# NCAA: Serving Higher Education

Now in its 77th year of service, the National Collegiate Athletic Association continues to meet the demands of its member institutions. While serving the nation's colleges and universities, the NCAA is the voice of intercollegiate athletics.

A call for stricter control of college football by President Theodore Roosevelt because of the violence in the game brought together 13 institutions in 1900, formulating the original communications base for college athletics.

This initial body called itself the Intercollegiate Athletic Association and was officially constituted March 31, 1906. In 1910, the name was changed to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

More than seven progressive decades have molded this original 13-member body into a membership today of more than 900 colleges, universities, conferences and affiliated organizations.

Administration and rules interpretation occupied early efforts of the organization. Shortly after World War II, the NCAA adopted legislative and executive powers, changing its function into one dealing with virtually all issues concerned with intercollegiate athletics.

Many things have become associated with the NCAA during its colorful history. Highest priority goes to the service it provides to its members, acting as the true "voice" of college athletics today.

Each January the NCAA membership comes together at the annual Convention to review, propose and amend legislation. The Convention presents the opportunity for the nation's institutions of higher learning to speak and act on athletic matters on the national level. Acting in the best interests of its membership, the NCAA strives to perform these specific functions among its many other responsibilities:

- Conducts 42 annual National Collegiate Championships in 19 men's sports for three separate divisions. Three championships (Division I, Division II and Division III) are held in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and wrestling. Two championships are staged in gymnastics, lacrosse and ice hockey. Fencing, rifle, skiing, indoor track, volleyball and water polo hold single National Collegiate Championships, while football is contested in Divisions I-AA, II and III. The NCAA is conducting 31 women's championships

in the 1982-83 academic year in addition to the 42 held for men. Women's championships will be held in all three divisions in basketball, cross country, field hockey, softball, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and volleyball. Two championships (Division I and Division II) will be staged in gymnastics, while fencing, golf, lacrosse, soccer and indoor track will hold single National Collegiate Championships. The National Collegiate Championship dates back to 1883 in tennis; and during this 100-year history, more than 13,000 student-athletes have earned the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion."

- Maintains 23 men's sports committees, including 14 men's rules committees to formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for the government of collegiate sports. Members of these and many other committees, including 16 women's sports/rules committees, are elected by representatives of member institutions at the annual Convention.

- Publishes a tabloid newspaper 46 times per year, rules books in 12 sports, record books in football and basketball and various other publications.

- Collects, compiles and distributes the official statistics of college football, basketball and baseball in men's sports, and basketball and softball in women's sports.

- Conducts studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems.

- Represents the membership in legislative and regulatory matters on the state and Federal levels.

- Annually selects the College Athletics Top Ten and the Theodore Roosevelt ("Teddy") Award—the Association's highest honor.

- Administers an honors program which annually awards 90 postgraduate scholarships to recognize outstanding senior student-athletes who have excelled in the classroom as well as athletics. This scholarship is for \$2,000. The program has provided \$1,784,000 to 1,354 recipients since its inception in the 1940-45 academic year.

- Promotes and participates in international sports planning and competition through membership in the United States Olympic Committee, Amateur Basketball Association of the USA, Track and Field Association of the USA, and the United States Baseball, Gymnastics and Wrestling Federations.

- Maintains more than 80 full-time staff members at its national headquarters in Mission, Kansas, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

## NAU HALL OF FAME

A diverse mix of former athletes, coaches, administrators and the 1946-47 basketball team will be inducted into the Lumberjack Sports Hall of Fame this evening.

Held in conjunction with NAU's annual media day, tonight's halftime ceremonies will honor former Lumberjack and Lady Lumberjack athletes, coaches and administrative personnel who have brought great distinction to the University.

Now in its second year, the Hall of Fame is sponsored by Valley National Bank. Tonight's inductees bring to 16 the number of teams and individuals in the Hall.

Participating in tonight's ceremonies will be Dr. Eugene H. Hughes, president of the University; Hank

Anderson, NAU's director of intercollegiate athletics; and Tom Pickard, vice president and regional manager of Valley National Bank.

Heading the 1982 inductees is the 1946-47 Lumberjack basketball team which is celebrating its 35-year reunion this year. Coached by Frank Brickley, the team posted a 19-7 record and finished third in the National Association Intercollegiate Basketball Tournament.

Two members of the team, Wayne See—already a member of the Hall—and Gene O'Dell, were the first two players from Arizona to play in the National Basketball Association.

Edgar "Mutt" Ford, a 1932 graduate of NAU, is Arizona's all-time leading pro football coach with 245 career victories from 1934-66. Ford's teams won or tied for eight state football titles at Glendale, Mesa and Mesa Westwood high schools, and he also won three state basketball championships. He coached 54 first-team all-state football players and was one of the few coaches to appear in the Arizona Prep All-Star Game in both football and basketball. He is also a member of the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame, sponsored by the Phoenix Press Box Association.

A pioneer women's coach, Lora Maxwell tutored NAU athletes from 1923-64. Ms. Maxwell organized the Women's Recreation Association in 1930, the forerunner of today's women's intercollegiate program. While at the University, Ms. Maxwell coached archery, rifle and basketball.

Dr. Lyle Mullens will be inducted into the Hall of Fame for his service as NAU's faculty athletic representative from 1960-80. A member of the College of Education, Dr. Mullens certified athletic eligibility and interpreted rules of the NCAA and the Big Sky Conference.

Star basketball players from 1951-55, Lupe Acevedo and Fito Trujillo are the first inductees to the Hall of Fame as a tandem. The duo played basketball together in elementary school, junior and senior high school and at NAU, where during their junior and senior years they led the Lumberjacks to a 39-10 record. Both players were named to the All-Conference team in their junior and senior seasons.

The pair also helped lead Miami High School to the 1951 Arizona State High School Championship. One of NAU's greatest all-round athletes, Jack Wilson lettered four years in football and basketball, and once in track/field and baseball from 1926-29. He went on to become one of Arizona's leading prep coaches at Benson High School, winning two state basketball championships and compiling a 347-122 record over 21 years.

Boise State is a full game behind the league leading Bobcats in this week's standings. Since the 1975 season these teams have exchanged wins and losses with the home field advantage holding up. The last Montana State win was a 16-17 debacle during the 1980 season. The last Boise State win in Bozeman was a 40-37 thriller in 1974. This is MSU's homecoming game and the Bobcats are on a four game winning streak, three in the league after dropping their third non-league game of the season. BSU's Jim Cramer is 3-3-0 lifetime against Montana State while Bobcat head coach Doug Graber has never faced Boise State as a head coach. **NEXT WEEK:** Weber State @Boise State. . . . is in his first season with the Lumberjacks at 2-3-0 and is 98-46-3 in his 15th season as a head coach. **GAME NOTES:** Idaho State is hoping to snap a three game losing streak after winning its first two games of the 1982 season. ### DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Growth and development of intercollegiate athletics for both men and women have grown significantly the past eight years under the direction of H. "Hank" Anderson. "We want our athletics program to complement the academic side of the university," said Anderson. "We want our athletes to realize that their education is very important to us."

Anderson has been associated with three different universities through the entire 20-year history of the Big Sky Conference — he was athletic director and head basketball coach at Gonzaga University in Spokane, WA for 21 years (1951-72) and he was then head basketball coach at Montana State for two years (1972-74) and he is now heading into his ninth season as director of athletics at NAU and during that time, the Lumberjack Booster Club has grown more than 10-fold from the \$17,000 it was when he arrived in the spring of 1974.

When he gave up coaching to concentrate on full-time administration, Anderson's 318 career wins ranked him in the top 10 among active coaches.

In 1977 he was a finalist for the Arizona Sports Personality of the Year Award and for the past five years he has served on the executive board for the Fiesta Bowl which has grown to the No. 5 spot nationally behind the "Big Four" — The Rose, Orange, Sugar and Cotton Bowls.

He has served on numerous NCAA committees throughout his administrative career and has helped the NCAA select at large entries for the Division I post-season tournament. He and his wife, Betty, have five grown children.

### PRESIDENT HUGHES

Restructuring the University while keeping the welfare of the students uppermost in the minds of the faculty, staff, and administration has been the prime goal of Dr. Eugene M. Hughes in the three years he has served as President of Northern Arizona University.

Dr. Hughes was named to the Presidency July 1, 1979. He came to NAU in 1970 as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, was promoted to Provost of University Arts and Sciences in 1971 and was named Academic Vice President in 1972, a position he held until becoming President. His performance in these responsible administrative positions helped NAU continue to grow in a respected pattern in the 1970's and helped to pave the way to his being named the 12th President.

President Hughes was recognized in 1967 and 1971 as one of Outstanding Young Men in America and one of America's Outstanding Educators. Other achievements include listings in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in College and University Administration and Who's Who in Mid-West and American Men and Women in Science.

Dr. Hughes is active in community activities, including having served on the Board of Directors for the Flagstaff Summer Festival and as President of the Flagstaff East Rotary Club. He has also served on the Board of Directors for the Flagstaff Chamber of Commerce and on the Arizona Council on Humanities and Public Policy.

Currently he is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Museum of Northern Arizona, the Board of Advisors of American Graduate School of International Management, a member of the Executive Board of the Grand Canyon Council of the Boy Scouts of America, a member of the Arizona Elk Association Youth Activities Committee, and a member of the Arizona State Board of Education.

He and his wife, the former Caroline Harwig, both were graduated from Nebraska Western and Chadron State in Nebraska. He earned his Ph.D. from George Peabody College of Vanderbilt University in 1968. The Hughes have three children, Debbie (Mrs. Gary Cruze), Greg, and Lisa and one grandchild, Melissa Anne.

### NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

A close personal interest in the development in each student as an individual has long been the trademark of Northern Arizona University.

This fall more than 12,500 students will enroll at NAU and each will receive guidance in developing a solid foundation early in their collegiate careers so they can work toward reaching optimum levels in today's complex world as responsible, contributing adults. NAU's reputation for excellence has become known locally, regionally and nationally as the nation's map is dotted with those holding degrees from NAU.

Despite its steady yearly growth, NAU has not lost sight of helping each student work steadily toward their goals. From the administration, faculty and staff has come a positive learning atmosphere, conducive to students having the opportunity of reaching their goals with pride and dignity.

Undergraduate students at NAU this fall will be working on degrees in some 200 areas while more than 50 areas await those in pursuit of advanced degrees ranging from the master's degree program through the doctorate. NAU's academic programs are housed in ten colleges and professional schools — including the Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Creative Arts, Education, Engineering and Technology, Social and Behavioral Sciences and the Graduate College plus Schools of Applied Science, Forestry and Health Professions.

Since opening its doors in 1889, some 13 years before Arizona became the nation's 48th state on Valentine's Day, 1912, NAU has progressed through five name changes - starting with "Northern Arizona Normal School" back in the Arizona Territory days.

The second name was Northern Arizona State Teacher's College and that change came in 1925. In 1928, it was changed to Arizona State Teacher's College at Flagstaff and in 1945, Arizona State College at Flagstaff. University status was gained May 1, 1966, as Northern Arizona University.

NAU is located in the heartland of some of the world's most spectacular scenery as the famed Grand Canyon lies just 75 miles to the north while the world's largest stand of Ponderosa Pine circles the Flagstaff area. The area is steeped with western folklore as well as American Indian history and culture.

Flagstaff is a highly developed scientific community with the presence of world renowned Lowell Observatory where Pluto, the ninth planet in our Galaxy was discovered in 1930. Pluto's single moon was discovered in 1978 at the US Naval Observatory in Flagstaff. The US Geological Survey in Flagstaff mapped the back side of the moon following early Apollo flights. All US astronauts who visited the moon received part of their training in the Flagstaff area.

As legend has it, Flagstaff received its name when Westward bound pioneers skinned a tall Ponderosa Pine to use it as a "flag staff" to celebrate the nation's 100th birthday on July 4, 1876.

## NAU FOOTBALL HEAD COACH



Winning is something that **JOE HARPER** has become accustomed to. The new Northern Arizona University head football coach posted an admirable 96-43-3 record in his 14 years as head coach at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo before coming to NAU in December of 1981.

Discipline, hard work and teamwork were ingredients Harper blended into his winning program at Cal Poly SLO. His 1980 Mustang team captured the NCAA Division II national championship, beating the defending national champ, Eastern Illinois 21-13 in the Zia Bowl in Albuquerque. That 1980 season Harper's team also beat Big Sky Champ and NCAA 1-AA Champ Boise State.

"A college education is very important to every member of our team, and we want our young athletes to realize this and work seriously toward graduation day," said Harper. "Only about five percent of the college seniors across the nation each fall ultimately make it in pro football, and this small figure reflects the importance of the degree." Harper and his staff are proven teachers of the game of football.

Harper begins the 1982 season as the ninth winningest coach in NCAA 1-AA circles nationally with his 86 victories. Percentage wise, Harper's .687 ranks him 12th among all 1-AA coaches. Nine of Harper's former Cal Poly players were in NFL camps in 1981.

Harper was offensive line coach at the University of Colorado from 1962 to 1967. He also has coached in UCLA, Colorado State, UC Santa Barbara, and Riverside City College.

The new NAU head coach is a 1959 UCLA graduate and he earned his master's degree from UCLA in 1960. He and his wife, Jean, are the parents of two sons, Brad, 22 and Dan, 22, and a 14-year old daughter, Kerri Jean.

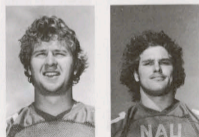

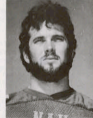

# NEXT OPPONENT

Eastern Washington is a new name on the football schedule at Northern Arizona University, but the Eagles have been thorns in the sides of other Big Sky teams the last few years—last year Eastern Washington ended the season with a 14-13 win over Montana and this year the Eagles have lost twice in narrow road games to Weber 27-24 and Montana State 24-20.

Eastern will enter this week's game at game against Simon-Fraser of Canada with a 3-2 record. The Eagles have been stung on defense their last three games while averaging better than 35 points per outing!

After a sluggish start, Eastern Washington's running game has started to take shape and that's taken the burden off the passing game. Coach Dick Zornes has been successful with a balanced attack and he hopes to have that in high gear for next week's contest at NAU.

Zornes is in his fourth year at Eastern Washington and he entered this week with a 23-11 career mark. Two weeks ago the Eagles clawed Cal Poly-Pomona 47-7 and last season Cal Poly-Pomona scored a season-ending 35-33 win over NAU in a game played in Arizona State University's Stadium in Tempe.

Eastern Washington has made serious overtures the past three years to joining the Big Sky Conference and they will be out to prove they are capable of competing at the Big Sky level. In fact, press-publicity proclaims: "With the Eagles, 'The SKY Is The Limit.'"



Senior quarterback Jim Brittain is completing 55-percent of his passes and is averaging some 22½ yards a game to go with 150+ yards a game.

Fullback Mike Anderson is the top receiver, averaging more than five receptions a game to go with his staunch blocking and tough inside running which is producing 35 yards a game. The leading runner is tailback Craig Griens who is averaging more than 70 yards a game.

Defensively, the Eagles have surrendered just 280 yards a game while averaging over 400 themselves. EWU's secondary is averaging just over three interceptions per contest.

Following next week's annual Mom and Dad's Day contest against Eastern Washington, the Lumberjacks will be on the road for three consecutive weeks—Oct. 30 at New Mexico State, Nov. 6 at Montana State and Nov. 13 at Idaho—before returning home to end regular-season play against Weber State College on a 7:30 p.m. game in the Skydome.

**ON THE RADIO.** While NAU is on the road, all three games can be heard live over radio station KCLIS in Flagstaff, KING in Winslow and KCR-FM in Cottonwood. The New Mexico State game will have a 2 p.m. kickoff Arizona time while the Montana State game will start at 1:30 p.m. Arizona time and the Idaho encounter will start at 8:30 p.m. Arizona time. Rick Turner, sports director for KCLIS, will call the play-by-play action.

But two weeks ago, things weren't looking snappy as Montana and Montana State stood atop of the standings Idaho State had lost to Montana State and Boise State had just left from grace and first place after being upset by Northern Arizona University.

Last weekend, the plot thickened as Boise State handed Montana its first conference loss, and Montana State, which is the only unbeaten conference school, defeated Weber State. Confused? Don't worry, so are most of the league's pressmen prognosticators.

And where does tonight's game fit into this jumble? The NAU-Idaho State matchup could be a plot twist. Idaho State, the defending NCAA Division 1-AA champions, is currently 2-3. Despite their problems, the Bengals have only played one Big Sky game, losing to Montana State, 30-27, in three overtime.

At first, many people were unsure if the Bengals would contend for the league title after losing their All-Conference quarterback Mike Machurek to graduation. Machurek simply re-took the Big Sky passing records last season. But from the same roads they got Machurek, quarterback Paul Peterson has come to the Bengals from San Diego Community College, where he broke many of Machurek's junior college passing records. Peterson, a junior, has thrown four touchdown passes for Idaho State this season.

Although the Bengals depended on their offense last season, their defense may be their strong point this year. They have allowed but 22 points a game, which means their 2-3 record is more of a lack of offense than defense.

On the other side of the field, NAU is still attempting to establish itself under new coach Joe Harper. The Lumberjacks are 2-3 also overall, with all of their victories at home and their losses coming on the road. They're 1-2 in league play, and they must go unbeaten from this point on to have a shot at a playoff spot.

## IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY

Idaho State University originated in 1902 as the Academy of Idaho, a two-year school offering college preparatory and industrial courses. 70 students signed up the first year.

In 1915 the academy was renamed the Idaho Technical Institute and given a twofold function—vocational trade school and a junior college with emphasis on occupational courses. Enrollment was 500 in 1917 when the U.S. entered World War I.

The school's name was changed again in 1927, this time to Southern Branch of the University of Idaho with a resultant stress of the cultural and de-emphasis of the technical and vocational curriculum.

Idaho State College was established in 1947 by the 29th session of the state legislature as an independent, four-year, degree-granting institution. Divisions included a College of Liberal Arts, College of Pharmacy, and School of Trade and Industrial Education. A graduate division, offering degrees of Master of Arts in Education, Master of Science in Education, and Master of Education, was organized in 1955, with the first degrees awarded in 1957.

In 1963, the 37th Idaho State Legislature approved another name change—to Idaho State University.

### NAU CONTRIBUTES TO PRO FOOTBALL

The 1981-82 pro season was a banner year for the Northern Arizona University as 20 former Lumberjacks were involved in the play-for-pay ranks—10 players (six in the NFL and four in Canada), eight as NFL assistants and two more as NFL scouts—that count comes from those who either played and/or coached at NAU at one time or another during their careers.

As far as coaches in the NFL, NAU's eighth tied the university for the No. 8 spot nationally at all levels of play and NAU was the national leader at all schools below the NCAA I-A.

Kentucky was the national leader with 18 followed by Stanford and UCLA with 16 each then came Southern California with 14. Maryland was next with 12, California, Iowa State, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Pitt and Oklahoma State each had 11.

Those with 10 each included Colorado State, Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, and Navy while Michigan State, SMU and Texas A&M each had 8. NAU was tied with San Diego State and Florida with eight each.

As a conference, the Big Sky had 14—NAU's eighth followed by Boise State with three, Idaho State with two and Montana State with one. Surprisingly some of the national powers, NFL coaching was at a minimal level—Alabama had five while Oklahoma, Houston and Penn State each had just three, Arizona had five and Arizona State one.

Cecil "Brute" Mulleneaux, in 1932, became the first Arizona collegiate player to play professionally and Mike Mercer, kicked the first Super Bowl field goal back in Super Bowl I.

## LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

### LUMBERJACKS

Harold F. Blome wrote, "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on the grounds which are now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six- or seven-foot cross saws with one man working each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two . . . (from that the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumberjacks . . .) Mr. Blome is the younger son of R. H. Blome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter has written July, 1977.

### WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack Homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were first used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual Homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

### COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in February 1933, that it was stolen.

The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshmen football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodes Neace, Paul Guthrie, James Jaconetti, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Albert Dalmoin.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank" and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, credited in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."

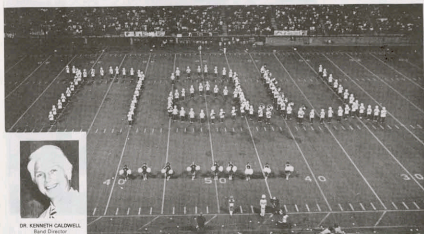

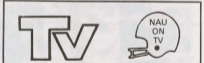

## BIG SKY COUNTRY

The Big Sky Conference begins its 20th season of operation in 1982-83 with championships being decided in eight sports, including cross country, football, wrestling, basketball, golf, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field. Eight schools comprise the league.

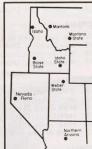
Charter members of the BSC, which is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region are: Gonzaga University, Spokane, Washington; the University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho State University, Pocatello, the University of Montana, Missoula, Montana State University, Bozeman, and Weber State College, Ogden, Utah; Boise State University, Boise, Idaho; and Northern Arizona University. Flagstaff joined the league on July 1, 1970. The University of Nevada at Reno joined for the 1979-80 season, replacing Gonzaga who joined the West Coast Athletic Association.

The conference has member schools in five states and covers more than 180,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th of the total square miles in the continental United States). The name Big Sky originated in a novel authored by A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Montana in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, former

Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missildine of the Spokane "Spokesman-Review" called for the conference to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column of February 20, 1963. On February 25, 1963, the conference's name was adopted by the presidents of the newly-founded league during a meeting in Spokane.



football arena in the United States. Seats more than 12,000 for football, basketball and indoor track meets. Polyurf surface for football, wood floor for basketball, and banked wood running track. The Mindome was completed in 1970 at a cost of \$2.8 million.

### UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA

Located in Missoula, which is 210 miles east of Spokane, Washington, on Interstate 90. Population of 35,000 with 70,000 in the surrounding area. Founded in 1893. Enrollment of more than 8,954. Dornblaser Stadium seats 12,000 with natural turf. Adams Field House seats over 9,300 for basketball with a tartan surface.

### MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY

Located in Bozeman, which is 140 miles west of Billings on Interstate 90. Population of 25,000. Founded in 1893. Enrollment of 10,800. Reno-H. Stadium was completed in 1973 and seats over 15,000 for football played on natural turf. MSU Field House was opened in 1957 and seats more than 10,000 for basketball.

### UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA-RENO

The Big Sky Conference's newest member. Joined the league July 1, 1979. Located in Reno on Interstate 80. Population of 172,000 with more

than 250,000 in the surrounding region. Enrollment of 10,000. Founded in 1874. Mackay Stadium has been expanded to seat 13,500 for football with natural turf. City-owned Centennial Coliseum holds more than 8,300 for basketball.

### NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

Located in Flagstaff, 140 miles north of Phoenix on Interstate 17. Population 42,000. Founded in 1899. Enrollment of 13,000. NAU Dome completed in 1977 at cost of \$9.1 million. Seats more than 15,300 for football (Astroturf) and basketball (hardwood floor). Has 352-meter tartan track. Other NAU facilities: 220-yard indoor track and 440-yard all-weather outdoor track. A full size 85 by 200 ice rink, and an Olympic-sized swimming pool in planning stages.

### WEBER STATE COLLEGE

Located in Ogden, Utah which is 35 miles north of Salt Lake City on Interstate 15. Population of 80,000 with more than 150,000 located in the immediate area. Founded in 1889 and became a four-year institution in 1962. Enrollment of 10,800. Wasland Stadium seats more than 17,000 with a natural turf for football and an all-weather track. The \$11.3 million Dee Events Center opened its doors for the first time in the fall of 1977 and seats more than 11,500 for basketball.

—Just seven points kept the Titans from a second-place finish in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association last fall—the Titans lost 1 point game to Long Beach (Utah State) (10-9) and Pacific (17-16) and a 5-point setback was dealt out by Utah State (14-9). CSF lost a 2-pointer to Nevada-Reno (36-34) and had those four decisions fallen into the Titans' ledger; they would have finished with a 7-4 record instead of a 3-8 mark. Gene Murphy who is heading into his third season as head coach of the Titans feels he has enough horses to win some of those close games this fall as 35 lettermen, including 14 starters return (5 on offense and 9 on defense).

Murphy installed a freshman program when he took over and he is nearing the completion where he will have his first senior class which should start to pay dividends. Offensively, key returnees include quarterback Bob Caffrey who split duties last fall and completed 105 of 222 for 1,118 yards, while throwing 6 TD passes and 14 interceptions. Runningback Roy Lewis was third as CSF in rushing last fall with 232 yards and returned 13 punts for 479 yards (25.2 ave.). Top receivers back are wide receiver Jeff York (38 receptions for 543 yards and 3 TD's) and tight end Ed Wootton (26-285-0). Placekicker Greg Steene was 17-18 on conversions and 13-21 on field goals.

Defensively, the Titans return sign of the top 11 tacklers on the team last fall among the nine returning starters, headed by linemen Rock Sereno (88 tackles), and Terry Hubbard (91 stops). In the secondary line safety Rod Weimer with 79 tackles is back as is corner back Lee Miller who had 48 tackles to go with a team high 5 interceptions and 16 pass deflections.

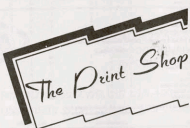
If early offensive problems can be solved, the Titans might be on their way to a first winning season since a 7-4 finish in 1973. CSF started football in 1970 and reeled off two consecutive winning seasons, but had eight straight losers.

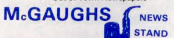

Defensive standouts returning include middle guard Kevin Singleton and tackle Doug Snel. Snel was in on 63 tackles last fall while Singleton had 45. Defensive back Sam Gallegos was in on 23 tackles last fall to head the returning secondary players.

Junior college transfers figure to plug most of the key positions lost to graduation and quarterback heads the list where Rick Harrison, 6-6, 215; and Remei Riley, 6-0, 190, figure to battle it out with returning senior Bob August. Start: Brooks, 6-4, 255-pound junior is a newcomer at offensive tackle as is Dan Shell, 6-2, 265 and another newcomer in the line is center John Smith, 6-5, 255.

In his three years at S.U.S.C. Coach Jack Bishop has produced a 24-15 record and two of the three years, his teams have been in the chase for the Rocky Mountain Conference title.

Only a 24-19 loss to Mesa and a 7-0 setback to Colorado Mines kept the Thunderbirds from winning the RMAC Championship. This will be the first meeting at the varsity level—S.U.S.C.'s first team in 1963 lost 25-7 to the NAU JV team, but that game was later forfeited to the T-Birds.

## BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK

If you were to spell "Big Sky Success" it would have to be B-O-I-S-E. The Boise State Broncos have put together a 122-37-2 record since leaving from the Junior College ranks 15 years ago and in the 14 varsity seasons, the Broncos have won 10 games on six occasions.

Current head coach Jim Criner has a 51-18-1 mark going into this fall and he has three Big Sky titles to his credit. His 1980 Bronco team won the Big Sky and NCAA I-AA national titles. Tony Knop was 71-19-1 in eight seasons at Boise before going to UNLV where he retired after last season.

NAU and Boise have engaged in some big battles in recent years. In 1978 NAU won 31-30 in the Skydome to clinch the Big Sky title and in 1980 Boise nipped NAU 20-17 then went on to win Big Sky and national titles.

Virtually every pre-season poll has Boise State pegged to regain the Big Sky title it lost last fall to Idaho State. Boise and LSU each finished 6-1 in league play but LSU was the champ by virtue of its 21-10 win at Boise. Boise was selected to the I-AA playoffs but lost in the semi-finals to Eastern Kentucky, a team Boise beat in the 1980 title game.

Among the 46 returning lettermen are 10 offensive and seven defensive starters. Tim Klena 89 of 161 passes for 1,283 yards and 5 TD's and Garald DesPres 74 of 133 for 1,034 yards and 7 TD's give Boise the best 1-2 quarterback punch in the league and that coupled with the return of tailback Rodney Webster who rushed 256 times for 1,139 yards and scored 12 TD's gives Boise a viable offensive punch. Fullback will be strong with Robert Farmer, 211 yards of 50 carries basting it out with USC transfer Paul Dilullo for the starting job. Offensive guards Jon Zogg and Nick Mulligan along with center Scott Baker lead the line vets. Defensively, tackle Michel Borgeaux, safety Larry Adler and linebackers John Rade and Curt Hecker are solid performers.

## UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA-RENO OUTLOOK

Chris Ault brought instant winning football to his Alma Mater when he took over as head coach in 1976 and over the last six seasons his 48-19-1 record which includes two NCAA I-AA playoff appearances, is the best coaching record in the school's 71 years of football.

Ault's 1982 team should be among the Big Sky's best with 29 returning lettermen which includes six offensive and seven defensive starters back from last year's 7-4 team which finished 4-3 in Big Sky play, good for a share of fourth in the league.

UN-Reno became the Big Sky's eighth football playing member when it moved from the West Coast Athletic Association (independent status in football) in 1979. In three seasons against the league, the Wolf Pack stands 13-8 which includes a 3-0 mark against NAU. Overall, UN-Reno holds a 5-2-1 edge on the Lumberjacks.

Quarterbacks Marshall Sperbeck who completed 122 of 233 passes last fall for 1,790 yards and 17 TD's back, but the bulk of his receivers have completed their eligibility -- however, UN-Reno has a stable of young receivers with an abundance of speed and potential and all they need is game experience and leading candidates for Sperbeck's aerials include wide receiver David Fanning and Paul Skinner, a swift wingback.

Runningback Anthony Corley picked up 425 yards last fall and is the leading returner at that spot. Runningback Morris Harper picked up 348 yards and fullback Otto Kelly added 312. Guard Melvin Finney is one of three returning offensive line starters -- the other two are tackle Derek Kennard and center Rick Harris. Placekicker Tony Zendejas booted 27 of 29 extra points and an NCAA I-AA and Big Sky record 21 of 24 field goals last fall.

Defensive standouts back include tackles Bob Hamer and Charles Mann who head seven defensive starters. Linebackers John Rametico and Kyle Denny are plusses as are defensive backs David Kilson and David Buch.

IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK

In just two years Dave Krugthorpe led the Idaho State Bengals from an 0-11 finish in 1979 to the national title in 1981 with a 12-1 record card. Krugthorpe's first season at ISU was 1980 and after a 1-4 start, he rebounded to finish 6-5, so Krugthorpe-coached ISU teams have won 17 of their last 19 games going in to the 1982 season.

ISU lost the bulk of its fire-power from last year's Big Sky and NCAA I-AA championship team, however, Krugthorpe feels he has more speed at the receiver spots and at running-back than he had a year ago—all the new players need is game experience to make the Bengals a viable offensive threat.

In the meantime, eight defensive starters who return will be called upon to provide early-season leadership and toughness while the offensive unit stabilizes. Three of the offensive returnees are linemen—headed by guard Ken Bacon, center Jim Lane and tackle Dan Taylor. Taylor could be one of the best in the NCAA I-AA ranks this fall. Back-up players and Juco transfers figure to play the other line spots. Juco transfer Paul Peterson broke all of Mike Machurek's Jucos records in San Diego and he could be the best new quarterback in the league this fall.

Defensively, quality players return in cornerback Melt Courtney, tackle Chuck Wietles and linebackers Len Gates, John Olive and Bill Snapp. ISU's secondary was the Big Sky's best last fall, leading the league in the least yardage surrendered through the air.

NAU and ISU have long been rivals on the football field. In the early 1960's (before NAU joined the Big Sky) the two teams took turns at spoiling each other's Homecoming games—ISU had two wins and a tie at Lumberjack Homecomings over that span while NAU won three Homecoming games in Pocatello at the USFud Bowl.

EASTERN WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK

Eastern Washington University will be another newcomer to the Lumberjack schedule this fall. The Eagles replace Portland State who needed this date (Oct. 23) to pick up a conference contest in the new Western Football League.

Last season the Eagles finished 7-3 overall which included a season-ending 14-13 win over Montana, the Big Sky's third-place team, EWU opened losing at Idaho state (NCAA I-AA champ) and then lost 13-9 to Northern Colorado and 7-6 to Puget Sound (NCAA II playoff participant).

This fall Head Coach Dick Zornes welcomes back 33 lettermen which will include five offensive six defensive starters. The Eagles, an NCAA Division II independent, also expect upwards of 20 transfers to bolster their hopes of reaching the NCAA II playoffs. Besides NAU, other Big Sky schools on the Eagles' schedule include Weber State and Montana State. Eastern Washington has expressed a strong desire to join the Big Sky and they will no doubt, be out to make a strong impression around the league this fall. Zornes, a 1964 EWU grad, has produced a 20-9 record over the last three seasons.

Four 1980 lettermen are among the 12 redshirts who will be in uniform this fall. The top two rushers in tailback Mike Brady, 719 yards and 7 TD's in 126 carries returns as does fullback Mike Anderson who gained 665 yards and scored 1 TD on 113 attempts. Redshirt quarterback Jim Brittain could be the best ever at EWU, but he will be throwing to a stable of new receivers, most of whom are faster than the Eagles had last fall, including Jim and Anthony Brunson, flanker Don Hart and wide receiver Jim Jacobson.

Defensively a pair of transfer tackles—Steve Sierros and William Johnson could be the best duo EWU has ever had at one time at the tackle spots. Linebacker Jeff Metter from USC and tailback Greg Horn from Stanford will be pluses as will tight end Tom Clark from Washington.

## NEW MEXICO STATE UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK

An impressive finish plus drawing well at the gate could well lead to membership in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association for the New Mexico State University Aggies who could be in the final year of membership in the Missouri Valley Conference which has become predominantly an NCAA 1-AA league. Seven or eight wins plus averaging some 20,000 fans at home would have the NCAA rolling out its red carpet as NCAA schools are on the brink of becoming 1-AA institutions unless their attendance, as a league, is more stabilized.

The Aggies hold a 16-7-1 series edge over NAJ. The last time the teams met, the Aggies won 57-13 in Las Cruces during the 1970 season. During the 1967 season NMSU beat the Lumberjacks 90-0 in Las Cruces, handing NAJ its worst modern-day defeat. NAJ's last win in the series was 13-7 to open the 1948 season—since then the Aggies have won seven straight.

Kil Krueger coached Northern Michigan in the NCAA Division II national title in 1975 and two years later headed for New Mexico State where he has put together a 15-28-1 mark over four years; however, injury to key personnel and the loss of 10 games by a TD and a conversion or less — has caused Krueger some extra grey hair. With 45 returning letterman which includes seven offensive and six defensive starters plus both kickers back, this could be the year the Aggies challenge for the Missouri Valley crown.

Offensively, the Aggies will be led by quarterback Jamie McAllister who completed 91 of 180 passes for 1,448 yards and 6 TD's and he has his top receiver back in split end Al Tanner who caught 20 passes for 345 yards.

The offensive line has key returnees in tackle Don Miller and guard Tom Weaver. Placekicker Mark Cabellito booted 14 of 17 conversions and 7 of 13 field goals for a team high 35 points last fall.

Defensively, the Aggies return a pair of touted ends in Fred Young and Brian Nance. Linebacker Lee Barker is a quality performer as is defensive back Andre Francis.

Montana State's Bobcats have won more Big Sky football titles than anyone else in the league's history — five outright and one tie, however; the past two seasons MSU has slid to sixth and seventh place respectively since winning its last title in 1979.

That's a dangerous sign in Bozeman, where twice MSU has gone from last place the previous year to the championship—it happened first in 1966 and again in 1972 when the Bobcats took titles following last place seasons.

New head coach Doug Graber is in his first season as a head coach following successful assistant stints at Wisconsin, Ball State, Eastern Michigan and Michigan Tech. Graber's forte is defense and every place he has coached, his teams have excelled in this form of football. Graber plans on making some changes offensively. Part MSU teams have been built around a strong T formation tailback and now Graber wants to establish a more balanced offense between the run and pass.

Montana State returns 40 letterman and among the returnees are six offensive and eight defensive starters and both kickers. Offensive stalwarts back include tailback Tony Boldie who rushed for 824 yards last season and scored four TD's. The other top three runners are also back in Jim Kalafat who picked up 267 yard. St. Timberman who had 242 yards and quarterback Barry Sullivan who rushed for 239 yards and completed 74 of 133 passes for 897 yards and 3 TD's.

Replacing top receivers might be a problem only until some talented youngsters like Duane Baker (TE), Kelly Davis (WR) and Steve King (WR) gain game experience. Two intension offensive linemen return in tackle Eric Harrington and guard John Blackman—however, the entire second team offensive line, which saw considerable action last fall is back!

Defensively, eight starters are back as are eight back-up players, so the Bobcat defense could be as good as any in the league if the secondary is solidified.

Idaho is another Big Sky school with a first-year head coach, however, Dennis Erickson is no stranger to the Big Sky or winning football. He quarterbacked Montana State to the Big Sky crowns in 1967 and 1968 and he was later an assistant at Montana State and Idaho.

Erickson has spent the last three years as offensive coordinator at San Jose State and he will bring the high-powered passing game to Idaho that he helped teach so well to the Spartan athletes. Idaho has been a run oriented team the last eight years and this fall Vandal fans will see the Kibbe Dome filled with footballs.

Defensive changes Erickson installed during spring drills included three down linemen with two outside linebackers. Offensively, the passing game will be short with the high percentage pass used to move the football and no doubt options will see a wide range of formations.

The Vandals return 47 lettermen—including five offensive and eight defensive starters. Newspapers will have to provide back-up depth defensively, however, 29 vets on offense will make the Vandals a viable team despite the switch on philosophy from run to pass.

Keying the offense will be quarterback Ken Hobart who has run the veer effectively the last two seasons. He spent the spring and summer learning to throw and he could be very effective as he has a good arm and is an effective scrambler and if his fleet stature of an receivers get their timing synchronized, Idaho passing could be an instant success.

Runningbacks Cal Lovall and Wally Jones will add speed and Hobart's running will still be a threat—he rushed for 693 yards last fall and completed 81 of 179 passes for 1,541 yards and 12 TD's while throwing just 6 interceptions.

Defensively the Vandals will be built around linebacker Sam Manning who is one of the league's best. Defensive back Howard Wilcox is also a plus for Erickson's new staff.

Weber State and NAU have engaged in some exciting football games and perhaps the most climatic was last fall in Ogden where the Wildcats won a 24-23 overtime contest—the first regular season game at the 1-A or 1-AA level ever decided in overtime. Last fall the Big Sky put in the tie-breaker (previously used to decide a winner in post-season playoff games)—so at this stage, there will be no tie games in league action.

NAU and Weber have met continuously since 1964 and the Wildcats hold a 11-7 edge; however, NAU has won five of the last eight encounters. Six of the games have been decided by 10 or less—NAU has one 1-point win and Weber two.

Last fall new head coach Mike Price brought a 7-4-0 finish and had the Wildcats in the title run until the final week. That winning season was Weber's first since 1971.

Of the returning 36 lettermen, only 14 are on defense and five of those are starters while seven offensive starters are back. Weber was the Big Sky total defensive leader last fall and if some key defensive players are replaced, the Wildcats could have the offensive firepower to make a run for their first outright Big Sky title (they tied for two league titles).

Tailback Dennis Rogan a Nebraska transfer figures to team with quarterback Tim Bernal to provide a solid 1-2 punch. Bernal completed 65 of 125 last fall for 693 yard. He completed a Big Sky record 35 against Idaho State. Kelvin Matthews, last year's top rusher is back—he gained 474 yards and caught 21 passes for 185 yards—Matthews had 139 of his yards in that 24-23 win over NAU.

Linebacker Mike Nichter, once guard John Kavanagh, safety Kris Jugler, cornerback Elbert Gray headline the returning defensive players.

Roger Ruzick is another in a long (seemingly continuous) line of Big Sky placekickers. Last fall he kicked 31 of 33 conversions and 9 of 19 field goals.

## EDGAR "MUTT" FORD FOOTBALL / 1929-32



Instrumental in the Lumberjacks posting a 15-6-2 record in football in 1929-32. After graduation he recorded 245 career prep football victories from 1924-66 -- an all-time Arizona record through 1982. He won or tied for eight state football titles while at Genshale, Mesa and Mesa Westwood high schools. His football teams also finished second seven times and he won three state basketball titles. He coached 54 first team all-state football players and was one of the few coaches to appear in the Arizona Prep All Star Game in both football and basketball.



## LORA MAXWELL COACH / 1923-64



A pioneer in women's coaching, Ms. Maxwell organized the Women's Recreation Association in 1930, the forerunner of today's intercollegiate athletic program for ladies at NAU. She also organized the university's first women's physical education program. Coached archery, rifle and basketball. NAU's 1959 homecoming activities were dedicated to her honor.



## DR. LYLE MULLENS

### FACULTY ATHLETIC REPRESENTATIVE / 1960-80



A member of the College of Education faculty, he certified athletic eligibility of NAU athletes and interpreted rules and regulations of the NCAA and the Big Sky Conference. A graduate of Wayne State University in Nebraska, he also served as an associate dean in the College of Education.



## JACK WILSON

### FOOTBALL, BASKETBALL, BASEBALL, TRACK / 1926-29

One of NAU's greatest all-around athletes, he lettered four years in football and basketball, and once in track/field and baseball. He went on to become one of Arizona's leading prep coaches at Benson High School, winning two state basketball championships and compiling a 347-122 record over 21 years.

# NCAA Honor Roll

Program recognizes past, present student-athletes

Bill Cosby, five current student-athletes and five former student-athletes were honored at this year's NCAA honors luncheon held during the Association's 76th annual Convention in Houston in January.

Cosby received the NCAA's highest honor, the Theodore Roosevelt Award. The award is named for the 26th President of the United States, who was the individual most responsible for implementing the organization of the NCAA. While attending Temple University, Cosby participated in track and field, basketball and football. Although he was a second-string fullback in football, his best sport was track. A versatile performer, he scored at various times in the high jump, shot put, low hurdles, javelin and discus. He also won the Middle Atlantic Conference high jump title in 1962.

The "Teddy" is presented annually to a prominent American "for whom competitive athletics in college and attention to physical well-being thereafter have been important factors in a distinguished career of national significance and achievement."

Previous winners include former President Dwight D. Eisenhower; Senator Everett S. Salloum; Supreme Court Justice Byron R. White; Purdue University President Frederick L. Hoyde; Jerome H. Holland, ambassador to Sweden and last year's winner, Art Linkletter.

Also honored at the luncheon were five current and past student-athletes. The NCAA recognized five outstanding student-athletes who completed their college eligibility in 1981. Two football players, two swimmers and a women's basketball player were honored.

Ken Sims, a defensive tackle for the University of Texas, was the winner of the Lombardi Award in 1981, emblematic of the outstanding lineman. Sims also was named to an all-America team for the third straight year.

Oliver Luck, a quarterback at West Virginia University, accumulated 6,150 yards of total offense during his career, a WVU record, and led the Mountaineers to a 9-3 record and Peach Bowl win in 1981. Luck is a two-time academic all-America and a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete.

The two swimmers honored were Par



Arvidson of the University of California and Rowdy Gaines of Auburn University. Arvidson captured a gold medal at the 1980 Olympics while competing for his native Sweden and is the world-record holder in the 100-meter butterfly. Gaines was a member of the U.S. Olympic team and won five NCAA individual swimming championships.

The first woman to receive a Today's Top Five award was Lynette Woodard, a basketball standout at the University of Kansas. Woodard set a national career scoring record of 3,646 points during four years as a Jayhawk and was a three-time all-America selection.

Silver Anniversary awards were presented to five former student-athletes who have accomplished distinguished careers. They were honored on their 25th anniversary after college graduation.

All five played football and three of the five also played basketball.

Jimmy Brown is recognized as one of the greatest players in the history of football, but also starred in basketball and lacrosse at Syracuse University. Brown went on to the NFL and since retiring has enjoyed an excellent career in acting.

A two-time captain of the Grambling Tigers, Willie Davis went on to greater

fame with the Green Bay Packers. Davis played on five world championship teams and never missed a game. Davis currently owns the Willie Davis Distributing Company and is a member of the Joseph Schütz Brewing Company board of directors.

Jack Kemp was an all-America at Occidental College and went on to quarterback the Buffalo Bills to AFL championships in 1964 and 1968. His jersey—No. 15—is retired in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Kemp is currently a member of the U.S. Congress from the state of New York.

Another Green Bay Packer great, Ron Kramer, was a football and basketball star at the University of Michigan. Kramer caught 53 passes from his tight end position in college and led the Wolverines in scoring in basketball his junior and senior years. Kramer is currently vice-president of Paragon Steel Corporation.

The final honoree was Jim Swink, former Texas Christian University running back. Swink is the only TCU player to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season. Swink also was a two-year letterman in basketball. He is currently an orthopedic surgeon and chief of surgery at All Saints Hospital in Fort Worth.
