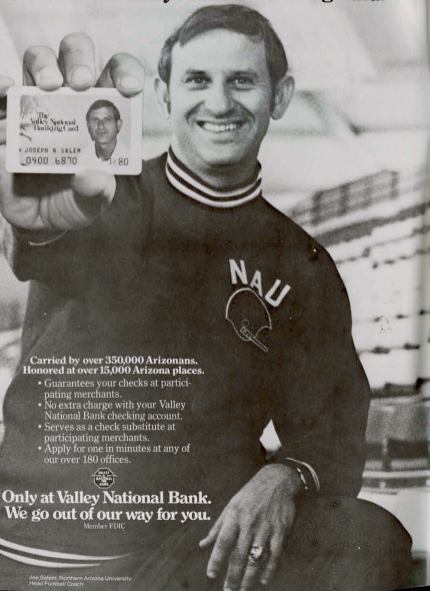

## PRESIDENT

When Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was appointed president of Northern Arizona University 2 1/2 years ago, the enrollment that fall semester of 1967 was 1,742 students and the campus encompassed 18 buildings on 16.2 acres. This fall, more than 12,500 students will be utilizing the 60 buildings located on 686 acres to advance their educations.

In keeping with the needs of a growing university, the opening of a new nursing building, the planning of additions to the library and bookstore and of course the opening of the 272,000 square foot multi-purpose domed stadium reflected Dr. Walkup's vision of the university's needs during his presidential tenure. The northland now has a wide range of educational programs at all levels because of his guidance.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the university elementary school and two years later he was named head of the Education Department, equal today to the Dean of the College of Education. Later, he was named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1955, he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by numerous organizations and societies. He has been teacher, coach and administrator. He received his undergraduate education at Central Missouri State University and his advanced degrees from the University of Missouri. Dr. Walkup was a finalist for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year in 1978.

Dr. Walkup and his wife, Lucy, a former teacher, have a grown daughter.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Athletics at Northern Arizona University received a motivational boost when T. H. "Hank" Anderson was named athletic director in the spring of 1974.

Hank Anderson and the Big Sky Conference are familiar with each other — Hank helped in organizing the fast growing league in the early 1960's and his guidance and direction have been sought by all members of the Big Sky as well as other institutions across the country, at one time or another.

Anderson spent 21 years as head basketball coach and athletic director at Gonzaga University then was head basketball coach at Montana State University for two years before coming to NAU to restructure the Lumberjack athletic fortunes.

For his immediate influence not only on NAU athletics but around Arizona as well, Anderson was a finalist for the Arizona Sports Personality of the Year in 1977.

During the winter of 1977, Anderson's former basketball players at Gonzaga staged a reunion and the former Gonzaga players that played for Anderson who now are doctors, dentists, educators and businessmen were testament enough that he did his job well in working with young people.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become athletic director at NAU, he ranked in the top 10 of active coaches for career wins with 318. His Gonzaga teams shared the Big Sky title in 1966 and 1967 and he was Big Sky Coach of the Year in 1966.

Anderson, who was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941, had a 167-43 record as a prep coach at Grants Pass, Baker and Medford — all in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Helms Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1968-72 he served as director of the greater Spokane, Wash., Sports Association. He and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five grown children.

## NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state of this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 11th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era. The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 566 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 75 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world.

Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

Stock in Lumberjack football has taken a sharp up-turn and the man behind that surge in the past three years has been Joe Salem who is heading into his fourth year as Northern Arizona University's head coach. Last fall NAU finished 8-3 and tied for the No. 6 spot nationally in the final NCAA Division II poll and for this, Salem was named Big Sky and NCAA District 8 coach of the year honors. His 1978 team was 8-3 and strongly showed things were bright on the horizon for NAU football.

Before coming to NAU the 40-year old Salem had been head coach at the University of South Dakota for nine years and his teams there won 28 of their last 37 games and sharing North Central Conference titles in 1972, 1973 and 1974. Salem's first NAU team in 1975 was 1-9, but that one was mostly freshmen and those "experiences" will be putting on their collegiate pads for the final time this fall.

As a player, Salem helped quarterback the University of Minnesota to the 1960 national title and a spot in the Rose Bowl. He then spent five years as an assistant at Minnesota before going to South Dakota, taking over a team such as he oriented at NAU.  
Strong academic counseling and insistence that his football players work steadily toward a degree program has been a Salem trademark during his 12 years as a head coach. As a result, more than 80 percent of Salem's players have graduated over the past 12 years. "We want our players to have a positive attitude toward their alma mater once their playing days are over," says Salem. "Academic degrees help us in this respect."

Salem and his wife, Sue, have four sons - Tim, 16, Wade, 14, and eight-year old twins Brad and Brent. Tim is a budding athlete on his own having started at quarterback at Flagstaff's Coccino High as a sophomore last fall. Wade is a developing baseball player and the twins seldom miss an NAU football practice.

**JERRY JANSON** - A five-year member of the Salem staff, the 28-year old Janson is in his third year of coaching the defensive backfield. He coached the defensive line for two. A graduate of Carthage College in Wisconsin and he earned his master's degree at Ohio State where he was a graduate assistant during the 1972 and 1973 seasons, working with national championship Buckeye teams. Earned varsity letters at Carthage College in football, basketball and baseball.

**PAT MORRIS** is new to the Northern Arizona University football coaching staff, having joined NAU for signing drills to replace Dick Heesch who entered business in Flagstaff. He will coach the offensive line. The 24-year old Morris is a 1976 graduate of the University of Southern California. Morris played offensive guard on the 1975 USC team which won Rose Bowl and national titles. He also played on the 1976 Liberty Bowl championship team. A graduate of Alamy High in Mason Hills, Morris played eight years of rugby during high school and college days.

**DAN RUNKLE** is the man behind the chair that has drawn up the NAU defense which has the Big Sky in total defense and defense against the rush the past two seasons. NAU led the Big Sky in defense against scoring last year and was 12th nationally against the rush. This is Runkle's seventh season as Joe Salem's defensive coordinator. Since Runkle joined Salem's staff, the duo have worked out a 47-23 record. The 32-year old Runkle earned 10 varsity letters at Illinois College - four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He earned his master's at Western Illinois. In the summer, he coordinates the NAU Sports Camp. Runkle and his wife, Joelle, are the parents of an eight-year old son, Tad, and a two-year old daughter, Sara Joelle.

**JIM CLEMENTS** is the 38-year old Clements is in his third year of coaching the NAU defensive line and his forward wall has been a key factor in several NAU games over this span. Served as a graduate assistant in 1975 and has helped with the steady progress of the tough NAU defense. A graduate of Arizona State University who earned his master's degree at Eastern Michigan. Coached 12 years in native Detroit and at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. Has been outstanding at working with young defensive linemen and developing their skills. Has been a key member of the NAU booster club fund raising staff. He and his wife, Holly, are the parents of three children, Julia, 12, Tommy, 6 and Jill, 4.

**PAT LAVIN** - one of the top prep coaches in Arizona high school history joined the NAU staff in the winter when Mike Shanahan left to take the offensive coordinator's post at his alma mater, Eastern Illinois. Lavin, 36, will coach the offensive backs. A 1962 graduate of Arizona State University, Lavin earned his master's at NAU. After graduating from ASU, Lavin was assistant at Phoenix St. Mary's then took the head job in 1971 and held it until coming to NAU. His seven-year mark was 64-13-2 and he had four consecutive Division and State playoff appearances before coming to NAU. He coached 14 All-Stars, including two group All-Americans. He and his wife, Linda, have three children, Jeanne, Trent, 7 and Natalie, 5.

## TONIGHT'S GAME

Weber State is certainly not playing like a team headed for its sixth consecutive losing season. The Wildcats have stacked up three consecutive wins and two of those have been impressive road wins—5-1-6 at Idaho three weeks ago and 44-25 last week over Utah State's Pacific Coast Athletic Association champions.

To reflect the win over Utah State for the Wildcats Utah State holds road wins this fall over Colorado State, Wyoming and WAC champ BYU!

Weber brings in a 4-6 overall mark and a 2-3 Big Sky record. Since giving up 27 points in a 27-7 Big Sky loss to Montana—the Wildcat defensive unit has allowed just 53 points in the last four Big Sky games.

From the offensive point of view, quarterback Morris Bledsoe (13) is dangerous as he tops the Big Sky field generals with 15.5 completions per contest for 177.4 yards a game, however, against Utah State, he completed 25 of 34 for 330 yards and five TD's—he had 11 TD passes in the last three games. His top receiver is Randy Jordan (81) who has a Big Sky tops of 56 grab for 948 yards and 9 TD's. He caught 10 for 185 yards and three TD's against Utah State.

Defensively, second-year head coach Pete Riehlman relies on linebacker Tim Evans (64) who has 115 tackles and All-America defensive back Dennis Durcanson (21) who led the nation in interceptions last fall with 10.

Lumberjack fans will see record setters Allan Clark (32) and Tyrone Peterson (40) and Carl Golden (36) making their final regular-season home appearances. Four-year starter Rodger Carbone (17), reserve quarterback Robbin Jones (10) and backup guard Jim Delaney (59) are other seniors on the offensive platoon.

Defensive standouts making final regular-season home appearances include end Ed Hightower (38), linebacker Jerry Lumpkin (41), safety Harold Smith (30), cornerback Ray Smith (12), cornerback Joe Walker (21) and middle guard Neal Higginson (65). (SEE PAGES 44-45)

Harold Smith and Walker are tied for the career lead in pass deflections with 28 each going into tonight's game. Lumpkin has 391 career tackles while Hightower has 389. Clark is 41 yards shy of the one-season NAU rushing record of 1,252 set by Jimmy Smith in 1973. Clark is averaging an incredible 174 yards a game in conference contests and 134.6 for all games.

## WEBER STATE COLLEGE

The city of Ogden, Utah, was originally established as a trading post by Hudson Bay Fur Trappers in the early 19th century. When the Mormon pioneers entered Salt Lake Valley, they established settlements throughout the area and Ogden became a permanent community.

The Town was incorporated in 1861. Located between the Great Salt Lake and the rugged Wasatch Mountains at the head of the strategic mountain pass, Ogden became an important point on the transcontinental railroad and the commercial center of Utah Territory.

It is presently Utah's second largest city with a population of nearly 80,000. It is easily the most cosmopolitan of all Utah communities and retains its position as the manufacturing, industrial, livestock, and defense center of the Intermountain Empire.

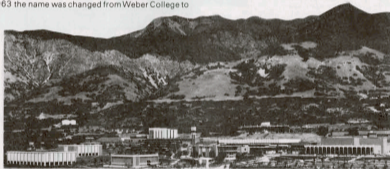
To serve the needs of the growing community, the Mormon Church established the Weber State Academy in Ogden in 1889. The institution was expanded and became a junior college in 1922. In 1933 the college passed from church to state control, and was given four-year status in 1952. The 1963 the name was changed from Weber College to

Weber State College, reflecting the increased scope of the institution.

In the early 1960s the campus moved from the ivy-covered downtown location it had occupied since its inception to a 275-acre tract located high above the valley in the foothills of the mountains. Today it is one of the newest and most modern physical plants in the nation.

Weber State is a multi-purpose college awarding BS and BA degrees, as well as various associate degrees and certificates of completion in special courses. Total student enrollment is 10,800 with 8,600 daytime and 2,200 night students. Reaching beyond the boundaries of the Beehive State, Weber State claims students from 39 states, 8 Canadian provinces, and 12 foreign countries.

Weber State is a charter member of the rugged Big Sky Conference, competing in ten sports, and has won conference titles 19 times, including six consecutive basketball crowns. In 1970 the Wildcats retired the Big Sky traveling all-sports trophy, the symbol of overall excellence in athletics, after winning the cup three consecutive years.

# ACCOMPLISHMENTS: THANKS

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Senior leadership has been a significant part of the development of the Lumberjack football program, especially the last three seasons when Nau went 8-3 in 1976, 9-3 in 1977 and entering the final regular-season of the 1978 season, NAU stands 7-2. Over the last three seasons, NAU's overall record has been 24-8 and NAU's Big Sky mark of 14-3 is the best over the last three seasons.

Of the 12 seniors listed below, 11 have been in the NAU program since their freshman season. Juce transfer Robbin Jones came into the program late in 1976. A 12th player who came as a freshman in 1975 was Phil Canick who redshirted in 1976. Canick has started at defensive end, linebacker, offensive guard and has punned. His recent play at guard has been superb.

## PROFILES ON NAU SENIORS (Entering final game Nov. 18 vs Weber)

### OFFENSIVE

**ALLAN CLARK, 5-11, 186-pound tailback from San Marcos, California.** Has a career record 2,598 yards rushing on 488 attempts and having scored 14 TD's rushing. He has caught 32 passes for 403 yards and seven TD's. He has returned 18 kickoffs for 346 yards. His all-purpose running (rushing, kick returns and reception yardage) is a school record 3,347 yards. Clark has been named Big Sky offensive player of the week five times in his career. Clark, a co-captain for the 1978 NAU team, is also a superb blocker. He has completed 7 or halfback option passes for 138 yards and 5 TD's.

**CARL GOLDEN, 6-1, 189-pound fullback from Hollywood, Fla.** Golden enters the final game of his career with 2,012 yards rushing on 434 attempts. Golden a two-time first-team All Big Sky fullback and two-time Associated Press All-America pick, has the school record for career TD's with 22. He was the Big Sky's leading runner as a sophomore during NAU's 8-3 finish in 1976.

**TYRONE PETERSON, 6-2, 178-pound wide receiver from Sierra Vista, Ariz.** Has set NAU career records for most receptions with 108 receptions for 1,921 yards and 16 TD's. Has been NAU's top receiver three of the four years he has started. His high school principal (Iluena High, Yuma, Arizona) set school records for receptions (85) and reception yardage (1,667) from 1947-49. Peterson broke both marks this fall.

**ROBBIN JONES, 6-03, 185-pound quarterback from Riverside, Calif.** A two-year back-up quarterback for NAU. Played one year at South Dakota, spent his sophomore year at Riverside City College then the final two years at NAU. His best game was 134-yard performance when he completed 12 of 19 passes in 33-6 loss to Northern Colorado. Jones' two-year figures are 20 completions in 48 attempts for 286 yards and two TD's.

**RODGER CARBONE, 6-8, 278-pound offensive tackle from Page, Ariz.** Entered starting lineup mid-way through his freshman year and has stayed there ever since. With one game to go, Carbone has started 38 consecutive games—second most on the NAU's starting line-up. Larry Friedrichs started a record 42 games at guard for NAU from 1974-77.

**JIM DELANEY, 6-4, 227-pound offensive guard from Phoenix, Ariz.** Has been in the NAU program for all four years. Started at guard some as a sophomore and junior. Prepved at Bourgade High.

### DEFENSIVE

**HAROLD SMITH, 6-2, 198-pound free safety from Florence, Ariz.** A four-year starter who has 208 career tackles (101 unassisted), has forced five fumbles, recovered four, intercepted 10 passes, has a career high 26 pass deflections and has one sack. A two-time first-team All Big Sky and a two-time All-America pick. Needs two interceptions to tie the school career mark.

**RAY SMITH, 5-9, 185-pound cornerback from Flagstaff, Ariz.** A three-spot first-team All State pick at Flagstaff's Coconino High. Is the all-time Big Sky punt return leader with 712 yards and has the best per-average return of 14.3 on 50 returns. Smith has been among the national leaders in punt returns all four years at NAU. As a sophomore, he was third, last year he finished seventh and currently he is the NCAA Division I-AA leader. He was as high as second as a freshman but didn't have enough returns to finish among the national leaders. As a freshman, Smith rushed for 323 yards and scored two TD's and caught two passes for 18 yards and another score and returned 10 kickoffs for 205 yards. Switched to defense as a sophomore and has 184 tackles (85 unassisted). Has forced five fumbles, recovered one, has six interceptions, 18 pass deflections and six tackles for loss.

**JOE WALKER, 5-11, 180-pound cornerback from Sierra Vista, Ariz.** A four-year starter at cornerback and has 184 career tackles (110 unassisted) has forced three fumbles, recovered two, has seven interceptions, one blocked kick and is batting .500. Walker has returned 29 punts for 384 yards and two TD's. Walker led the Big Sky in punt returns in 1977 with 232 yards on 14 returns and was third nationally among Division II players. Played at Sierra High.

**ED HIGHTOWER, 6-0, 207-pound defensive end from Prescott, Ariz.** Played linebacker first two years and has been at defensive end the last two seasons. Has 389 career tackles (179 unassisted), has forced 21 fumbles, recovered seven, has 16 pass deflections and has thrown opposing backs for losses on 40 occasions. Hightower's tackles, forced fumbles and tackles for losses are all career records. Prepved at Prescott High, has 16

**JERRY LUMPKIN, 6-0, 210-pound linebacker from Scottsdale, Ariz.** Lumpkin and Hightower are in a battle royal for career tackle lead. Lumpkin has 391 (16 unassisted) and Hightower has 371 including 184 solo tackles. He has forced nine fumbles, recovered four, has 20 pass deflections and has caught opposing backs for losses 24 times. A first-team All Big Sky pick and an AP All-America last season. From Scottsdale High.

**NEAL HIGGINSON, 6-3, 231-pound middle guard from Winslow, Ariz.** Came to NAU as a tight end but switched to middle guard as a sophomore and has been a three-year starter. Has 289 career tackles (130 unassisted); has forced nine fumbles, recovered five, has one interception, two blocked kicks, four pass deflections and 23 sacks.

## The Golden Eagle Award

When one sees Troy Hudson, 6-4 senior guard scamper up and down the basketball court, one wonders who he can keep up his intensity and hustle for the duration of a 40-minute college basketball game.

Last season Hudson's hustle and determination had him the only player to finish in the top 10 in the final Big Sky statistical tables in scoring (116.6 points), field goal shooting (52.3 percent), free throw shooting (88.5 percent) and rebounding (7 per game). His 88.5 percent from the free throw lane was the best in the Big Sky Conference and 10th best among major college players.

Hudson was named winner of the Joe Rolle basketball trophy, symbolic of NAU's most valuable player last season and he was named co-captain along with senior forward Dave Henson.

Before coming to NAU, Hudson helped Morenci High claim the State Class A championship then he spent two years at Eastern Arizona College before coming to NAU. His sophomore year at Eastern Arizona, Hudson was named the most valuable Jucio player in Arizona.

Hudson pursues his physical education major as vigorously as he does a loose basketball on the floor or a rebound when he goes up against a player several inches his superior.

Hudson led NAU in scoring last season eight different games and he was the top rebounder on nine occasions. He also had games where

he led in assists and steals. In fact, last season a player whose last name started with the letter "H" led NAU in scoring in all 25 games—Hudson, Henson, Greg Henderson, and Bobby Hancock all took their turns.

Hudson was named honorable mention All Big Sky last season as NAU compiled a 10-15 overall record and a 4-10 Big Sky Conference report card. The Lumberjacks tied for the 6th-7th spot in the final conference standings, but the Axers lost two one-pointers, a

four-pointer and a five-pointer in league action.

Hudson is one of three seniors who will be leading NAU on its most ambitious schedule in history this coming season and the Axers will be working under the direction of a new head coach Joey Gardner. The patient Gardner is a hard-working disciplinarian who built a solid program at West Virginia before heading to NAU last season.

In addition to his Big Sky honors, Hudson was named "honorable mention" on the All Mountain West team.

NAU launches its 1978-79 campaign next week at home against US International University. In all NAU plays 12 home games. In addition to the seven Big Sky games against Weber State, Idaho State, Montana, Gonzaga, Boise State, Montana State and Idaho, NAU will play host in non-conference games to Southern Colorado, US International, Midwestern of Texas, Calvine and Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

## FROM THE PRESS BOX

The Big Sky Conference stands 5-3 against the Pacific Coast Athletic Association and the league can enhance that standing this weekend and the league plays two games against the PCAA as Montana plays at San Jose State and Fresno State travels to Idaho.

Last week Montana State closed its season at 8-2 with a 35-14 win over Fresno State. Montana State bounced back into the win column after losing two weeks ago at home to NAU 43-22. Also last week, Weber State, tonight's NAU opponent, scored 31 points in the fourth quarter to wreck up state rival, Utah State. 44-25. Utah State entered that game with wins over Colorado State (21-20), Wyoming (20-13), Western Athletic Conference champ (BYU) (24-7), San Jose State (31-21), and Pacific (40-14). One of Utah State's two setbacks was 17-16 to the University of Miami from Florida.

The comparative score. It gives fans something to talk about, writers something to write about and broadcasters something to discuss however, when two teams line up for the kickoff, they face 60 minutes of combat and the following instances this fall can attest to that.

NAU lost 23-7 at North Dakota State. Montana State beat North Dakota State 28-18 and NAU in turn beat Montana State 43-22.

NAU took a 21-6 win at Montana. NAU took it on the chin, 33-6 at the University of Northern Colorado and Montana then took a 31-14, win from Northern Colorado. Weber State lost at Fresno State 55-14 early in the season. Utah State then topped Fresno State 45-22. Last weekend Weber beat Utah State 44-25! In six previous games against Utah State, Weber had lost all and had scored just 67 points in the series before last weekend. Idaho State beat Northern Colorado 9-7, lost to NAU 34-14 and as previously mentioned, Northern Colorado beat NAU 33-6. Utah beat Weber 30-7 and the Wildcats beat Utah State 44-25 last week and Utah State will host Utah this weekend—any comparative prognostications?

Jerry Lumpkin (41), a senior linebacker from Scottsdale and Ed Hightower (38) a senior defensive end from Prescott have been in a four-year battle for the career tackle lead and going into their final regular-season game tonight, Lumpkin has a slight edge—he has 391 career tackles to 389 for Hightower!

Defensive backs Harold Smith (30) and Joe Walker (27) enter their final regular-season game tonight for the all-time school pass deflection mark with 26 each. Both will be well tested by Weber's deadly passing game.

When Allan Clark was the unanimous pick as the most valuable offensive player in NAU's 31-20 win last week over Boise, the university's general scholarship funds will be \$500 richer. Clark was the offensive MVP in NAU's 34-

14 regionally telecast win over Idaho State and NAU received \$1,000 for that. Jerry Lumpkin was the defensive MVP in that Idaho State win and NAU, too, got an additional \$1,000. Over the last year, NAU athletes have earned more than \$7,000 in scholarship monies for either NAU or themselves.

NAU is 2-0 on TV this fall. On Sept. 16 ABC's TV cameras brought NAU's 34-14 Big Sky win into the livingrooms of some 14 million fans in eight western states. Last week KTVB of Boise carried NAU's 31-30 Big Sky win over defending Big Sky champ Boise State into Southwestern Idaho, and parts of Oregon and Nevada.

In addition to winning the Big Sky Conference title in football, NAU's cross country team upended defending and pre-meet favorite Weber State. NAU placed all of its five scoring runners in the top nine finishers, headed by Art Menchaca who won the individual crown for the Asars and qualified for the NCAA national meet Nov. 20 at Madison, Wisconsin.

Other NAU runners in the top five were: Rob Stanley (5), Larry Martinez (6), Nick Martin (7) and Mark Lometand (15) and Allen Estrada (20). NAU's Leo Haberlack picked up his fourth Big Sky cross country title and placed ninth in the NCAA Division I meet. NAU won track and field titles in 1971 and 1975.

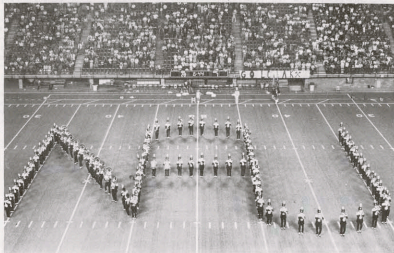

## BIG SKY COUNTRY

The Big Sky Conference begins its 16th season of operation in 1978-79 with Championships being decided in eight sports, including cross country, football, wrestling, basketball, golf, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field. Eight schools are currently members of the league with a ninth invited to join the conference for the 1979-80 season.

Charter members of the BSC, which is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region are, Gonzaga University, Spokane, Wash.; the University of Idaho, Moscow; Idaho State University, Pocatello; the University of Montana, Missoula; Montana State University, Bozeman; and Weber State College, Ogden, Utah. Boise State University, Boise, Idaho, and Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, joined the league on July 1, 1970. The conference has invited the University of Nevada at Reno to join the conference beginning with the 1979-80 season.

The conference has member schools in six states and covers more than 220,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th of the total square miles in the continental United States). The Big Sky Conference originated in a novel authored by A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont. in 1947 entitled *THE BIG SKY*.

Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky Theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missidine of the Spokane SPOKESMAN-REVIEW called for the conference to be named "the Big Sky Conference" in his column of Feb. 20, 1963. On Feb. 25, 1963, the conference's name was adopted by the presidents of the newly-formed league during a meeting in Spokane.

**UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA.** The Big Sky Conference's newest member to begin championship competition for the 1979-80 season. Located in Reno on Interstate 80. Population of 172,000 with more than 250,000 in the surrounding region. Enrollment of 18,000. Founded in 1874. Mackay Stadium has been expanded to seat 13,500 for football with natural turf. City-owned Centennial Coliseum holds more than 6,300 for basketball.

**NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY.** Located in Flagstaff. 140 miles north of Phoenix on Interstate 17. Population 38,000. Founded in 1889. Enrollment of 12,500. NAJU Dome completed in 1977 at cost of \$8.1 million. Seats more than 15,300 for football (Astroturf) and basketball (hardwood floor). Has 352-meter tartan track and 85-by-200 ice hockey floor. Other NAJU facilities, baseball field, 220-yard indoor track and 440-yard all-weather outdoor track.

**WEBER STATE COLLEGE.** Located in Ogden, Utah, which is 35 miles north of Salt Lake City on Interstate 15. Population of 80,000 with more than 150,000 located in the immediate area. Founded in 1889 and became a four-year institution in 1962. Enrollment of 8,600. Wildcat Stadium seats more than 17,000 with an artificial turf for football and an all-weather track. The \$11.3 million De Events Weber State Ice Skating Field House was opened in 1977 and seats more than 11,500 for basketball ball.

**IDaho STATE UNIVERSITY.** Located in Pocatello, the major city of Eastern Idaho. Population of 50,000. Located 170 miles north of Salt Lake City, Utah, on Interstate 15. Enrollment of more than 10,000. Founded in 1901. The ISU Mindome was the first college-owned indoor football arena in the United States. Seats more than 12,000 for football, basketball and indoor track meets. Polyfurf surface for football, wood floor for basketball, and banked wood running track. The Mindome was completed in 1970 at a cost of \$2.8 million.

**UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA.** Located in Missoula, which is 210 miles east of Spokane, Wash., on Interstate 90. The city has a population of 200,000 with more than 300,000 in the immediate region. Founded in 1887 and is sponsored by the Jesuits. Enrollment of more than 3,300. Kennedy Pavilion seats more than 4,500 for basketball.

**UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO.** Located in Moscow, which is 90 miles south of Spokane, Wash., and 30 miles north of Lewiston, Ida. Population of 14,000. Enrollment of 8,000. Founded in 1889. Kibbee-ASU Dome, which was dedicated in 1976 with a cost of \$7.8 million, seats more than 18,000 for football and basketball. The second of two named stadiums built in the Big Sky Conference. Tartan surface for both football and basketball.

**MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY.** Located in Bozeman, which is 140 miles west of Billings on Interstate 90. Population of 25,000. Founded in 1893. Enrollment of 10,000. Reno H. Madsen Stadium was completed in 1973 and seats over 15,000 for football played on artificial turf. MSU Field House was opened in 1967 and seats more than 10,000 for basketball.

# LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

## LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Biome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on ground which is now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six or seven foot cross cuts with one man working in each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two. (From this the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumber Jacks. - Mr. Biome is the younger son of R. H. H. Biome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter was written in July, 1977.

## WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were used by the Industrial Arts Club as a "float." In 1934, they were used to carry the king and queen. Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

## COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in Feb., 1933, that it was stolen.

The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshman football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodes Neenan, Paul Guthrie, James Jaconetti, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Albert Dalmon.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, cradled in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU sand plays "Timber."

Walker won national Coach Division II crowns at Texas Lutheran 13-14 and 1975 and held a year record of 38-16 at the Texas school, including a 28-14 loss to NAU in Fargo in 1973. 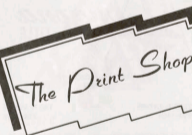

### NORTHERN COLORADO OUTLOOK

Bob Biss is entering his 13th year as head coach at Northern Colorado and he's had just two losing seasons since taking over as head coach in 1965 — that first year and last year and he's produced a 77-32-2 mark and ranks as one of the winningest active coaches in Division II circles. Biss recruited heavily from the junior colleges and received three pro players from four-year schools — quarterback Jeff Kruggie and wide receiver Steve Gaudy. Both starters at the University of Colorado and defensive tackle, Jeff Bismore from Michigan.

Biss and NAU head coach Joe Sater inaugurated their head coaching careers against each other in 1968 while Sater was head coach at South Dakota. Sater won that encounter 27-12 and Sater won again 35-14 in 1968. NAU and UNC started at 7-1. NAU finished a 6-2-7 win in 1964 because of an ineligible player. The last time the teams met, NAU won 23-0 in 1965 in Greeley.

### MONTANA STATE OUTLOOK

Although Sonny Lubick is in his first year as head coach at Montana State, he is no stranger to the Big Sky. Lubick was an assistant for eight years at Montana State, as coordinator in the successful program in Italy to return again.

Lubick State claimed the 1976 national NCAA Division II crown and was ranked No. 1 last fall when being crowned at Boise. After losing the Big Sky title last fall 28-27 for the first time since he joined in 1971. Both NAU and Montana State were undefeated in Big Sky play since in 1976 and the Bobcats finished NAU 23-0 in Bozeman then went on to win the national crown.

Montana State has won more football titles than any other school in the league's history — six in the 18 years of the Big Sky's existence. Bobcat State, who joined when NAU did in 1970, has won five.

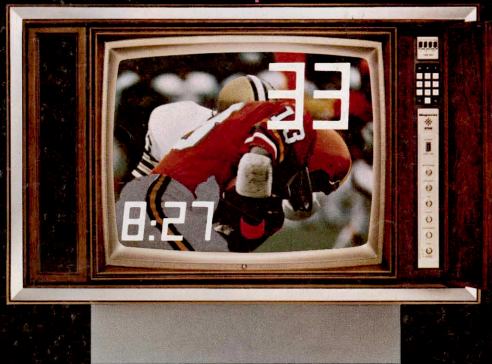
