his wife Debbie joined the Gold Club this fall, their first year out of school. Gary played football and was a student assistant for two years and Debbie was a secretary in the athletic department. They too wanted to repay some of the help they got while attending NAU.

Best in the Big Sky: Over the last three seasons, NAU's 13-3 conference mark (with two games left this fall) is the best in the league. Montana State at 13-5 is second best and Boise State's 11-5-0 (one game left) is third on the list.

Record setters: NAU's Allan Clark has career records for rushing (2,348 yards) and carries (458) and all-purpose running (3,097). Tyrone Peterson also holds three career marks for receptions (108), receiving yardage (1,901) and TD's (15). Carl Golden holds the career TD mark (22) and is third on the career rushing list (1,990).

Defensively NAU has some standouts too. Free safety Harold Smith holds the career pass deflection mark (26) and is closing in on the interception mark (10) of 12. Cornerback Ray Smith holds all of the school and most of the Big Sky punt return marks: most returns (50), most yardage (72), per return average (14.3) and TD returns (3). He leads the nation's I-AA schools this fall in returns.

Linebacker Jerry Lumpkin (375) trails defensive end Ed Hightower in career tackles (379). Hightower holds records for forced fumbles (21), tackles for losses (39) and Lumpkin leads in solo tackles (180). Middle guard Neal Higginson has played defense just three years but he has 273 career tackles — his two blocked kicks have led to TD's and has his one pass interception.

Cornerback Joe Walker is second in pass deflections (25) and he teams with Ray Smith to give NAU the best 1-2 punt return combo in the Big Sky as well as NCAA Division I-AA football.

Speaking of attendance, last fall Northern Arizona University's "average" home attendance of 12,233 was better than 32 teams from the "major college" Division I-A classification.

Major conferences which NAU compared quite favorably to include the Ivy League where the Axers out drew the teams. Brown (8,774), Columbia (5,543), Cornell (7,900), Dartmouth (10,964) and the University of Pennsylvania (10,892).

In the Southern Conference, NAU topped six schools: Appalachian State (11,206), Davidson (3,560), Furman (10,783), University of Tennessee-Chattanooga (8,400), Virginia

Military (7,151), and Western Carolina (7,734).

NAU was better than half of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association Long Beach State (7,203), Cal-Fullerton (5,204) and the University of Pacific (9,157).

In the Southland Conference, NAU again beat half the league: Texas-Arlington (4,469), Arkansas State (10,032) and Lamar Tech (10,177).

The Axers were better at the gate than five of the seven members of the Missouri Valley Conference: West Texas State (9,623), New Mexico State (11,145), Indiana State (10,869), Southern Illinois (9,706) and Drake (7,683).

NAU beat half of the 10 member Mid-America Conference, including Ball State (11,683), Bowling Green (11,263), Eastern Michigan (9,843), Kent State (8,176), Northern Illinois (7,570), Ohio University (12,218) and Toledo (11,433).

Independents NAU outdrew: Colgate (5,845), Holy Cross (11,645), Illinois State (11,100), Northeast Louisiana (6,860) and Villanova (8,798).

Colleges and Universities NAU was within a thousand in attendance: Cincinnati (12,970), Fresno State (13,226), Marshall University (12,769), Richmond (13,688), San Jose State (12,860) and Utah State (13,367).

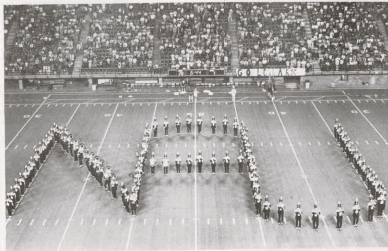

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The NAU Bluecoats are an on-campus booster group of men and women faculty, staff and administrative personnel whose prime goal is to promote academic excellence among NAU student

athletes. Each year a senior student who has excelled in both athletics and academics is named student athlete of the year and presented with a \$200 graduate scholarship.

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BIG SKY COUNTRY

The Big Sky Conference begins its 16th season of operation in 1978-79 with Championships being decided in eight sports, including cross country, football, wrestling, basketball, golf, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field. Eight schools are currently members of the league with a ninth invited to join the conference for the 1979-80 season.

Charter members of the BSC, which is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region are, Gonzaga University, Spokane, Wash.; the University of Idaho, Moscow; Idaho State University, Pocatello; the University of Montana, Missoula; Montana State University, Bozeman; and Weber State College, Ogden, Utah. Boise State University, Boise, Idaho, and Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, joined the league on July 1, 1970. The conference has invited the University of Nevada at Reno to join the conference beginning with the 1979-80 season.

The conference has member schools in six states and covers more than 220,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th of the total square miles in the continental United States). The name Big Sky originated in a novel authored by A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont. in 1947 entitled *The Big SKY*.

Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky Theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missillone of the Spokane SPOKESMAN-REVIEW called for the conference to be named "the Big Sky Conference" in his column of Feb. 20, 1963. On Feb. 25, 1963, the conference's name was adopted by the presidents of the newly-formed league during a meeting in Spokane.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA. The Big Sky Conference's newest member to begin championship competition for the 1979-80 season. Located in Reno on Interstate 80. Population of 172,000 with more than 250,000 in the surrounding region. Enrollment of 6,700. Founded in 1874. Mackay Stadium has been expanded to seat 33,500 for football with natural turf. City-owned Centennial Coliseum holds more than 6,300 for basketball.

NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY. Located in Flagstaff, 140 miles north of Phoenix on Interstate 17. Population 38,000. Founded in 1889. Enrollment of 12,500. NAU Dome completed in 1977 at cost of \$8.1 million. Seats more than 15,300 for football (Astroturf) and basketball (hardwood floor). Has 352-meter tartan track and 85-by-200 ice hockey rink. Other NAU facilities: baseball field, 220-yard indoor track and 440-yard all-weather outdoor track.

WEBER STATE COLLEGE. Located in Ogden, Utah, which is 35 miles north of Salt Lake City on Interstate 15. Population of 90,000 with more than 150,000 located in the immediate area. Founded in 1889 and became a four-year institution in 1962. Enrollment of 8,000. Wildcat Stadium seats more than 17,000 with a natural turf for football and an all-weather outdoor track. The \$11.3 million De Events Center opened its doors for the first time in the fall of 1977 and seats more than 11,500 for basketball ball.

BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY. Located in Boise, the capital city of Idaho. Situated on Interstate 80, the city has a population of 115,000 and 145,000 in the surrounding area. Founded in 1932 as a junior college and became a four-year institution in 1949. Enrollment of 11,000. Bronco Stadium seats over 20,000 for football and track meets with a newly-installed tartan surface and all-weather track. Bronco Gym seats 3,700 for basketball with a new pavilion planned to seat over 10,000.

GONZAGA UNIVERSITY. Located in Spokane, the hub of activities for Eastern Washington, Northern Idaho and Western Montana. Situated on Interstate 90, the city has a population of 200,000 with more than 300,000 in the immediate region. Founded in 1887 and is sponsored by the Jesuits. Enrollment of more than 3,300. Kennedy Pavilion seats more than 4,500 for basketball.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO. Located in Moscow, which is 90 miles south of Spokane, Wash., and 30 miles north of Lewiston, Idaho. Population of 14,000. Enrollment of 8,000. Founded in 1889. Kibbie-ASU Dome, which was dedicated in 1975 with a cost of \$7.8 million, seats more than 18,000 for football and basketball. The second of three domed stadiums built in the Big Sky Conference. Tartan surface for both football and basketball.

IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY. Located in Pocatello, the major city in Eastern Idaho. Population of 50,000. Located 170 miles north of Salt Lake City. Utah, on Interstate 15. Enrollment more than 10,000. Founded in 1901. The ISU Mindome was the first college-owned indoor football arena in the United States. Seats more than 12,000 for football, basketball and indoor track meets. Polyturf surface for football, wood floor for basketball and banked wood running track. The Mindome was completed in 1970 at a cost of \$2.8 million.

UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA. Located in Missoula, which is 210 miles east of Spokane, Wash., on Interstate 80. Population of 35,000 with 70,000 in the surrounding area. Founded in 1883. Enrollment of more than 8,300. Dornblaser Stadium seats 12,500 with natural turf. Adams Field House seats over 8,300 for basketball with a tartan surface.

MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY. Located in Bozeman, which is 140 miles west of Billings on Interstate 90. Population of 25,000. Founded in 1893. Enrollment of 10,000. Reno H. Stadium was completed in 1973 and seats over 15,000 for football played on natural turf. MSU Field House was opened in 1957 and seats more than 10,000 for basketball.

Idaho State led NAU 7-6 with 41-100-100. However, NAU scored 22 points in the next 2:17 to win the hair-raising defensive struggle. Montana topped ISU 13-15 late in the game. New Head Coach Jerry Davisch inherits 17 starters among the 36 returning Vandals who fall at the University of Idaho and the first year head coach has added some new recruits for the Vandals who face an early season three game road game to San Jose State, Washington State and Montana State before returning home to host MSU. Davisch, a former Arizona prep coach at Tucson Polytechnic, was an assistant at the US Air Force Academy before heading for Idaho.

MSU and Idaho have met three times that year other Big Sky foes. In 1976 the schools did not meet until 1978 when the Vandals won 22-12 in Flagstaff and in 1979 Idaho won at home 31-14. The teams did not meet last fall.
