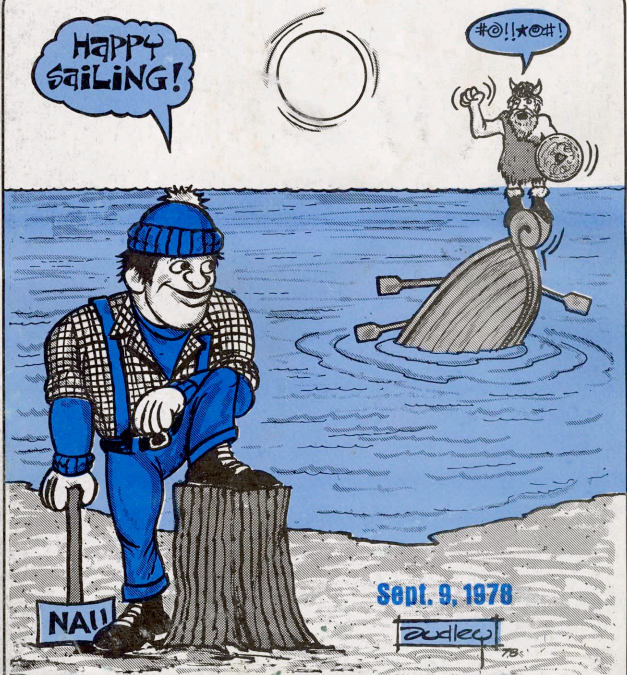

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PRESIDENT

When Dr. J. Lawrence Walkup was appointed president of Northern Arizona University 2 1/2 years ago, the enrollment that fall semester of 1987 was 1,142 students and the campus encompassed 18 buildings on 162 acres.

This fall, more than 12,500 students will be utilizing the 60 buildings located on 686 acres to advance their educations.

In keeping with the needs of a growing university, the opening of a new nursing building, the planning of additions to the library and bookstore and the opening of the 272,000 square foot multi-purpose domed stadium course the opening of the 272,000 square foot multi-purpose domed stadium reflected Dr. Walkup's vision of the university's needs during his presidential tenure. The northland now has a wide range of educational programs at all levels because of his guidance.

Dr. Walkup first came to NAU in 1948 as director of the university elementary school and two years later, he was named head of the Education Department, equal today the Dean of the College of Education. Later, he was named Dean of Instruction for the University and in 1955, he was named Dean of the University.

Throughout his long and distinguished career in education, Dr. Walkup has served in many roles and has been honored many times by numerous organizations and societies. He has been teacher, coach and administrator. He received his undergraduate education at Central Missouri State University and his advanced degrees from the University of Missouri. Dr. Walkup was a finalist for Arizona Sports Personality of the Year in 1978.

Dr. Walkup and his wife, Lucy, a former teacher, have a grown daughter.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Athletics at Northern Arizona University received a motivational boost when T. H. "Hank" Anderson was named athletic director in the spring of 1974.

Hank Anderson and the Big Sky Conference are familiar with each other — Hank helped in organizing the first growing league in the early 1960's and his guidance and direction have been sought by all members of the Big Sky as well as other institutions across the country, at one time or another.

Anderson spent 2 1/2 years as head basketball coach and athletic director at Gonzaga University then was head basketball coach at Montana State University for two years before coming to NAU to restructure the Lumberjack athletic fortunes.

For his immediate influence not only on NAU athletics but around Arizona as well, Anderson was a finalist for the Arizona Sports Personality of the Year in 1977.

During the winter of 1977, Anderson's former basketball players at Gonzaga staged a reunion and the former Gonzaga players that played for Anderson who now are doctors, dentists, educators and businessmen was testimony enough that he did his job well in working with young people.

When Anderson gave up coaching to become athletic director at NAU, he ranked in the top 10 of active coaches for career wins with 318. His Gonzaga teams shared the Big Sky title in 1966 and 1967 and he was Big Sky Coach of the Year in 1966.

Anderson, who was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1941, had a 167-43 record as a prep coach at Grants Pass, Baker and Medford — all in Oregon.

He is a charter member of the Holms Basketball Hall of Fame. From 1969-72 he served as director of the greater Spokane, Wash. Sports Association. He and his wife, Betty, are the parents of five grown children.

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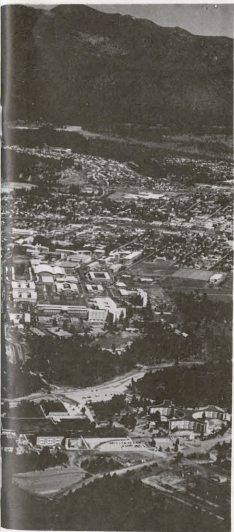
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NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY



Northern Arizona University is heading, full steam, into its second decade as a university which gives high priority to the needs of its students on an individual basis.

The University's rich history has been developed on taking a personal interest in the students and helping them to become responsible citizens who in turn, make a contribution to society.

NAU gained university status in the spring of 1966 and from that point, the enrollment has doubled to the more than 11,500 who are in attendance this fall.

More than 80 percent of NAU's enrollment comes from within Arizona; however, students from every state plus many foreign nations attend NAU.

NAU has responded to the educational needs of not only Arizona but the region and nation. With a massive outdoor laboratory, NAU is becoming more and more recognized for its quality in research projects.

NAU first opened its doors in the fall of 1899, some 13 years before Arizona became the 48th state of this nation on Feb. 14, 1912. Last May, NAU celebrated its 11th year of university status and during that span, NAU has grown in stature. Since opening, NAU has gone through a series of name changes since the initial name of Northern Arizona Normal School covered the 1899-1925 era. The first four-year graduate was Jake Bracker in 1927 and he is now a retired businessman in Phoenix.

NAU is located near the center of Flagstaff on the 6,800-foot Coconino Plateau and the 686 acre tree-shaded campus is well known for its beauty.

The university lies in the shadows of the 12,600-foot San Francisco Peaks which is the highest spot in Arizona. Nearby is the delightful Coconino National Forest which has the largest stand of ponderosa pine in the world.

More than 76 percent of NAU's teaching faculty possess the earned doctorate and this ranks NAU third nationally for state institutions.

NAU offers degrees from the associate level through the doctorate and students can choose from more than 100 areas in which to earn their bachelor degree. NAU offers degree programs through the Colleges of Arts and Science, Business, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Service plus the schools of Applied Science and Forestry. The graduate college administers all advanced studies.

NAU is centrally located and students have access to some of the most spectacular scenery in the world. Flagstaff has a world-wide scientific name as Pluto, the ninth planet in our galaxy was discovered here, much of the early research on Mars was accomplished here the U.S. astronauts received some of their training here and the back side of the moon was mapped in Flagstaff.

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LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

Stock in Lumberjack football has taken a sharp up-turn and the man behind that surge in the past three years has been Joe Salem who is heading into his fourth year as Northern Arizona University's head coach.

Last fall NAU finished 9-3 and led for the No. 5 spot nationally in the final NCAA Division II poll and for this, Salem was named Big Sky and NCAA District 9 coach of the year honors. His 1976 team was 8-3 and strongly showed things were bright on the horizon for NAU football.

Before coming to NAU the 40-year old Salem had been head coach at the University of South Dakota for nine years and his teams there won 29 of their last 37 games and sharing North Central Conference titles in 1972, 1973 and 1974. Salem's first NAU team in 1975 was 1-9, but that crew was mostly freshmen and those "yearlings" will be putting on their collegiate caps for the final time this fall.

As a player, Salem helped quarterback the University of Minnesota to the 1960 national title and a shot in the Rose Bowl. He then spent five years as an assistant at Minnesota before going to South Dakota, taking over a team such as he inherited at NAU.

Strong academic counseling and insistence that his football players work steadily toward a degree program has been a Salem-trademark during his 12 years as a head coach. As a result, more than 90 percent of Salem's players have graduated over the past 12 years. "We want our players to have a positive attitude toward their alma mater once their playing days are over," says Salem. "A college degree helps in this respect."

Salem and his wife, Sue, have four sons — Tim, 18, Wade, 14, and eight-year old twins Brad and Brent. Tim is a budding athlete on his own, having started at quarterback at Flagstaff's Cocconino High in a sophomore last fall. Wade is a developing base-back player and shewens seldom seen as NAU football practice.

JOE SALEM

JERRY JANSON A five-year member of the Salem staff. The 28-year old Janson is in his third year of coaching the defensive backfield. He coached the offensive line for two. A graduate of Carthage College in Wisconsin and he earned his master's degree at Ohio State where he was a graduate assistant during the 1972 and 1973 seasons, working with national championship Buckeye teams. Earned varsity letters at Carthage College in football, basketball and baseball.



JERRY JANSON

PAT MORRIS is new to the Northern Arizona University football coaching staff, having joined NAU for spring drills to replace Dick Hesch who entered business in Flagstaff. He will coach the offensive line. The 24-year old Morris is a 1976 graduate of the University of Southern California. Morris played offensive guard on the 1975 USCG team which won Rose Bowl and national titles. He also played on the 1976 Liberty Bell championship team. A graduate of Albany High in Mountain Hills, Morris played eight years of rugby during high school and college days.



JIM CLEMENTS

DAN RUNKLE is the man behind the chalk that has drawn up the NAU defense which has led the Big Sky in total defense and defense against the rush the past two seasons. NAU led the Big Sky in defense against scoring last year and was 12th nationally against the rush. This is Runkle's seventh season as Joe Salem's defensive coordinator. Since Runkle joined Salem's staff, the duo have worked out a 47-23 record. The 32-year old Runkle earned 10 varsity letters at Blinnos College — four each in football and basketball and two in baseball. He earned his master's at Western Illinois. In the summer, he coordinates the NAU Sports Camp. Runkle and his wife, Joella, are the parents of an eight-year old son, Tad, and a two-year old daughter, Sara Joella.



PAT MORRIS

JIM CLEMENTS the 38-year old Clements is in his third year of coaching the NAU defensive line and his forward wall has been a key factor in several NAU games over the past five years. A graduate of Carthage College in 1976 and he helped with the steady progress of the tough NAU defense. A graduate of Arizona State University who earned his master's degree at Eastern Michigan. Coached 12 years in native Detroit and at Flagstaff High before coming to NAU. He has been outstanding at working with young defensive linemen and developing their skills. Has been a key member of the NAU booster club fund raising staff. He and his wife, Holly, are the parents of three children, Julie, 12, Tommy, 6 and Jill, 4.



PAT LAVIN

PAT LAVIN one of the top prep coaches in Arizona high school history joined the NAU staff in the winter when Mike Sharahan left to take the offensive coordinator's post at his alma mater, Eastern Illinois. Lavin, 35, will coach the offensive backs. A 1966 graduate of Arizona State University, Lavin earned his master's at NAU in 1974. After graduating from ASU, Lavin was assistant at Phoenix St. Marys then took the head job in 1971 and held it until coming to NAU. His seven-year mark was 64-12-2 and he had four consecutive Division and State playoff appearances before coming to NAU. He coached 14 All-Stars, including two prep All-Americans. He and his wife, Linda, have three children, Jeanine, 9, Trent, 7 and Natalie, 5.

(62) DAN ANDERS, 6-6, 230, SO. DT, GILBERT, ARIZ.—Really established himself in spring football. Prepved at Tucson's Santa Rita High where he was solid football player and wrestler. Had 19 tackles and 3 sacks as frosh last fall. Younger brother of Jim.

(64) JIM ANDERS, 6-3, 261, JR. DT, GILBERT, ARIZ.—Has started every game since arriving on campus. Was second-team All Big Sky defensive tackle last fall. Has finished third in Big Sky wrestling tournament on heavyweight last two seasons. Had 109 tackles last fall, including seven forced fumbles and recovered six. Had 87 tackles, six forced fumbles and three recoveries as frosh. Prepved at Tucson's Santa Rita High. Family now lives in Gilbert.

(60) DAVE ARNOLD, 6-2, 220, JR. LB, HERLINGTON, CALIF.—After graduating from Herling High, played two years at Shasta JC. Earned All Conference honors junior and senior year in high school.

(71) STEVE BANHAM, 6-3, 215, FR. DL, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Was Tucson's prep defensive lineman of the year at Canyon del Oro High where he helped team win a second consecutive State AA title. Has lots of potential and could develop into an outstanding college player. Made several All-State teams.

(61) PHIL CANKIK, 6-2, 221, JR. LB, SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ.—Started at defensive end as freshman in 1975, but set out 76 with an injury. Returned last fall and earned starting linebacker spot where he was in 53 tackles, forced five fumbles and recovered two and had four sacks. Had 67 tackles as NAU frosh. Had 30 tackles in one game in high school for Chaparral against Yuma.

(63) DAVE CARLTON, 6-6, 219, SO. DE, YUMA, ARIZ.—Saw considerable action in 1976 as frosh, but was injured early last fall after gaining a starting spot. Looked very effective in spring drills and should be ready for a solid year this fall. Prepved at Yuma High and is very aggressive.

(66) BRIAN DAELEY, 6-3, 215, FR. DL, LONG BEACH, CALIF.—Was first-team All-City at St. Anthony's High in Long Beach. Made several key plays last fall for St. Anthony's and should fight right into NAU's defensive scheme for 1978.

(46) ANTHONY "TONY" FELIX, 6-2, 217, FR. LB, TUCSON, ARIZ.—Was All-State, All-Conference and All-City the past two seasons at Tucson's Amphitheater High where he helped team win two spots in state AA playoffs. Hand raised player with the ability to make key play.

(44) GREG GERKEN, 6-4, 214, SO. DE, DENVER, COLO.—Started to assert himself in spring drills after being a key member of the specialty teams last fall. An All-round athlete at Regis High in Denver, where he was one of state's top prep players. Has size and desire to become quality player.

(61) NEAL HIGGINSON, 6-3, 231, SR. MG, WINDLOW, ARIZ.—Third year as starting middle guard. Had 106 tackles last fall, forced four fumbles, recovered two and had seven sacks. Had 85 tackles as a sophomore. Was 1,000-yard fullback as a senior at Winslow High. One of most undrafted defensive players in Big Sky Conference.

(28) ED HIGHTOWER, 6-0, 207, SR. DE, PRESCOTT, ARIZ.—Led NAU's defense last fall after having 123 as a sophomore. Had eight forced fumbles, five recoveries and 18 sacks last season but earned only "honorable mention" All Big Sky. Made many key defensive plays. Was a 1,000-yard back at Prescott High where he made All-State both offensive and defensive. Played in State All-Star game. Drew votes for Academic All-Arizona last fall.

(37) JON HIGHTOWER, 6-0, 171, FR. DE, PRESCOTT, ARIZ.—In addition to being a productive football player, Jon was also one of the state's top prep punters last year. Rushed for over 1,000 yards last fall.

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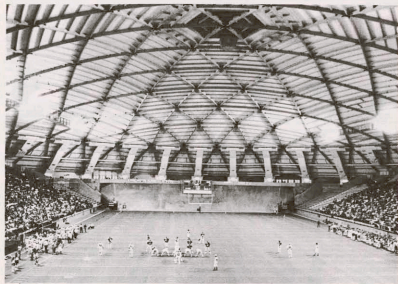
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NAU'S DOME — NAU's unique domed complex has attracted more than \$300,000 in national publicity for the University before the season started — that figure is expected to jump this fall.

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TICKETS: Athletic ticket office is located on the west side of the NAU Dome, south end of main athletic offices. Football ticket outlets include Athlete's Foot, Darrell's Men's Wear, Bankrupt Liquors and both Leamon's Appliance Centers. NAU's ticket office is open from 8-5 weekdays. Tickets may be purchased at the outlets during normal working hours. Dome ticket booths open 1 1/2 hours before kickoff for home games.

RESTROOMS WOMEN: Restrooms for women are located on each side of the Dome about Mid-concourse.

RESTROOMS MEN: Restrooms for men are located on each side of the Dome about Mid-concourse.

FIRST AID: A first aid station is located near the center of the concourse on the East side, across from the restroom area.

LOST AND FOUND: Articles lost or found may be turned in or inquired about at the NAU Police Department sub station on the Southwest corner of the NAU Dome at the Concourse level.

PUBLIC ADDRESS: Emergency messages announced only.

PUBLIC PAY TELEPHONES: Four public pay telephones are located on each side of the NAU Dome at Mid-concourse level. Pay phones in Arizona require 20 cents per local call.

SMOKING: Concourses only.

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Glossary Of Football Terms

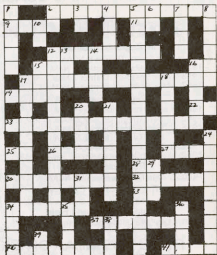

TONIGHT'S GAME

Hang on to your hats football fans. Portland State is in town. Northern Arizona University opens the home portion of its 1978 season tonight against coach Darrell "Mouse" Davis and his high-octane Vikings from the Pacific Northwest.

And Portland State brings with it a well-earned reputation for offensive fireworks. For the past three years, the pass-happy Vikings have been the widest show in NCAA circles.

Turning Portland State loose with a football is like putting a match to gasoline.

For proof, consider the following statistics:

Last year, the Vikings 806.7 yards total offense and 492.2 through the air per game while posting a 7-4 record. Portland State's double-slot offense, known throughout Oregon as the "run - and - shoot" powered the Vikings to passing and total yardage championships in 1975, 1976 and 1977.

Last season the Vikings scored 40 or more points in five different games. On one occasion they bombed Puget Sound 63-9. Other victims included Big Sky Conference members Montana State (56-35) and Idaho State (47-0).

Quarterbacking the Vikings tonight will be sophomore Neil Lomax. Playing in nine games as a freshman last year, Lomax completed 102 of 161 passes for 1,670 yards and 18 touchdowns.

PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY

Portland State University is located in the state's major urban center (1-plus million). From its campus in downtown Portland, the university serves a total enrollment of approximately 16,500, with 2,500 students involved in graduate work.

The majority of PSU students come from the greater Portland area, although 25 states and 30 foreign countries are represented.

The university offers baccalaureate degrees in 50 areas of the liberal and professional arts and sciences.

Masters degrees are offered in 33 fields of study. Eleven university departments participate in the three doctoral programs.

Portland State traces its beginning to 1946 when the VanPort Extension Center was founded to provide educational opportunities for World War II veterans. It moved to the present site in 1952, becoming a four year school in 1955. PSU faculty numbers about 850, with 600 staff personnel. The campus encompasses 27 city blocks. Most of the twelve major structures have been completed during the past 12 years.

The university's location in the core area of Portland puts it within easy walking distance of commercial and governmental centers, and cultural and entertainment resources, including the Oregon Historical Society, Art Museum, Public Library, Civic Auditorium, Stadium, theaters, and restaurants.

It is within 90 minutes of snow covered mountain slopes to the east, and the famed Oregon coastline to the west.

On the athletic field, Portland State has been among the best in the Pacific Northwest in wrestling and baseball for a number of years. Recent development of its football and basketball programs make the Vikings a team to contend with among the new NCAA Division 1-AA schools.

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Safety efforts bring results

The threat of serious injury is ever-present in the game of football. "Someone is always going to get hurt," the pessimist says. "It is inevitable."

The National Collegiate Athletic Association agrees with the first premise but disagrees that nothing can be done. Since the start of the 1970s, and particularly in the last two years, the NCAA has stepped up its efforts to give more protection to football players.

The results speak for themselves. From 1971 to 1978, there was a 50 per cent reduction in the annual football fatality incidence compared to the previous six-year period.

Creation in 1971 of an organization called NOCSAE (National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment) has played a big part in the improvement.

Helmet a weapon

Most of the fatal or paralyzing injuries (to the neck or spinal cord) occurred when a player used his helmet as a weapon, either to spear or butt an opponent. Of eight deaths reported (the lowest total in 25 years), most could be traced to the helmet being a prime factor.

Fortified with this information the NCAA took two steps—changing a rule and improving the safety features of the helmet.

"The rule change was disarmingly simple and the omission of the word 'malicious' was the most significant change. In effect, the new rules say 'Don't do it...don't use your helmet as a weapon.'"

Refining the helmet

Having changed the rule to outlaw spearing, ramming or butting, the NCAA embarked on the more difficult task of refining the helmet.

This has been accomplished by the voluntary cooperation of coaches, trainers and the sporting goods companies which manufacture the helmets used in high school and college football. All agreed—almost eagerly—to meet certain standards, to process only certified equipment approved by NOCSAE. Coaches and athletic directors pledged their assistance in making sure only such certified helmets were used.

The helmet must strike a delicate balance. Its first and primary purpose is to protect the player using it from head injuries such as concussion or fracture, yet not be of such texture to serve as a battering ram.

Mandatory use urged

The various schools have been urged to make mandatory the constant use of this NOCSAE-approved helmet, because a survey one year earlier had shown that an injury can occur at any time.

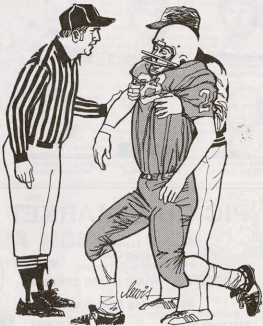
That survey, prepared for the NCAA and NOCSAE by Kenneth S. Clarke of Penn State University, looked primarily into the incidents of injury—when they occurred, to whom and under what circumstances.

It was shown that injuries in spring

practice occurred similarly to offensive and defensive players—that actually the possibility of being hurt played no favorites.

Quarterbacks and running backs suffered more injuries, the report showed, with the bulk being knee problems. Linebackers, defensive linemen and tight ends were the next most vulnerable, while wide receivers, defensive backs and offensive linemen were in the lowest frequency group.

But injury can happen to anyone at any time. As Clarke noted in his report, three players received serious injuries when they collided with a teammate. The possibility of injury always will be there, but the NCAA is heartened by the statistics which show encouraging improvement.



Football Foundation's dream

Hall of Fame a success story

It was a long time coming, but August 3, 1978, was a great day for the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame and a great day for college football.

On that day at Kings Island, Ohio, the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame, honoring the game's great college players and coaches, was dedicated.

Located on 10 acres of land given to the foundation by the Taft Broadcasting Company, the building cost more than \$5 million. In arranging the construction and financing of the building, Taft—with the foundation's approval—also provides the management staff at Kings Island. The foundation's executive office remains in New York City, as will the traditional Hall of Fame dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria.

The Hall of Fame building at Kings Island is a beautiful Georgian-colonial style, designed to resemble a stately old college campus, and houses 33,000 square feet of space on two levels.

The 10-acre site of the Hall of Fame includes ample parking and a full-size football field next to the building for clinics, demonstrations and practice. Inside, the Hall of Fame includes exhibits that bring football history to life, action-oriented attractions which

encourage visitor participation, spirited live entertainment and one of the finest historical collections of college football literature, film and memorabilia ever assembled under one roof.

Everywhere one looks in the Hall of Fame's interior the pageantry, power and spectacle that perpetuate college football come to life. Halls of Fame ordinarily are quiet, museum-like places, but college football fans are notorious lovers of action; and that's just what they get at the Hall of Fame.

In the 250-seat Grandstand Theatre a multimedia live Broadway-type show featuring the history of football in song and dance is performed several times daily.

The Hall of Fame also features a variety of minitheatres, including a 75-seat Sidelines Theatre where educational and entertaining films run continuously, including those of great tackles and spectacular runs in slow motion and the evolution of the game's techniques, equipment and uniforms to the present.

The Krutts Roocke Locker Room, a 25-seat theatre in an authentic locker room setting, features an audio-visual show on great college football coaches.

In the Strategy Room, visitors try exciting electronic football games which test their game strategy in situations faced by history's great

coaches. At the Computer Information Center, fans quiz the Hall of Fame computer, which is fully programmed with up-to-the-minute information on records, coaches, players and teams.

Besides learning, listening, looking and experiencing you also participate in the game at the Hall of Fame. Visitors tie up the ball and attempt a field goal, and an electronic device measures the kick's direction and distance.

Fans who are interested in the part television plays in today's college football find the TV Telecast Unit fascinating.

Overlooking the scale-size football field is the Press Box, an exhibit with everything found in an actual press box which salutes the outstanding media personalities for their coverage of the game of football.

What may well be the highlight of every fan's trip to the Hall of Fame is the Time Tunnel, through which visitors walk to experience a multimedia environment depicting football's historical growth and development from 478 B.C. (the Greek football-like game of harpaston) to the present.

For the studious football fans who want to get deeper into the game's history, a Hall of Fame Library and Archives is available.



The Eagle has traditionally symbolized pride and excellence. That is why we bear the Eagle as our symbol and are happy to award the Golden Eagle to those student athletes who perform with pride and excellence.

Larry Friedrich's play on the football field from 1974-77 was inspiring to his teammates and the fans in the stands and to the academically inclined alike.

Friedrichs, a 6-2, 234-pound offensive guard from Arlington Heights, Illinois came to NAU in the fall of 1974 and promptly earned a starting job as a freshman—he started all 42 games he played in, playing every single offensive down in the first 21 of those games.

The determined Friedrichs was a winner in the classroom as he carried a 3.5 grade point average in his tough accounting major while still finding enough time to star on the football field—earning five All-America awards his last two years at NAU.

During his freshman year everyone misspelled the mispronounced his name, but he let his shoulder pads acquaint himself with the fans as well as the opposition. NAU was 3-6 his freshman year then dipped to 1-9 his sophomore season. He was a major factor in the growth of Lumberjack

football as the Axers were 8-3 his junior year in 1976 and he was first-team All Big Sky and second-team All-America on the AP team.

As a senior, NAU was 9-3 and Friedrichs was a tri-captain. Again he was first team All Big Sky, first team Kodak All-America, second team Academic All-America, second team Associated Press

All-America and he was one of two NAU players picked honorable mention All-America by Sporting News—only four Division II players were picked by Sporting News.

Friedrichs became only the second NAU lineman to become a three-time winner of the John G. Yost award. The award, created in 1946 by Howard Yost in honor of his brother, John who lost his life in World War I, goes yearly to NAU's top linemen. Vince Cisterna, NAU's only player in the East-West Shrine Game (1949) won the award three times from 1947-49.

The GOLDEN EAGLE AWARD is new this year at NAU and it's prime objective is to honor outstanding Lumberjack student-athletes who excel in varsity athletics and maintain a minimum 3.0 (B) cumulative grade point average.

Golden Eagle is pleased to honor Larry Friedrichs and more NAU athletes of this caliber will be honored at all home football games and selected basketball games during the coming school year.

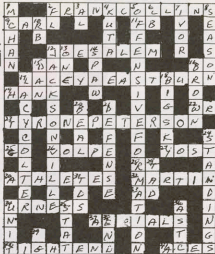

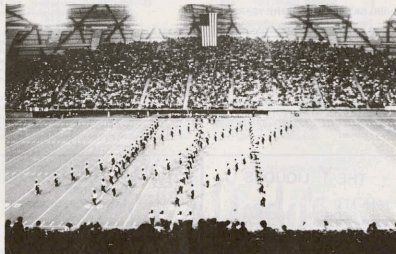

LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Blome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on ground which is now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six or seven foot cross cuts with one man working on each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two... (From this the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumber Jacks. - Mr. Blome is the younger son of R. H. H. Blome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter was written in July, 1977.

WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were used by the Industrial Arts Club as a "float." In 1934, they were used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in Feb., 1933, that it was stolen. The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff. The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshman football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodes Neace, Paul Gutwin, James Giacometti, Howard Hoosen, Howard Wynn and Albert Dalmolin.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, cradled in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."

Bob Blue is entering his 13th year as head coach at Northern Colorado and he's had just two losing seasons since taking over as head coach in 1969—the first year and last year and he's produced a 77-32-2 mark and ranks as one of the most successful active coaches in Division I circles. Blue recruited heavily from the junior colleges and received five prize players from four-year schools—quarterback Jeff Knappie and wide receiver Steve Gaurty, both starters at the University of Colorado and defensive tackle, Jeff Behrman from Michigan.

Blue and NAU head coach Alie Salem inaugurated their head coaching careers against each other in 1969 while Salem was head coach at South Dakota. Salem won that encounter 27-12 and Salem won again 35-14 in 1968. NAU and UNC stand at 1-1. NAU forfeited a 48-7 win in 1964 because of an ineligible player. The last time the teams met, NAU won 23-0 in 1965 in Greeley.
